WANT NO MORE WAR

Notables Speak at Celebration at Fort Ticonderoga.

TAFT PRAISES THE FRENCH

President Pays High Compliment to People of Lower Canada—Ambassador Bryce Hopes That Lake Champlain Has Seen Its Last Hostilities — French Ambassador Jusserand Also Speaks.

Bluff Point, N.Y., July 7.—With the arrival of President Taft, of Ambassador Bryce of Great Britain, of Ambassador Jusserand of France, Secretary of War Dickinson and Vice Admiral Uru of Japan, the celebration of the 300th anniversary of the discovery of Lake Champlain, which had been confined during the past two days to the States of New York and Vermont, yesterday took on an international scope and a world-wide interest.

For Ambassadors Bryce and Jusserand and President Taft, all committed their respective countries to policies of peace, and, in the shadow of an old fortress which had witnessed some of the bloodiest battles in all history, they expressed the hope that never again would the peace among the great nations of the world be interrupted by a war.

Ambassador Jusserand in his speech was most felicitous in his expression of peace and good-will toward America, toward Great Britain and toward all the world. He referred with much feeling to the fact that France and Great Britain soon are to celebrate the completion of 100 years of peace.

Ambassador Bryce took up the theme and declared that although he was surrounded by martial scenes and men of arms, he himself was a man of peace.

"Not until I visited the old fort yesterday," said Mr. Bryce, "did I realize how many memories cluster around its ruins, but I cannot but believe its creator meant this beautiful spot for something else than fighting, and I trust that it never will see fighting again."

Ambassador Bryce declared that the English and French, in the fighting about Ticonderoga, found each other worthy antagonists. While he admired them, he said, for their courage in the cause they went forth to fight for, he hoped they would never, never do it again.

Champlain was a man whom all nations can honor," said President Taft. He is not a man with respect to whose history you have to pass over something in silence.

"All his life could bear the closest examination and he brings out in the strongest way those wonderful qualities shown in the 15th, 16th and 17th centuries by Spaniards, Englishmen, Frenchmen and Portuguese, who braved those dreadful terrors of the seas, circumnavigated the globe in little cockleshells and carried the standard of the then civilization into the farther forests and into the dangers of the most distant tropics.

"There were Montcalm and Wolfe, two great Christians, back to whom you trace the whole history of Lower Canada. It is true Wolfe conquered Montcalm on the Plains of Abraham, but there is still in all the region of Lower Canada a population purely French, a population of industrious, God-fearing and loyal to the flag people, under whose Government they live. That fact is a compliment not only to the far-seeing statesmanship of the English colonial statesman who frames the government under which they live, but it is a compliment to the present industrial domestic virtues of the French nation."

OFF FOR THE CELEBRATION.

Montreal, July 7.—There was an animated scene last evening at Bonaventure Station, as the Canadian dignitaries were leaving for the Champlain celebration. Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux explained that he would represent the Canadian Government alone, since Ambassador Bryce was present and would represent the Government of his Britannic Majesty. There were the Postmaster, General and Madame Lemieux; Sir Louis Gouin, Prime Minister of Quebec; Sir A. H. Pelletier, Lieutenant-Governor of the province of Quebec, with Col. Hatch and Major Crossette, the military representative of the governor of the State of New York, who could not come here, but who will meet the Canadians on American territory this morning. U. S. Consul Gen. Bradley was also of the party.

Six Years for Diamond Fakir.

Paris, July 7.—Henri Lemoine, who, on pretence of being able to make diamonds, defrauded Sir Julius Wernher, head of the De Beers Mining Co., of a large sum of money, was sentenced to six years imprisonment and a fine of \$600, after a long trial.

The court pronounced Lemoine a vulgar fakir, whose pretensions lacked the semblance of scientific procedure.

Aeronaut's Fatal Error.

Portland, Me., July 7.—Mistaking the promiscuous firing of revolvers by the crowd below as a signal for the climax of his aerial act, James Corcoran, an aeronaut, 28 years old, of Lowell, Mass., cut loose with his parachute when but a few hundred feet from the earth, and was dashed to the ground, meeting almost instant death before 5,000 horrified spectators.

Western Crop Report.

Winnipeg, July 7.—The crop reports received yesterday from all points in the West are very optimistic. Early wheat is heading out, and all grain crops are in a very healthy condition. The harvest is expected to be much earlier than last year.

Seven Hundred at Coking Main. Ottawa, July 7.—Seven hundred persons are said to have attended a coking main just outside Hull on Sunday last, at which fifty battles were fought and thousands of dollars changed hands.

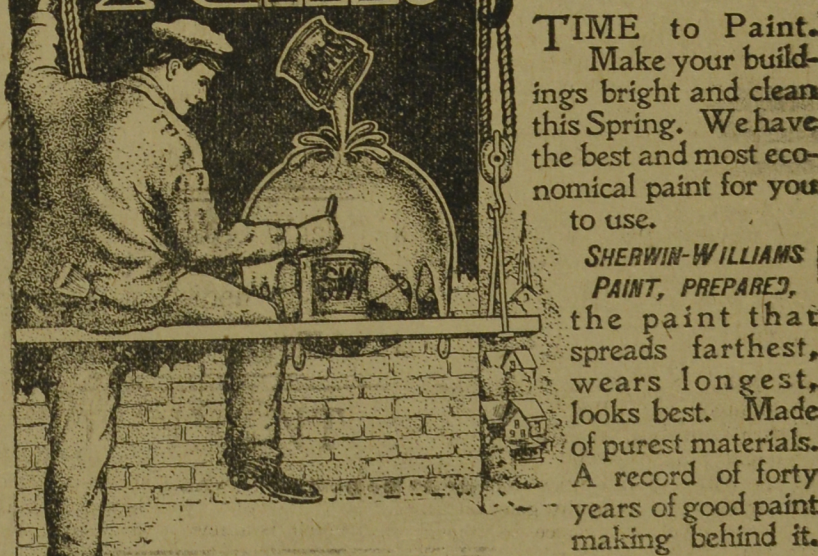
