THE DRY CANTEN.

The Toronto Telegram, a leading Conservative journal, thus vigorously contradicts those fault-finders who have been absurdly endeavoring to create the impression that the abolition of the sale of intoxicants at military camps was a mistake.

"Canteens where the men can get their beer have been described as the secret of greatness. In a training camp for the Canadian militia, the camps of 1903 have proved, according to the testimony of competent observers, that the dry canteen is a great success. The town and village graveyards of Ontario are the last resting places of all that is mortal of not a few young men whose untimely death is, rightly or wrongly, traced to the convivial habits they acquired in the camps and mess rooms of the Canadian militia. Mothers and sisters, with a heart hatred for the very name of soldiering, are poor recruiting agents for the volunteers. The dry canteen is pronounced a success. Its continuance may do something to popularize volunteering in family circles which have urged sons to shun the camp as a starting point on the journey to a drunkard's grave."

A leading military officer, who is in a position to speak with authority, said the other day that there had been less drinking at camps this year than in previous years, and gave it as his opinion that the liquorless canteen had been a success. The militia department made a commendable move to abolishing intoxicants from the canteens.

TO RAISE CORRUPTION FUND.

At the convention of Nova Scotia Tories at Truro a short time ago, this resolution was passed unanimously:

"Whereas, it has come to the notice of this convention that one or more of the candidates of the Liberal Conservative party in the recent federal elections received a majority of the votes polled in their respective constituencies, but were deprived of their rights through dishonest manipulation of the election returns by election officials of the Liberal party, and that the prosecution of the dishonest officials could not be properly carried out so as to secure for them the punishment provided by the statute, for want of means to defray the expenses of the prosecution;

"Resolved, that the members of this association take steps to accumulate and collect a fund from lovers of honest elections as will enable the association to bring about the punishment due to offenders of this kind, and other violations of the law through dishonest revisers, returning officers and sheriffs."

We should imagine that the fund would be a very small one, if collected only from Tories who are lovers of honest elections. The resolution is too thin to deceive anybody. The Tories are certainly past masters in the game of bluff.

Hon. John Morrissy and Hon. H.F. McLeod are billed to address a political meeting at Millford, St. John county, on Tuesday, July 13th. With the chief commissioner for a sparring partner, the solicitor general will not have much of a chance to repeat his 12th of July oration.

The secretary-treasurers of the several highway boards of York county will fatten and grow wealthy on the princely allowance of ten dollars per year voted them by the county council. Of course they will have the privilege of paying their own traveling expenses.

Transcript: Now that a bye-election is approaching in St. John county, some of the Conservative journals are contending that Hazen should be allowed "to finish his work." For months past, when the provincial government was receiving criticism on every hand, some of the same organs contended that Hazen's "work" had not yet begun.

Tory hopes of securing control of provincial affairs in Prince Edward Island have been blasted for a time at least. A bye election to fill the

vacancy in the first district of Queens was held on Wednesday, and resulted in the return of the Liberal candidate by a majority of 70. The Liberals in the legislature now number 16 and the Tories 13, with a seat vacant.

The late Mrs. Lounsbury bequeathed the sum of \$500 for the promotion of the cause of temperance in this city. The bequest is a little out of the ordinary channel, but the object the testator had in view is none the less worthy on that account. There will no doubt be some difference of opinion as how the money should be expended to give the best results.

Every member of the Hazen government, except the surveyor general and the medical commissioner of agriculture, has been summoned to St. John county to try and save the situation for the Tories. St. John county is part of the constituency of Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Minister of Public Works, and if by some chance the Tory candidate should slip in, what a shout of triumph would go up from the Tory newspapers, big and little, all over Canada.

A Stanley correspondent informs us that Mr. John A. Humble refused absolutely to have anything to do with the Tory picnic held at Stanley. He resisted all entreaties to go up to the agricultural hall and listen to the speeches, and spent the day at his store. Mr. Humble says that when the Tory members for York appointed a sheriff they disregarded the wishes of the people as expressed in a largely signed petition, and he wants nothing more to do with them.

Insulted Roman Catholic Women and was Horsewhipped.

The following paragraph from the Buffalo Union and Times, is supposed to have reference to a native of Queensbury, York county, who used to go about the province lecturing on "Rum, Romanism and Rebellion," and kindred subjects:

Nelsonville, Ohio, Catholic women had the pleasure of horsewhipping an odious self-styled ex-priest the other day. The fellow, L. J. King by name, rode through the streets of the town in an open carriage, vested in cassock, surplice, biretta and stole, though he was never a priest or ever inside a college. King's charges against Catholic women were so outrageous that the prosecuting attorney of the county, J. M. Foster, a non-Catholic, had him haled into court for criminal libel. The case had to be dropped, however, since the law does not recognize the slandering of a community as libel. A number of women supplied the deficiency of the law by giving their defamer a raw-hiding, the police being engaged at the time, quite conveniently, in another part of the town."

If the King referred to above is our old friend, the Ohio women seem to have taken his measure correctly. He never was a priest, although we believe he was at one time an adherent of the Roman Catholic church.

INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION.

ST. JOHN, July 8.—(Special)—The International Commission on use of the waterways of the St. John river met again this morning.

The entire morning was taken up with the evidence of Messrs. Rainboth and Baylor, who are engaged in restoring the boundary between the United States and Canada along the eastern provinces.

Their evidence was chiefly for identifying certain parts of the boundary, which they submitted and explained them to the commissioner. They said that they were not locating a new boundary, but merely restoring the location of the boundary according to the surveys of 1842 to 1845.

Huge Flag Breaks Building.

Pittsburg, Pa., July 7.—A flag, said to be the largest in the world, unfurled here on Monday, pulled thousands of pounds of the roofing from the Court House yesterday. Many persons had miraculous escapes from injury when the tile crashed into Court street. The district about the Grant House and Frick building has been roped off and police will guard the place until a score of city employees remove the great banner. It will take the best part of the day to lower the flag.

The national emblem, 80 feet wide and 160 feet long and weighing over 3,000 pounds with its fastenings, was unfurled Monday with appropriate ceremonies. It was stretched between the 18th floor of the Frick building

wind wafted the big flag toward the Diamond street side of the Court House yesterday and it caught in the lightning rod of a capstone. The next moment the stone and the roofing were pulled loose.
