

PRINCE RUPERT LOTS.

The Auction Sale was a Great Success.

VANCOUVER, B.C., May 26.—The auction sale of lots in the new town site of Prince Rupert, the Grand Trunk terminal, opened Tuesday morning. Two thousand buyers attended. Bidding for lots in the business section was brisk, and high prices were realized. Buyers were present from Vancouver to Vienna, Austria. Among the buyers were Messrs. W. A. McDonald, representing a local and eastern syndicate; Thorpe Bros., Vienna; Ramsay, Ellenburgh, Wash.; Alderson, Winnipeg; Cordova, Alaska. Public confidence was made strong and criticism silenced by the statement of Land Commissioner Ryley of the Grand Trunk Pacific, and a telegram from General Manager Chamberlain, that the present townsite of Prince Rupert was positively the only terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific, all rumors to the contrary being incorrect.

The opening day's sales netted \$359,670, the number of parcels sold being 319. What was considered the best business corner, McBride and Second street sold for \$16,500—one hundred feet by sixty.

By noon today the sales were well over the half-million mark. Residential lots sold at \$75 to \$90 for a 25-foot lot. In the afternoon the sales returned to the business district. Two blocks at the corner of First avenue and Seventh sold to the Western Lumber Company, Vancouver, for \$11,000. Two corners on McDonald street went for \$8,800 and \$8,750. Large purchases in the residential section of blocks of four to six lots were common.

TORNADO IN SOUTH

Texas and Oklahoma Are Scene of Terrible Devastation.

NORTH DAKOTA IS VISITED

Brownwood, Texas, and Key West and Depew, Okla., Are Stricken and More Than Forty Lose Their Lives.—Eight Deaths Are Also Reported From Prairie State—Houses Are Carried Away.

Brownwood, Texas, May 31.—A tornado wrecked Zephyr, a village in Brown County, early yesterday, killing more than thirty persons, seriously wounding fifty and hurting a score of others. Extreme darkness made the catastrophe awful.

The known dead: C. A. Cabler and wife; County Clerk Thad Cabler, wife and child; Gertrude Houston, Oscar Ware, wife and three children; M. G. Simmons, wife and three children; Mrs. W. A. Ramsay and child; B. F. Brown and wife; Mrs. Tom Hart and child; Gibson Clois.

Among the seriously injured are: Robert Campbell, wife and four children; Dr. Wren and wife; Prof. Cloyes and family, and Capt. Collier and wife.

The storm formed half a mile southwest of Zephyr and swept down on the village, cutting a wide swath directly through the residence and business quarters.

Nearly fifty houses were demolished. Lightning struck a lumber yard and started a fire which destroyed an entire business block. No effort was made to fight the flames as the care of the dead and wounded demanded all attention.

A section hand pumped a handcar to Brownwood and spread the alarm. In two hours the Santa Fe Railroad was speeding a special train to Zephyr with nine surgeons and a score of Brownwood citizens.

Hundreds of persons in the country around Zephyr saved themselves by taking refuge in storm cellars.

The big stone school building and two churches at Zephyr were razed. Daylight found sixteen surgeons working on the wounded. Brownwood hurried her second relief train at noon yesterday, loaded with provisions, clothing and necessities and forty nurses.

Two children were found dead yesterday two miles from Zephyr, having been blown that distance.

While the tornado's path was 300 yards wide, the twister swept the earth for a distance of only about eight miles. Its fury was more terrific than any previous tornado experienced in this region.

When the first relief party reached Zephyr, a desolate scene awaited. The hillsides were covered with debris of all kinds intermingled with bodies of animals and human beings.

The ruins were dimly lighted by burning buildings and the cries of the wounded, rising above the screaming of the dying storm, directed the rescuers in their work.

Human bodies were found twisted about trees and distorted in inconceivable shapes. Survivors, mad with grief and terror, walked the streets almost naked, crying for relatives.

Ruin in Oklahoma.

Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, May 31.—Several persons were killed Saturday night in a tornado which devastated the Oklahoma towns of Key West and Depew. Forty or more are injured.

At least ten negroes were killed in Key West. Five are dead at Depew. The tornado swept over a wide stretch of farming country.

Following the wind came a deluge of rain. Floods then added their terrors to the situation. The wreckage of Key West soon was overwhelmed by the rising waters. Practically nothing was left of the town of 200 inhabitants. Rescuers hastened to the place, but could not cross Salt Creek, which had become a raging torrent.

Depew was destroyed by a double-twister that formed from that striking Key West and which traveled northwest and another coming from the east.

Eight Die in North Dakota.

St. Paul, Minn., May 31.—Special dispatches received here state that seven persons are known to be dead, many are dying and over a score are seriously injured as a result of tornado which swept over northwestern Dakota last Saturday. The storm was especially severe at Langdon where the residence section of the city was practically wiped out, four people killed and twenty injured.

The tornado swept up the James river from Ypsilanti to Jamestown, demolishing farmhouses and destroying much valuable property. The Ypsilanti was blown into the James river and Mrs. Graves and her two young daughters were instantly killed. Two other members of the family were injured.

Cashier Mutilates Record.

Buffalo, N.Y., May 31.—Cashier Jared C. Weed, who has been out on \$10,000 bail, was placed under arrest again last night on the charge of mutilating records in the county treasurer's office. This action was taken after fruitless efforts on the part of the district attorney's office to learn what became of the money Weed withdrew from the bank after his release on bail.

Three Babies' Bodies in Dump Heap.

Palmerston, Ont., May 31.—The bodies of three infants, one of them that of a fully developed babe, were discovered Thursday on the farm of Charles Cosens, just outside the town limits, where they had been dumped with the refuse collected by the scavenging cart.

Services Too Costly.

Kingston, May 31.—Chief Armstrong of Port Arthur and Borland of Woodstock are demanding too high a salary for the local job.

Sends \$13,000 Necklace Here. New York, May 31.—A big French steamer trunk, brought into port by a wealthy Boston woman, has revealed to the customs men, they say, not only \$3,000 worth of smuggled goods, concealed under a false bottom, but also the fact that such trunks are being regularly manufactured by a firm in Paris, "especially for the American trade." The exposure resulted from a search in three trunks brought in by Mrs. Fremont Chesebrough, wife of a rich Bostonian. Among a bundle of bills and invoices was one showing that Mrs. Chesebrough had purchased a necklace costing 90,000 francs (\$18,000). This her husband says is now in Toronto, Canada, awaiting the tariff decision on set pearls. He said that if the duty was reduced from 60 to 10 per cent. he would immediately bring in the jewels.

Double Drowning. Hamilton, May 31.—Harry, McKewen, 478 York street, 25 years of age, and his companion, Abe Millburn, were drowned in the bay Saturday afternoon, while sailing in a gasoline launch.

They went to the beach with David McKewen, 310 North Catherine street, uncle of Harry McKewen. The uncle was in the front of the boat steering and had his back turned to the other two, who were working in the stern, in some way he does not know how both the young men fell out of the boat. The uncle did not know how to manage the boat and drifted about in the bay until he was towed in.

Chauffeur Guilty.

New York, May 31.—Wm. E. Darragh, the chauffeur who ran down and killed Ingeard Trimble, the 11-year-old son of a well-known Kenosha lawyer, in an uptown street on March 27 last, was found guilty of manslaughter in the first degree.

Darragh, who is 21 years old, after his machine had knocked down the boy and crushed him, put on extra speed and fled, leaving his victim to die in the street. He lost his derby hat during his flight and by means of this his identity was established. He was traced to Texas, where his arrest occurred.

Slashes His Throat.

Chatham, May 31.—Responding to a hurried call at 12 o'clock Saturday night, Policemen Dezelia and Dodson found John Halter, aged about 55, in a pool of blood in a ditch near the Brooks Farm, with his throat and both wrists cut.

Halter had a few minutes before wandered into the Paxton farm house nearby, where he turned on the light, selected a butcher knife from the kitchen, and then calmly walked out on the roadside to suicide.

Bush Fire at Kakabeka.

Port William, Ont., May 31.—Fire, which raged all Saturday in the vicinity of Kakabeka, did an immense amount of damage to surrounding country, destroying many beautiful parts of the country.

Mrs. Duval Critically Ill.

Winnipeg, May 31.—Mrs. Duval, wife of Rev. Mr. Duval, moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly, is lying seriously ill at her home here, and little hope is held out for her recovery.

The Quebec Legislature has prorogued after one of the longest and most exciting sessions in years. The members' indemnity was increased to \$1,500.

Three inland revenue officers searching a Detroit produce merchant's store for oleomargarine were mistaken for burglars and narrowly escaped being shot by the police.

May Be Murder.

Regina, Sask., May 31.—A case of alleged poisoning is reported at Hague, Sask., as the result of a post-mortem examination following the exhuming of the body of Mrs. Frank Dyck, who died March 23.

A Boy's Crime.

Berlin, Ont., May 31.—John Bogels, jr., St. Clements, aged 14, was sentenced to one year in Central Prison and to receive six lashes one month after his incarceration for an assault on an 11-year-old girl.

Sutherland Sights for Militia.

Ottawa, May 31.—Militia orders notify all concerned that such units armed with Lee-Enfield rifles are to receive Sutherland rifle sights enough to equip 30 per cent. of establishment.

Slew His Daughter.

Paris, May 29.—David Henderson, believed to be of New York, aged 51, last night shot his daughter dead in a cafe here and then committed suicide. The dead woman's name was Martha. She was 22 years old. With Mr. Henderson in the restaurant were his wife and three daughters and a governess. All had supper together, and the party was most cheerful. At the end of the meal Mr. Henderson rose from the table and fired four shots at random, one of which killed his daughter, Martha. Henderson then turned the weapon upon himself.

Winnipeg Man's Suicide.

Winnipeg, May 31.—Thomas H. Knight, 37 years old, night watchman at the International Harvester Co.'s works, committed suicide Saturday afternoon. He returned from work in the morning and slept till the middle of the afternoon, when, telling his father he was going to cut some wood, he went to the barn and took carbolic acid.

Runner Accidentally Shot.

Pittsburg, May 31.—Poised at the starting point of a foot race, Percy Barber, aged 19, member of the senior class of the Pittsburg Academy, was accidentally shot in the head and probably fatally wounded by Prof. H. B. Fetterman, a member of the faculty of the school, who was acting as starter. Fetterman was taken into custody.

Calgary Real Estate Soars.

Calgary, May 31.—Another large real estate deal was put through yesterday, when the Union Bank purchased two lots on Eighth avenue with thirty-foot frontage, the price paid being \$1,000 a foot. Less than four years ago these lots were sold for \$20,000.

SETS NEW RECORD

Count Zeppelin Drives Airship a Distance of 456 Miles.

BIG CROWDS WATCH HIM

With a Crew of Seven Men and Two Engineers Abroad German Aeronautes Goes For 22 Hours and According to Latest Advices Is Still in the Air Traveling South—A Wonderful Flight.

Berlin, May 31.—Count Zeppelin, whose remarkable performance in his first airship brought unbounded honors to the inventor, yesterday accomplished the most striking feat in his career. He guided his Zeppelin II, from Friedrichshafen to Bitterfeld, a distance of more than 456 miles, without landing. The journey lasted nearly 22 hours, and as far as is known Count Zeppelin is still in the air, on the return journey to Friedrichshafen. He had already beaten all records for dirigible balloons, with the opportunity of greatly improving the performance.

It was announced and widely distributed in special editions of the newspapers that the count would come to Berlin and land at the Temple of Parade Grounds. Hundreds of thousands gathered there Friday afternoon.

The Emperor and Empress, several of the princes and the leading military officials were present. Toward evening searchlights were set to work, in anticipation of the approach of the airship. Soldiers kept an enormous space cleared until half-past ten o'clock, when a despatch from Bitterfeld announced that the airship was returning to the starting point at Friedrichshafen, which caused the most intense disappointment.

Count Zeppelin, who personally was in charge of the airship and whose hand was on the tiller during the greater part of the journey, had not allowed a word to be made public relative to his intention to undertake an endurance trip.

The voyage began under rather unfavorable conditions. There was a lowering sky, rain clouds and a strong side wind when the airship left the floating hall shortly after 9 o'clock Friday night. The residents did not pay much attention to this, as they were accustomed to night flights.

Awakened by Fire.

Brantford, May 31.—Fire early yesterday morning destroyed the handsome residence of Isaac Rosenfeld. The family almost perished in the flames. One of the sleepers was first disturbed and was able to get to the telephone to send in the alarm. On his return the others, including children, had barely time to get out. The origin of the fire is unknown. Loss \$2,000.
