OUR CRACK MARKSMEN,

Canadians Nobly Upholding The Honor of
Their Country at Bisley.

BISLEY CAMP, July 22.—There will be sixteen Canadians in the second stage of the King's prize. This morning five shot off for places with ninety-five others and four won. Bayles was the only Canadian who failed to qualify.

The Canadians who shoot in the second stage tomorrow are: A. Sprinks, Freeborn, Huggins, Mitchell Morris, Russell, Jones, Marsdon, McVittie, Creighton, Stack, McInnis, Kelly, Sgt. Smith Gougeon, Blackburn.

Bayles was 303rd and won forty shillings. He missed making the second stage by three places.

In the shoot-off for the first prize in the first stage of the King's, Pte. McCue, of the 97th Arzyle, won with 12. The score made by Corp. A. A. Sprinks, Canadian, was 10.

Last year twelve Canadians fired in the second stage and of these seven got into the finals.

CANADIANS' GREAT WORK.

Out of the sixteen competitions in which colonials took part this year the mother country has won eight. Canada has won seven and Australia one.

When it is considered that there are only twenty-five Canadians shooting against more than 3,000 of the Mother Country this is a good record for the Canadians. True, these twenty-five are picked shots, but they are picked from less than 500 shooting at the D. R. A. so that a huge advantage is still with the Mother Country.

Several of the Canadians competed in the Barlow match, but the only one to get into the prize list was

Blackburn, who was 75th, winning twenty shillings.

The Barlow is in two stages. The first stage is sharp shooting, five shots at 200 yards, the target appearing for three seconds each time, rapid first at 500 yards, the target being visible for 15 seconds and as many shots are fired as there is time for. The second stage is attack and observation of fire, three rounds at 400, 300 and 200 yards.

ST. GEORGE'S VASE SCORE.

The first stage of the match for the St. George vase was fired today. This match is seven shots at 500 and 600 yards in the first stage and the second stage is fifteen shots at 300 yards. Only the first 100 in the first stage are qualified to shoot in the final stage.

In the Imperial Tobacco match the Canadian winners were: Blackburn 10th, 66 shillings; Mitchell, 32nd, 40 shillings; Kelly, 43rd, 40 shillings.

Freeborn, for the highest aggregate in the Canadian team wins the Canadian Club gold watch. Mitchell, who was second, gets the Strathcona cup. At the Canadian garden party which was largely attended, were Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Hon. Sir Frederick Borden, Colonel Sherwood and Lord Strathcona. The latter presented the prizes to Freeborn and Mitchell. He congratulated the team on its splendid success to which Lt. Col. Bertam, commandant of the team, briefly replied.

The Canadians who got into the second stage of the St. George's are: Freeborn, 67; Huggins, 66; McVittie, 66; Mitchell 66; Richardson, 67; Lt. Stack, 66.

Huge Telephone merger.

New York, July 22.—A formal offer to purchase the stock of the Bell Telephone Co. of Buffalo was made yesterday by the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. This is regarded here as another step in the recently announced plan for merging all the Bell companies in the country into a single corporation representing nearly \$1,000,000,000 capital. Stockholders in the Buffalo company will receive two shares of American stock for every three of their own, the adjustment being on a basis of \$96 per share for the Buffalo stock and \$1,555 for the American.

Mail Robber Identified.

Toronto, July 22.—Alex. Farrowitz, arrested two weeks ago by Detective Sockett, charged with forgery of a check which he is also believed to have stolen from the mails, has been identified by the New York and Philadelphia police as Henry Cohen, alias Alex. Bloom. He is even now on bail from the New York police court upon a charge of larceny in May. He also served a term there for a letter box theft. He has served five years in Philadelphia for forgery of a check which he stole in the mails and for which he was convicted in 1903.

Florence, July 22.—The infant son of Rev. C. M. Farney, rector of St. Matthew's Church here, was drowned yesterday morning.

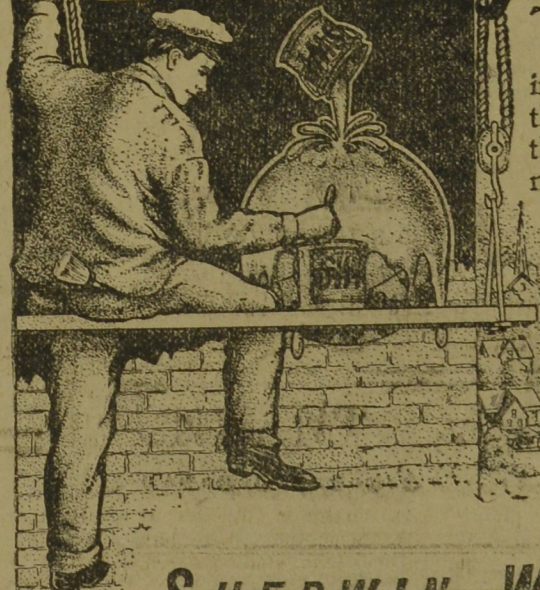
