A DAY WITH GRENFELL.

Labrador Doctor Does Nearly Everything For Those In His Care.

Dr. Wilfred Grenfell of Labrador, preacher, teacher, physician, surgeon, magistrate, policeman, navigator, pilot, charity commissioner, orphan's guardian, grand almoner for the whole seaboard, wreck-investigator, cartographer, has a reputation of being a very busy man. Just what a day's work means to him is suggested by a writer in The Review of Reviews. We read:

None but a resolute and powerful man could get through a routine like Grenfell's. His daily tasks in summer include treatment of ward cases received aboard his ship between hospital points; navigating of the steamer, for he is his own pilot; attention to all patients found in the different harbors or aboard the fishing vessels, such as diagnosing and dispensing for those ailing, abscess-letting, tooth-pulling, etc., holding religious meetings every evening; responding to all calls at whatever hour, even when this implies landing in the inky blackness of night or rowing miles in an open boat where the ship can not get; writing a daily diary for a score of newspapers to swell the funds; conducting Sunday services all the season round; arranging for supplies of wood for the ship's furnaces in a land where there is no coal; adjudicating the disputes between the fisher-folk as an unpaid magistrate; caring for orphans and lunatics; providing clothes and food for the ill-clad and destitute; wooden legs and arms for the crippled, shotguns and game-traps for the "furriers"; and nets and gear for the fisher-folk who have met misfortune; harkening to the appeal of everybody in distress, and relieving them so far as possible; baptizing, marrying, and burying where no clergyman ever goes; towing off stranded vessels after every great storm, and carrying wrecked crews southward to the mail boat, and discovering new coal banks for the trawlers, beside keeping track of the multitude of details and the finances incident to the administration of four hospitals and a ship, as well as all the subsidiary enterprises—lending libraries, workshops, fox farms, angora goat herds, farm at St. Anthony, saw mill at Roddickton, eight co-operative stores, and the remainder; not to mention correspondence with institutions and friends in Europe and America.

"During a summer he will cruise some 3,000 to 4,000 miles. During a winter he will travel 2,000 miles over a frozen wilderness with snowshoes and dog sleds, visiting family, "furling without pay and laboring without stint," battling with blizzards, heart by a dreary solitude, sleeping in the snow, feeding as conditions permit, imperiling life and limb in the drifts or by falling through the ice covering of the lakes or streams, and encountering dangers unsurpassed in the annals of Arctic explorers.

SOME QUEER PRAYERS

Curious Mistakes That Have Been Made by Preachers.

A CAUTIOUS SCOTCH ELDER.

The Way He Qualified In His Petition His Praise of the Pastor's Wife. The Blunt Appeal of Father Taylor, the Boston Preacher.

The most frequent cause of inappropriate petitions is no doubt the persistence of habit. Certain phrases are used again and again until they come to be repeated without any thought of their immediate application, says the Christian World. We may similarly explain the stories of the workhouse chaplain who prayed that those present might not trust in uncertain riches and the prison chaplain who besought the Lord that he conduct the worshippers in safety to their respective places of abode.

The sense of humor must surely have been lacking in the old man of eighty, supported by crutches, who regularly included among his petitions at the weekly prayer meeting the request that he might be kept from running with the giddy multitude to do evil. Familiarity with conventional phraseology was the undoing of the minister who, after the sermon on the Pharisee and the publican, asked that there might be poured out upon his hearers a double portion of the publican's spirit. Not very complimentary was the use of a well known Scripture passage made by a minister at a wedding:

"May these persons live together in such harmony in this life that they may finally attain unto that state of felicity where they neither marry nor are given in marriage." As a concluding example of the thoughtless use of familiar language one may quote this remarkable amalgam: "O Lord, we praise thee that we are thine; we feel that we are thine; we know that we are thine; Lord, make us thine."

As in a sermon, so in a prayer, the attempt to correct a hasty utterance sometimes leads to surprising results. A cautious Scotch elder, it is said, had taken supper at his pastor's house and in returning thanks after the meal entered upon a detailed exposition of various causes of gratitude. He concluded by invoking the divine blessing upon the pastor's wife as his godly helpmeet, who had always upheld his hands in every good work—"at least," he added in a saving clause, "as far as we know." It is related of a compatriot that in a moment of forgetfulness he once thanked God for "the salvation of all men," but immediately redeemed himself from heterodoxy by the qualification, "which, O Lord, as thou knowest, is true in one sense, but not in another."

There are some men who seem to think that an indirect manner of expression is especially suited to sacred things, as the Scotchman quoted by Dr. Boyd as saying, "For, as thou knowest, men do not gather grapes of thorns nor figs of the national emblem," and the Englishman who thus pledged himself, "And, O Lord, if thou wilt move the heart of any young man to enter thy service, we will show our approval in a way which thou wilt appreciate."

Father Taylor, the Boston sailor-preacher, was one of the most direct of men and on the one recorded occasion when he essayed a roundabout style nature triumphed over artifice. It was the Sunday before the state elections, and he was praying fervently that a man might be chosen for governor who would rule in the fear of God, who would never be afraid of the face of clay, who would defeat the ringleaders of corruption, who would defy his own party if it yielded to wire pullers, who—suddenly Father Taylor paused and then exclaimed: "O Lord, what's the use of boxing the compass in this way? Give us George N. Briggs for governor. Amen!"

The temptation to use public prayer as a vehicle for the conveying of information has sometimes been too strong to resist. In his lively reminiscences published some years ago in the Wesleyan Methodist Magazine the late Dr. Benjamin Gregory recalled how a certain Methodist minister of an earlier generation was accustomed "to convey all necessary directions to his younger colleagues through the medium of the throne of grace." Here is an example: "O Lord, bless thy dear young servant. Thou knowest his appointment for tomorrow is at —, and he will have to stop at Brother —'s, who keeps a little shop opposite the church. Oh, grant that thy dear young servant may not forget to let the people have the magazines and to bring home the moneys."

The famous Dr. McCosh of Princeton was accustomed to meet the students in the college chapel every morning, when he would make any necessary announcements as well as conduct devotions. One morning in the prayer with which the service concluded he prayed for the president of the United States, the cabinet, the members of both houses of congress, the governor of New Jersey, the mayor and other officials of Princeton, and he then came to the professors and instructors in the college. At this point there flashed into his mind a notice which had been communicated to him orally and which he had omitted to include in the announcements made just before. To the surprise of the assembled students President McCosh continued, "And, O Lord, bless Professor Karge, whose French class will be held this morning at 9 o'clock instead of 9:30, as usual."

Toronto Junction Live Stock.
TORONTO JUNCTION, May 24.—Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards were 55 carloads, consisting of 1179 cattle, 34 sheep and one calf.

Exporters.
Export steers sold at \$5.75 to \$6.25; bulls, \$4.50 to \$5. The bulk of the exporters were held over for Tuesday's market.

Best loads sold at from \$5.25 to \$5.50; medium, \$5 to \$5.25; common, \$4.50 to \$5; cows, \$3.75 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Milkers and Springers.
Prices for milkers and springers were unchanged, at \$5 to \$6 each.

Prices steady, at \$3 to \$3.50 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs.
The run of sheep and lambs was light. Wesley Dunn quotes prices unchanged all round.

Hogs.
There were none offering, but H. P. Kennedy reports prices unchanged at \$8 for select, fed and watered; \$7.50 to \$7.70, f.o.b., cars at country points.

Montreal Live Stock.
MONTREAL, May 24.—(Special.)—At the Montreal Stock Yards, West End Market, receipts for last week were 2700 cattle, 150 sheep and lambs, 160 hogs and 150 calves. The supply this morning consisted of 1109 cattle, 50 sheep and lambs, 300 hogs and 50 calves. The offerings of cattle were under the mark of a week ago. The 100 head large head was not quite so strong for the medium and lower grades, but prices for the better classes were fairly well maintained. Attendance of buyers was good, and demand good. There was some demand from exporters, but owing to high prices and that cable advices from Liverpool noted a decline of 1/2c to 1c per lb., as compared with a week ago, only a few were taken. A few loads of extra choice Ontario stall-fed steers sold at 6 1/2c, and some picked lots at 6 1/2c, but the bulk of choice lots sold at 6c, good, at 5 1/2c to 6c; fair, at 5c to 5 1/2c; medium, at 4 1/2c to 4 3/4c; fat cows, at 4 1/2c to 5 1/2c; bulls, at 4 1/2c to 5 1/2c, and common stock at 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c per lb.

Hog prices scored a further advance of 25c per cwt, making a net rise of 45c to 50c, within the past ten days, attributed to the very small supplies coming forward, and the keen demand from packers. Sales of selected lots were made at \$8.75 to \$8.85 per cwt., weighed off the cars, and in a few instances, \$8.90 to \$9. As of ferings were comparatively light. Prices ruled firm. Yearling sheep, sold at 6 1/2c to 7c; old sheep, at 5 1/2c to 6c per lb.; spring lambs, brought from \$4 to \$8 each; calves from \$2 to \$10 each, as to size and quality.

At the Canadian Pacific live stock market receipts for the week were 234 cattle, 163 sheep and lambs, 351 hogs, and 1813 calves for local consumption, while the supply this morning amounted to 250 cattle, 40 sheep and lambs, 150 hogs and 300 calves.

And they all shook my hand and thanked me—and went to look—at the other men's babies—and they saw babies in front of them, babies behind them, babies to the right of them, babies to left of them. And then—you know—their faces fell—they didn't seem to like it—and—well—ha, ha, they never asked me to hang the pictures again at Liverpool!"

Rats' Cold Weather Retreat.

Many animals snuggle together for warmth in bitter weather, as the squirrels and the rats. Those who go rattling in hedges and dells in the winter, know they may try a dozen freshly used burrows without finding a rat, when suddenly from a single hole the rats will come pouring out in a stream of frenzied fur. Twenty or more rats will lie together in one hole.

They are clever enough to block up a hole on the windward side to keep out the draft, so that when a rat hole is noted newly stopped with soil, turnip leaves or grass there is almost certain indication that rats are within. Like the squirrels, they store food for winter, and the keeper may find it more difficult to secure his potatoes from frost than from the attack of the most numerous of his furred foes.—London Standard.
