ST. JOHN'S NEW MEMBER.

Referring to Mr. Bentley, who was elected to the legislature for St. John County on Tuesday the Truro News, a non-partisan paper, says:

"A. F. Bentley, the Liberal candidate in St. John County, who was elected in the Provincial contest on Tuesday, the 20th, is almost a native of Colchester."

When quite young he removed with his father, Noah Bentley, Esq., Picton County, to Upper Five Islands, and lived there for many years.

He finally removed to St. Martins, N. B., where he has had great success as a lumber dealer.

The old stock of Bentleys were all Conservatives, but "A. F." strayed from the time-honored fold, and cast his lot in with the New Brunswick Liberals.

An out and out Tory from Five Islands, who is beside us as we write says he knows Mr. Bentley well and a more honorable, upright or fairer man could not be found anywhere; and any political party might feel honored to have such a man attached to it. He would trust A. F. Bentley to do right no matter what the political party exigency."

CURRENT COMMENT

The total assets of the Chartered Banks of Canada on June 30th was \$1,053,271,919. This is certainly Canada's growing time.

Col. Sam Hughes M. P., was the only Tory member of the Dominion Parliament who was able to size up the Ross rifle correctly.

It looks as if the Canadian marksmen at Bisley would have to charter a special steamer to bring home the silverware they have won.

The Great Northern Railway leads all railways of America in increased traffic earnings for June, the total being \$980,571. The Canadian Pacific came next with \$896,000. The Canada Northern, was thirteenth and the Grand Trunk fourteenth.

Deposits in the chartered banks of Canada, which reflect the prosperity of the country, have reached the enormous total of \$681,658,000. Current loans in Canada now amount to \$535,212,269, and the banks have call loans outside of Canada totalling \$115,254,868. The deposits on June 30th amounted to \$226,480,468, and the note circulation was \$70,170,491.

Sackville Tribune.—Yesterday's St. John Standard, referring to the result of the bye-election in St. John County, asserted that the provincial government is gaining ground. Mr. Hazen has gained ground in Northumberland county in a remarkable way—by losing a seat; in Carleton County—by losing a seat; in St. John County—by failing to capture a seat which the Standard, on the day before the election, itself declared was certain to be won by the Conservative candidate. The Standard's case is indeed a sad one.

Mr. Wilbert McIntyre, M. P. for Strathcona, who died on Wednesday, was first elected to the House of Commons in 1905 on the retirement of Peter Talbot, the former member, to the Senate. He had been president of the Strathcona Board of Trade and was president of the Northern Alberta Medical Association. A son of John McIntyre, Scotch, and Ann Unphrey, Canadian, he was born at Rosedale, Victoria County, Ont., in 1867. He was educated at Owen Sound Collegiate and at Toronto University, where he took the M. A. degree and shortly after went out to establish himself in the west. In 1908 he married Mary J. Harkley, of Owen Sound. He was a Presbyterian and a Liberal. His majority at the last election was 1100.

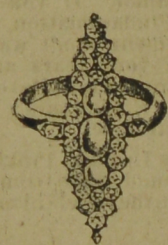

Canon Bull Dead.

Hamilton, July 22.—Rev. Canon George A. Bull, 265 South Bay street, aged 83, died suddenly last evening. He fell in a faint at the corner of Hess street and Charlton avenue and expired in a few minutes. He was born in Dublin, but came to Canada when an infant. His ordination took place at St. Catharines, and afterwards he was rector of the Barton and Glanford churches for 30 years. For several years he was rector also of Stamford and Lundy Lane, retiring several years ago. A widow, two sons and six daughters survive.

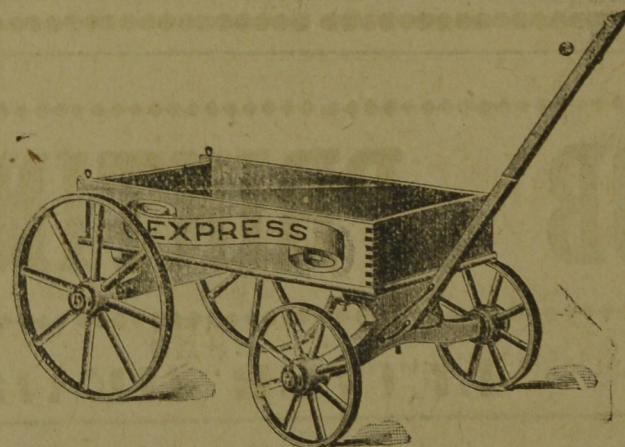
