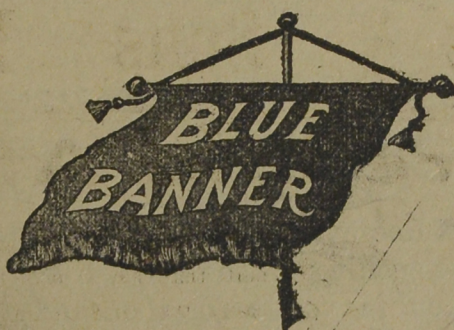

**TELLS OF MURDER**

Chinaman's Room Mate Tells How Teacher Was Slain.

**DRUGGED AND STRANGLED**

Chong Sing Breaks Down Under Third Degree and Describes Going Into Room Where the Murdered Girl's Body Lay and Finding That It Was Still Warm—Leon Is Still at Liberty.

New York, June 23.—Bullied and intimidated by detectives, threatened with prosecution and confused with a rapid fire of questions, Chong Sing, one time room-mate of Leon Ling, told yesterday afternoon of the murder of Miss Sigel, Ling's Sunday school teacher in New York. Under the terrific pressure of the third degree, the little Chinaman admitted that he had seen the body in Leon Ling's room over the Eighth Avenue chop suey restaurant, and that he had touched it while it was still warm; that he had smelled drugs, and had watched Leon Ling's preparations for placing the body in the trunk, where it was found horribly decomposed on Friday night last.

Chong Sing, in fact, what was learned at the criminal courts yesterday is a correct, described almost everything concerning the murder of the girl except the actual commission of the crime. He denied any implication in it, and protested stoutly that he was ignorant of the whereabouts of Leon Ling, the supposed murderer.

All day he was bullied, persuaded and entangled in a mass of questions by the detectives and lawyers, but it was not till late in the afternoon that he broke down and told what he knew of the young missionary's death. He was told that Leon Ling had been captured and had laid the blame upon his (Chong Sing's) shoulders. This, together with the persistent hammering at the prisoner, brought the confession.

From the man's story it is apparent that Miss Sigel was first drugged with chloroform and then choked to death. She was killed apparently on the night of June 9, although Chong Sing appeared a little mixed in his dates. But he says that early in the morning of June 19 he heard, a strange noise in Leon's room adjoining his, and, looking over the transom, saw the girl lying on the bed with a bloody towel over her mouth. He passed through the room to go out to wash his hands and as he did so felt the body, which was still warm. Afterwards he went down to the chop suey restaurant below, then returned to the room. Leon in the meantime had covered the body with a blanket up to the chin and had pulled a trunk to the middle of the floor. This trunk, Leon was calmly emptying preparatory to placing the body therein. The rope with which the body was bound was lying on the floor at the time, according to Chong Sing. Once again he went downstairs, said Chong Sing, where he remained until Leon called him. When he entered the room the body was not visible, having been bound with rope and placed in the trunk.

**Killed at Cobalt.**

Cobalt, June 23.—Harry Davis, a teamster, was killed yesterday morning at Badger mine. Davis was assisting in repairing a cage when he was caught and jammed. Deceased was a native of Greenview, Hastings county, aged 34. His wife died about a year ago, leaving four small children, who were with Davis. His mother lives at Greenview, where the body will be sent. Three brothers live in camp, two of them employed in the Coniag mine.

**The Cretan Situation.**

London, June 23.—It was officially announced here yesterday that when the international troops are withdrawn from the Island of Crete at the end of July, foreign guardships will be stationed in Cretan waters to protect the Turkish flag, which is the only emblem of Turkish sovereignty now remaining, and to assure the maintenance of tranquility and the protection of Mussulmans.

**Daring Bank Robbery.**

Ithaca, N.Y., June 23.—Burglars blew up the safe in the Citizens' National Bank at Locke, 20 miles north, at one o'clock yesterday morning and got \$2,700, most of which was in \$5 bills. They overlooked about \$5,000 in gold. There were four men in the band and holding the citizens who were aroused by the explosion at bay they escaped across country.

**May Be New Senator.**

Montreal, June 23.—It is believed here in the best informed circles that the vacancy in the Senate caused by the death of the Hon. Rosaire Thibault will go to Arthur Boyer, one of the most highly polished gentlemen in the province, ex-M.P.P. for Jacques Cartier and a Minister without portfolio in the Mercier Cabinet.

**Woman's Record Ride.**

Rochester, June 23.—Mrs. Herbert Wadsworth, of Avon, a leader in Washington society and a friend of Theodore Roosevelt, rode 159 miles on horseback in 16 hours yesterday, breaking the record of Mr. Roosevelt and the officers who accompanied him when he made about 120 miles in a day.

**Wheat is Flourishing.**

Winnipeg, June 23.—Crop reports received by the C.P.R. yesterday are said to be the best sent in this season. Wheat everywhere almost is flourishing, and in some places is up twenty inches.

**Killed by a Street Car.**

Winnipeg, June 23.—Thomas Young was struck by a street car Monday evening and so seriously injured that he died yesterday. An inquest is being held.

**May Go to Privy Council.**

Montreal, June 23.—Armand Lavergne, M.P.P., stated yesterday that, if necessary, the Jules Fournier case will be appealed to the Privy Council. He claims there is no contempt of court in the article that caused the arrest, as the court had ceased sitting.

**Alfonso Father of a Girl.**

La-Granja, Spain, June 23.—Queen Victoria gave birth to a daughter at 8.25 a.m. yesterday.

Her first two children are boys, Prince Alfonso, born May 16, 1907, and Prince Jaime, born June 28, 1908. The royal couple hoped for a girl.

**Laundry Licenses Go Up.**

Kingston, June 23.—The General Hospital will erect two cottages for cases of tuberculosis patients.

In order to keep Chinamen under control, the City Council will make the laundry license \$50 and \$25 for a transfer of business.

The Company will make application for exemption from water rates, sewerage rate and taxation generally for a term of five years, renewable for a further term of five years, and a loan of three thousand five hundred dollars, repayable in instalments of five hundred dollars annually without interest, the first instalment to be paid five years after the loan is made.
