PROSPECTS LOOK BRIGHT.

Delegates Greatly Pleased With Outlook for Valley Railway--Hon. Dr. Pugsley's Hospitality.

The Fredericton delegates to Ottawa are more than pleased with their reception at the capital, and are confident that the long talked of St. John Valley railway will soon become a reality. They made their representations to a committee of the council composed of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. William Pugsley and Hon. George P. Graham, who will of course submit a report on the matter to the government. The question will be fully considered in the near future and the reply of the government is expected to be favorable.

All of the delegates speak in glowing terms of the manner in which they were treated at Ottawa. Like all others who visit the capital on government business they were charmed with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his much talked of "sunny ways." Sir Wilfrid talked very frankly with the delegates and assured them that he was impressed with the importance of securing a line of railway down the valley of the St. John. He told the delegates that the committee would submit a report to the government, and the way in which he discussed the matter convinced his hearers that the report would not be an unfavorable one.

The delegates all speak in the highest terms of the hospitality extended to them by Hon. William Pugsley. He was the host at a banquet given in their honor in the House of Commons, and all unhesitatingly pronounce it one of the most elaborate and enjoyable functions they had ever attended in their lives. There were about forty in attendance including six cabinet ministers, and several New Brunswick members of parliament. The Minister of Public Works presided, with President Foster of the St. John Board of Trade and Hon. Mr. Fielding on his right, and Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Minister of Marine, and Mayor Chestnut of Fredericton, on his left. All of the New Brunswick delegates, except Hon. Mr. Fleming, who had returned home, were in attendance.

At the conclusion of a very excellent repast there was a round of toasts and speeches, and the hours passed very pleasantly. A toast to

the St. John Valley railway was proposed by the Minister of Public Works, coupled with the name of Mayor Chestnut, and the last named gentleman made a fitting reply.

The Minister of Public Works was in his best form, and there was nothing in his manner to indicate that he had been the storm centre in parliament during the past week. Some of the speakers took occasion to refer to the fierce attacks made upon the Minister by his opponents, and in replying to the toast to his health he made a casual mention of the matter. He gave them to understand that it was all part of the game of politics. He had received some hard knocks from his political enemies in the past, but had triumphed over them in the end, and he was not worrying a great deal over the outcome of the little unpleasantness which had lately been stirred up around him. The Minister performed the pleasant duty of toast master during the evening, and had no difficulty in making all his guests feel thoroughly at home. The dinner lasted until eleven o'clock.

The New Brunswick delegates had the good fortune to be in the gallery of the House of Commons last Thursday evening and listened to the stormy debate on the Mayes' affidavit resolution. One delegate in speaking of the matter, says that the Minister made one of the best speeches of his life, and completely demolished the arguments of his opponents. He added that it seemed as if the opposition members from other provinces were not inclined to mix up in the debate, as they practically left Dr. Daniel and Mr. Crockett to fight the matter out. Everybody appeared to feel sorry for the brace of Tory members from this province when the debate was brought to a close, and they had the appearance of men who had been "gold bricked."

"Regardless of what his opponents may say of him," said one delegate to the Herald, "the fact remains that Dr. Pugsley is a big man at Ottawa, and his great ability is recognized by both sides of the House, and I don't believe that there is another Minister as popular with the officials of his department."

CORNER IN WHEAT.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—(Special)—Representative Scott of Kansas, has a plan to break the Patten Corner by placing wheat temporarily on the free list, and thus enable the Canadian grain dealers and farmers to sell their wheat in this country.

"The most effective way to put Patten and his crowd out of business, would be to throw open our markets to Canadian wheat until the middle of July," said Scott.

"With the tariff barrier removed Canadian wheat would come into this country in such volume that within twenty-four hours, Patten would throw up his hands."

He will bring the matter before Congress committee.

AGAINST PROHIBITION.

N. S. Legislature Bows Out Resolution by Large Majority.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 19.—The prohibition resolution introduced in the provincial legislature ten days ago, and which has been the subject of almost continuous debate since, was put to vote this afternoon and lost, 23 to 8. The five members of the opposition voted for the resolution and three members of the government came over, making eight all told.

The resolution not only asked for a local prohibitory law but that the machinery for its enforcement be enacted and that the federal government be memorialized to amend its legislation to prevent the importation of liquor in the province.

THE MURDER TRIAL.

Case of Murray and the Haines Goes to the Grand Jury--Great Array of Counsel.

ANDOVER, N. B., April 20.—Weaver, J. W. McPhail, Alexander (Special)—Once again the Green murder case is before the public's eye, and once again it promises to draw unusual interest, probably more than was shown during the last trial.

Judge McLeod opened the Supreme court at eleven o'clock. Sandy Murray, James and Andrew Hatch will be tried as accessories before the fact in the murder of Green.

For the first time in the history of the trial the court room was not crowded.

The defense has lined up a splendid array of counsel, consisting of F. B. Carvell, K.C., Hon. H. A. McKeown, K.C., and W. P. Jones, K.C., and Solicitor General McLeod and T. J. Carter appear for the Crown.

Solicitor McLeod asked that the convicted prisoners be sent before the grand jury, and His Honor granted the request.

THE LATE T. H. RICKARD

Further Particulars of the Death of Well Known Gibson Resident.

The sudden and unexpected death of Mr. T. H. Rickard of Gibson, occurred at the Brooklyn Methodist Hospital on April 17th at 10 a. m. Mr. Rickard had been a sufferer for more than a year and a half and after consulting many physicians here, he finally went to New York to seek relief at the hands of a specialist. An operation was performed on Monday, April 12th, and was successful, but on Friday he had a touch of paralysis of the intestines and Saturday morning the end came. His son, Rev. J. H. E. Rickard and wife were constantly at his side, and his daughter was also with him when death came.

The late Mr. Rickard was born in Cornwall, Eng., fifty-seven years ago. He came to this country thirty-seven years ago. The last twenty-eight years were spent at his late residence in Gibson.

Besides a wife to mourn the sad loss of a kind husband and indulgent parent, there are three daughters, Miss Susan E., of Waltham, Mass., Mrs. Charles Ross and Miss Florence at home.

The sons, who shall act as pall bearers are: W. W. D., George T. Tippet, Frank, Harold and Rev. J. H. E. Rickard, Ph. D. of Troy, N. Y.

Rev. Mr. Stebbins of Gibson, will conduct the funeral services Wednesday morning at 10 a. m. at his late residence, Gibson. Interment will be made in the family lot at Marysville.

FAVORS TOBACCO DAM.

Would Put Restrictions in that Company Must Put Up Deposit.

Perth, N. B., April 19.—At a meeting held in Union Hall here tonight, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas legislation is being sought at Fredericton authorizing the formation of a company with the avowed object of building a dam across the Tobique river at "The Narrows," and erecting a pulp and paper mill, and

Whereas, such legislation is being opposed by representatives of the Tobique Salmon Club and certain lumber operators on the Tobique river, and

Whereas, this meeting is of opinion that the natural resources of the country should not be tied up for the purpose of perpetuating the present methods of manufacturing lumber exclusively, and

Whereas, this meeting is of the further opinion that the valuable franchise applied for should not be granted without a substantial guarantee that it is sought for immediate use and not for speculative purposes; therefore

Resolved, that we favor the enactment of the legislation applied for with a condition incorporated therein that the applicants deposit with the provincial secretary a sum of not less than \$5,000 to be forfeited to the crown in case the work be not commenced within one year, the dam is not erected and pulp and paper mills built and in operation within three years from the enactment of the legislation sought for. THE MEDICELL BILL.

Objects of Important Measure Presented to Legislature.

The Medical Society have sent a circular to the members of the Legislature explaining the principal provisions of the bill. Among other things it recites the objects of the bill as follows:

To rearrange and simplify the old Act, cutting out unnecessary sections and setting out its provisions under appropriate headings.

To provide that all members of the Council shall be selected by the Medical Society, as is done generally in other Provinces of the Dominion.

To vest the right of appeal in matters coming before the Council in a Justice of the Supreme Court instead of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council.

To provide for perpetual regulation as a physician on payment of a fee of \$20.00.

To permit non-residents to practice in this Province if otherwise duly qualified under the Act.

To provide for reciprocal registration with the United Kingdom, so that registered physicians from the United Kingdom may be admitted to practice in this Province if similar privileges are accorded to our physicians.

To provide for the publication of Medical Register in a pamphlet similar to that issued by the Medical Councils in the other Provinces of the Dominion.

To provide that no optician or fitter of spectacles shall use or apply any powerful or paralyzing drug unless under the direction of a duly qualified practitioner.

Strong opposition, has been raised to section 40 of the Bill, providing that no one who is not registered as a physician shall practice or profess to practice medicine, or treat or attempt to cure or alleviate any ailment or infirmity for hire, gain or hope of reward unless under the advice or by the direction of a duly qualified practitioner.

The present Medical Bill does not raise the requirements for registration as a physician. The qualifications provided for in Sec. 13 of the old Act, enacted in 1895, are practically re-enacted in the present Bill. But it is asked, and section 40 of the Bill is intended to provide, that the present moderate requirements shall apply to all who profess to treat and cure human ailments and diseases.

Finally, while the regular physicians of this Province stand solidly in favor of section 40 of the Bill now before the House of Assembly, as they believe it is in the best interests of the public, they recognize the strong opposition that has been aroused to it, and they are willing, if necessary, in order to pass the remainder of the Bill, to withdraw section 40 and re-enact section 32 of the old Act, thereby leaving the law unchanged in this respect.

Section 32 in the old Act reads: "If any person not registered or licensed under this chapter, or not being actually employed as a physician or surgeon in His Majesty's naval or military service, practices physic, surgery or midwifery for hire, gain or hope of reward, he shall thereby forfeit a sum of twenty dollars for each day upon which he so practices."
