

## MOWED DOWN REBELS.

### Many Dead in Awful Slaughter of Revolution at Barcelona.

Madrid, July 30.—It was officially announced last night that the cavalry engaged at Barcelona succeeded yesterday in driving into St. Martin square the principal bands of revolutionists, against whom the artillery opened fire, causing great losses. The survivors surrendered.

The official statement further says that it now remains only to master small groups of revolutionists in the villages in the vicinity of Barcelona.

In the vicinity of Barcelona, according to official sources, the revolution has been checked, but at a great sacrifice of life. After fighting desperately and successfully for a long time behind barricades, the principal mobs were gradually driven to St. Martin square, where they found themselves entrapped. Heavy detachments of artillerymen came up and surrounded them. The artillery immediately opened fire, mowing down the revolutionists, who sought to escape, but were met at every point with shot and shell. Those of the insurgents who were not killed or seriously injured threw down their arms and surrendered.

The insurrection continues in the neighboring villages, whither the troops are proceeding. The commanders of the soldiers are under orders to spare none who attempt to resist.

Spain is rent by two fears—the fate of the army in Morocco and the situation in the Mediterranean provinces in Catalonia. In the outskirts of Melilla the Spanish arms have suffered a serious check. Three thousand soldiers have either been slain or wounded, and the Moorish hordes are fighting at the very walls of the city itself.

News from Barcelona, the centre of the revolutionary outbreak, is exceedingly vague and unsatisfactory. From Lisbon comes the report that the revolutionists are using bombs and that 100 persons were killed and 200 wounded during the earlier stages of the conflicts.

Premier Maura's announcement that the situation in Barcelona showed a little improvement and word from Melilla that the Moors were retreating from Mount Buruga, only slightly appeases the general inquietude. The Moorish forces, however, have been strengthened by the arrival of 5,000 additional tribesmen, and the official judgment that 75,000 Spanish troops are needed to overcome the tribesmen would indicate that the Melilla army of Spain is in some straits.

A Moorish army is marching to Alpuemas, and a warship has been hurriedly despatched from Melilla to aid the garrison there.

The report that a provisional government has been established at Bar-

celona and a civil governor has been assassinated has not been confirmed, but it is persistently rumored that Premier Maura would resign and that a military dictatorship will be set up in Madrid.

#### IS THRONE IN DANGER.

London, July 30.—With a hostile demonstration against King Alfonso outside the royal palace in Madrid, and a report that a provincial government had been set up by the revolutionists in Barcelona, the news from Spain is arousing the gravest apprehensions for the future of the Spanish monarchy.

A correspondent at San Sebastian who saw the king leave for Madrid, says His Majesty was looking careworn, and even in court circles the possibility of danger to the throne is admitted unless the strongest measures are taken.

The latest news from Barcelona indicates that the government has not yet succeeded in quelling the insurrection, and shooting, rioting and incendiarism still continue. Catalonian blood is up, says a Barcelona letter mailed on Monday, and a Saragossa correspondent, writing the following day, says:

"In Barcelona the feature of the riots have been the fury of the women. They pelted the civil guards with stones and led the disturbances which ended in the furious fighting with the troops and police. Lack of discipline, not to say mutiny, is rife in the ranks of the army."

A special despatch from Madrid says that there is a persistent report in Carlist quarters that Don Jaime, the pretender, is about to issue an address to the powers and manifesto to the Spanish people, maintaining his claim to the Spanish throne.

#### EXPERT FRENCH OPINION.

Paris, July 30.—French army officers familiar with the topography of the Rif country consider that the official report of the Spanish defeat by the Moors at Melilla spells a complete disaster, and they would not be surprised if the next news told is the fall of the city. They

point out that the tribesmen evidently succeeded in their tactics, which they twice tried unsuccessfully, of descending from Mount Gurugua and which was four miles long, extending from the land forts at Melilla to the extreme left at Mount Atlayou, cutting in half the Spanish front, a promontory on the shore of the Marchia Lagoon. The Spanish left probably was cut off without communication, while the main body, with the fifth effective, went on fighting the battle with desperation under the walls of the city.

## KILLED BY HORSE

London Township Woman Meets Tragic Death.

### NEIGHBORS FEEL BITTER

Feeling Arising Out of Fact That Mrs. Martin Jenkins and Husband Lived Apart Has Resulted In an Inquest Into Her Death—Found With Crushed Skull In a Stable—Kicked by Vicious Horse?

London, Aug. 2.—The mysterious death of Mrs. Martin Jenkins of London Township has convulsed the whole neighborhood. Excitement is intense and the sole topic of discussion is the mysterious death.

The coroner's jury after viewing the remains Saturday night adjourned until Tuesday night when all available evidence will be heard.

On Friday morning the husband, James C. Jenkins, hurriedly despatched two of his sons to neighbors' houses with the news that Mrs. Jenkins had been kicked by a horse and was dying. Mrs. Morrow and Wm. McNaughton, the neighbors summoned, hurried to the scene, and when they arrived found the woman lying in one of the stalls in the stable unconscious. Her head was battered and bruised, and she died within an hour. Just beyond the stalls there is a box stall in which a stallion is kept. The door of this was open and the stallion was found in the barn yard. There were horses in the other stalls.

Dr. McNeil of Arva was summoned but the woman was dead when he arrived.

Dr. McNeil is the coroner and in consequence of the rumors afloat in the neighborhood, he ordered an inquest, but after consultation with the legal authorities decided to call on Dr. Ferguson to conduct the investigation. Upon the facts being laid before Crown Attorney McKillopin he ordered an inquest, which opened on Saturday night.

The story told by the husband is that he was in a field near the barn and noticed the stallion in the barn yard. He drove it into the barn and there found his wife lying on the floor with her head smashed in.

The woman was carried into the house, where she died soon afterward. The family moved from Westminster Township six years ago, and there are six children.

The funeral of Mrs. Jenkins was held yesterday, and was an immense one. The services were conducted by Rev. John Mahan of Arva, assisted by Rev. E. L. Hutton of London.

In the neighborhood of the tragedy there appears to be considerable ill-feeling towards Jenkins, though apparently with little real grounds. Jenkins is about 55 years of age, and the deceased, who was his second wife, was 42. They have not always lived happily together, having been living separately for about a year. The farm is well tilled and is about seven miles from London.

Various theories are advanced as to how the woman met death. When found she was lying in the middle stall with her head in the passage leading to the box stall in which the stallion was kept. The most likely accidental theory is that the door of the box stall was left open or loose and that the stallion broke out while the woman was in the barn gathering eggs and knocking her down, crushed out her life. The left side of the skull was caved in and the scalp badly torn. There were also wounds on the left eye and on the top and back of the head. The injuries were more than sufficient to cause death.

#### Campaign by Trolley.

Boston, Aug. 2.—A four week's tour of Massachusetts by trolley is planned by the Votes for Women committee of Massachusetts Suffrage Association to begin early Monday morning next. Meetings are to be held out of doors in all cases unless weather conditions are unfavorable.

#### Large Hailstones.

Morden, Man., Aug. 2.—A hail storm on Friday wiped out an area six miles wide extending to the boundary. Hailstones were reported to be seven inches in diameter. Some were picked up one hour after the storm one inch in diameter.

#### Turret Bell Is Raised.

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Aug. 2.—The freight steamer Turret Bell, stranded three years ago, on the north side of the island during a big gale, which wrecked several other vessels, was towed into this port yesterday afternoon.

#### Vice-Consul Is Murdered.

New York, Aug. 2.—Dr. Luke Wing, Chinese vice-consul at New York, a graduate of Lehigh and Yale Universities, and married to an American woman, was mortally wounded at his offices in a lower Broadway building Saturday afternoon by a man of his own race, who gives valuable but confused and contradictory reports of himself in pigeon English.

Dr. Wing died last night in St. Gregory's Hospital shortly after 8 o'clock. He had been shot in the back with a revolver.

Michael McDonnell, for 27 years special watchman at the Chinese consulate, identified the murderer as Wong Bow Chung, who, he says, was formerly a steward on the U. S. battleship Indiana.

#### Makes a Hero by Surgery.

Paris, Aug. 2.—Such emotions as fear and melancholy are conveyed by a small nerve which springs from the human brain near the medulla oblongata, the top of the spinal cord.

So announces Dr. Bonnier, a distinguished surgeon, who adds that he has removed this nerve and so relieved greatly persons suffering from melancholia and timidity.

Saturday evening his family missed him and after a search his son found him dead hanging to a tree a short distance from the house. He came here from Drayton.

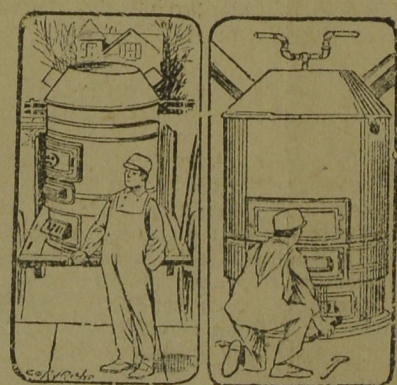
Despondency is given as the cause of the rash act. He leaves a widow and one son.
