

# MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

## Highway Act Makes No Provision For Paying Secretary-Treasurer and Auditor.

### The Poor Farm Scheme Shelved For The Present.

The County Council re-assembled on Wednesday at 10.30 o'clock, with Warden Hinchey in the chair, and all of the members present, except Coun. Sterling, who has leave of absence.

The vote on Coun. McNally's amendment, was then taken and it carried unanimously.

At Wednesday morning's meeting of the York County council, on motion of Coun. Goodspeed, a committee appointed at the last session to settle an assessment matter with the Marysville town authorities was given an extension of time.

Mr. Bliss explained that it was no fault of the committee that the matter had not been adjusted.

Coun. Pond pointed out that the new highway act made no provision for paying the county secretary-treasurer or auditor for their services in connection with administering the act. He moved that they be paid at the same rate as under the old act.

Coun. Goodspeed did not think that the amount should be paid out of the county fund, but out of the road monies.

Mr. Bliss said that there was no provision made for paying the amounts out of the road monies.

Coun. Goodspeed thought it would not be right to pay them out of the ordinary funds of the county.

#### SOME PLAIN TALK.

Coun. Graham wants to know what the Secretary-Treasurer was paid a salary for anyway. He thought that he ought to be willing to do the work in connection with the highway act for nothing. He now gets a commission on everything he does.

Mr. Bliss—You get \$10 for your services on the highway board.

Coun. Graham—If you did as much work in connection with the highway act as I have done for that \$10, you would have a bill against the county for \$250. You must not think that I am too hard on you. We pay you a salary of \$500 and we also pay your deputy and you ought not to charge the county extra for everything you do.

Coun. Pond said that the auditor

and secretary got their pay under the old act.

Mr. Bliss said that the money was formerly paid into the county treasury, where as it was now paid to the highway boards and was under the control of each parish. The present act puts more work on the secretary-treasurer and makes no provision for paying him. If Coun. Graham lived as close to the city as some of the other councillors he would know that the secretary-treasurer was kept pretty busy. His work was not all performed during the council meeting.

Coun. Brewer wanted to know what the auditor had to do with the road money.

Mr. Bliss replied that he would have to audit all the accounts.

Coun. Graham claimed that he knew something about the duties of the secretary-treasurer's office. He had often gone into the office and found Mr. Bliss absent. If those who live handy and run in often would remain away, it might be better for the rest of the county.

#### \$200,000 For Roads.

Brockville, July 7.—The Counties Council of Leeds and Grenville is to proceed with the improvement of its leading highways under the good roads system as provided by the Ontario Government, involving an outlay of \$200,000, which will be raised by debentures. This will give the counties a Government bonus of \$100,000.

The program just now is to construct upwards of 250 miles of roadway within the next five years. Passing the bylaw to make the scheme effective was deferred until the fall session.
