BISHOP'S TRIP WEST

His Lordship, Bishop Richards, who is to visit British Columbia in the interest of missions in the Canadian west, will leave on next Wednesday for Winnipeg, en route to the coast. His Lordship will preach in Winnipeg on Sunday Jan. 21, and address a meeting on the following day journey on Tuesday and arriving in Vancouver before Sunday Jan. 31. His stay in British Columbia will be limited to a few days, during which he will address several important meetings. On his return east it is probable that he will spend a day in Montreal on Feb. 10, and visit Lennoxville, arriving home on Feb. 12 or 13.

BUSINESS IS BRISK.

Col. Marsh has Sixteen County Scott Act Cases to Deal With.

Scott Act Inspector McFarlane, who has been taking things rather easy since his appointment one year ago, recently bestirred himself and lodged sixteen informations with Col. Marsh for Scott Act violation against parties residing in the parishes of St. Mary's, Kingsclear, Southampton, McAdam and Canterbury. The cases were set down for trial at the police court this morning, with the result that five cases, all for first offences, were acknowledged. The others are contested, and it will likely take the court a week to dispose of them. Inspector McFarlane appears for the prosecution, and the several defendants are represented by Messrs. J. H. Barry, R. W. McLellan and R. B. Hanson.

Mr. John R. Monteith of St. Mary's, acknowledged two first offences and was fined \$100 and costs. Mr. Thomas Raligan, of McAdam, acknowledged three first offences, and will be called upon to pay \$150 and costs.

The case against Ms. Frank Flemming of Millville, was the first taken up for trial. The principal witness for the prosecution was Mr. Robert M. Belyea, alias Ralph Brown, a young man who for several weeks has been employed as a spotter by Inspector McFarlane. He swore that he visited Flemming's place on January 2nd, and purchased a glass of liquor from his wife. He was sharply cross examined by Mr. McLellan, but stuck to his story. He was still on the stand when the court adjourned at noon.

Brown, who has been working in conjunction with another spotter, who was given the city to operate in, is said to be the principal witness for the prosecution in all of the cases.

Lossing relates that in 1848 he met at Oswego, N. Y., Major Cochran, then nearly eighty years old, a son-in-law of General Philip Schuyler, who told the story of his election to congress during the administration of the elder Adams. A vessel was to be launched on one of the lakes in interior New York, and people came from afar to see it. The young folks gathered there, determined to have a dance at night. There was a fiddle, but no fiddler. Young Cochran was an amateur performer, and his services were demanded. He gratified the joyous company, and at the supper table one of the gentlemen remarked, in commendation of his talents, that he was "fished for congress." The matter was talked up, and he was nominated and elected a representative in congress for the district then comprising the whole of New York west of Schenectady. He always claimed to have "fished himself into congress."
