FUNERAL TOMORROW.

The funeral of the late John S. Lenihan will take place tomorrow morning from the residence of his father Mr. Daniel Lenihan, King street. High mass of requiem will be celebrated at St. Dunstan's church by Rev. Father Carney and interment will take place at the Hermitage.

MRS. FRASER'S ESTATE.

Letters of administration in the estate of the late Mrs. Mary Ann Fraser of this city, were granted to her brother, Ald. Edward Moore. The property consists of an undivided interest in linen mills at Belfast, Ireland, belonging to the estate of the late Mrs. Charity Moore, and was sworn at \$33,000. McLellan and Hughes are proctors for the estate, and the property will likely be held in trust for the heirs.

RESULTED FATALLY.

Francis Baty, the young man who sustained terrible injuries at McGivney's Siding on Tuesday, as the result of a fall from a moving train, succumbed to his injuries at the Victoria Hospital this morning. Yesterday the physicians amputated his left arm, and part of one foot, and he failed to rally from the operation. He was twenty-eight years of age and is survived by a widow and two children. The remains will be taken this evening by I. C. R. train to his home at St. Theresa, Gloucester County for burial.

THE BIGGEST EVER.

Ald. E. Moore Says the Blueberry Crop This Year Will Break All Records.

Ald. Edward Moore lately returned from a trip to his extensive blueberry plantations at Sunpoke Lake and Fredericton Junction and is very optimistic over the outlook. He has at present over one hundred and fifty square miles, more or less in crop, and declares that the output this year will not be less than five million quarts.

The problem of handling and marketing such an enormous quantity of berries is a serious one and is causing the alderman no little worry and anxiety. He has offers, galore from American syndicates, but as yet has not given them much consideration. Local capitalists are also taking an interest in the matter, and talk of organizing a stock company, and applying to the Sunbury County council for a bonus. There is talk of constructing a siding to the plantation, and having a portion of the

crops converted into pies and delivered in carload lots.

Ald. Moore, realizing that he has a sort of cobalt in his blueberry plantation, is a little wary about negotiating with speculators, and probably in the end he will undertake to handle the crop himself. If he should decide to do so, he will probably import five hundred expert female berry pickers from the Fiji Islands.

A St. John man, who lately invented a machine known as a hopper-doser is now in correspondence with Ald. Moore. He says that the hopper-doser was originally intended as a potato bug picker, but it is equally adapted for blueberries, and the machine will do the work of fifty female berry pickers. Ald. Moore now has the matter under consideration. He expects to clean up from fifty to one hundred thousand on the season's output.
