ROGHMOND TO HANG.

Negro Murderer Gets Full Penalty For Fiendish Crime.

Stratford, May 6.—Frank Roghmond, negro, was yesterday found guilty of murdering Mrs. Mary Peake at her home in the Township of Downie on Sept. 30 last. Last night he was sentenced by Justice Riddell to be hanged on June 23 next.

Roghmond was found apparently asleep in the cellar of the Peake home beside the dead body of Mrs. Peake by one of the sons, who had come in from the fields for a drink. Circumstances indicated that an outrage had been committed and medical evidence went to show that death was the result of physical and mental shock and that the woman had been roughly used.

Justice Riddell in his charge to the jury commented strongly on the nature of the crime and the complete character of the evidence advanced.

Aloysius Guerin was found guilty of manslaughter shortly before midnight. The case was one in which Alexander Sutherland of West Zorra was found dead at the rear door of Guerin's house in February last. Justice Riddell will impose sentence to-day.

It is perhaps unprecedented that two such serious cases have been disposed of in one day in the same court. Justice Riddell has imposed the death sentence three times within about six months.

KIMBALL CONVICTED

Leamington Police Chief Guilty of Manslaughter.

TO BE SENTENCED TO-DAY

Man Who Shot W. J. Healy While Trying to Arrest Him Is Convicted After Two and a Half Hours—Two Many Ontario Constables Carry Firearms, Declares the Crown Attorney Yesterday.

Chatham, May 6.—Elliott J. Kimball, chief of police at Leamington, was last night convicted of manslaughter. The jury were out two and a half hours. He will be sentenced to-day.

It was admitted that Kimball had shot W. J. Healy in Tilbury while the latter was attempting to escape from custody. It was merely a question of whether the prisoner was guilty of negligence in the handling of firearms. The crown relied upon certain statements made by Kimball after the shooting, such as "He was getting away and no constable likes to go after a man and be fooled." The defence was pure accident.

In the examination of Smith, the chief at Tilbury, Justice Teetzel made some pointed remarks. Smith said he carried a club and a loaded revolver for his own protection.

His lordship: "Do you carry it to wing prisoners who are getting away?"

Witness: "No." His lordship: "Well, you had better get that out of your head if you do. What right have you to carry a gun?" Witness: "It is in the constable's guide book. The town clerk also said I had a right to carry one."

O. L. Lewis, K.C., Kimball's counsel, said that all constables in western Ontario carried weapons and the Justice said: "Well, they don't in many cities."

In his address to the jury, W. J. Hanna, K.C., for the crown said: "There are too many constables like this man going around the country with a gun in one pocket and a cudgel in the other. We don't wish to turn such men loose in the community. It will do constables good to punish this one and will show them that they have no right to pull their guns upon such a slight pretence."

His lordship pointed out that a policeman has no right to shoot an escaping prisoner. He had the right to carry weapons to defend himself, but he was not warranted in killing a man. He could use violence for defence or to subdue and prevent a man from breaking away, but had no right to shoot at a prisoner once he got away. "No policeman is warranted in killing another man unless it is undoubtedly sure that it is necessary in saving his own life or the life of some one else whom it is his duty to protect," said his lordship.

Where Is Crew?

Kingston, St. Vincent, B.W.I., May 6.—It may be that Capt. Collin Stephenson and the crew of the American whaling ship Carrie D. Knowles, long since thought to have been lost at sea, are still alive in Venezuelan prison. An American seaman, who escapes the name of Payne, an escaped prisoner from Venezuela, has made his way to Kingston, where he laid before the authorities an astounding story of the seizure of the Carrie D. Knowles at a Venezuelan port, where she arrived five years ago in distress, and the incarceration by the Venezuelans of the captain and his men.

"Silver Dart" Won't Go.

Bedford, N.S., May 6.—McCurdy and Baldwin, the two young Nova Scotia aeronauts who have been invited by The London Daily Mail to cross the aerodrome "Silver Dart" across the Atlantic, to compete for the £1,000 prize, one mile flight, by heavier-than-air machines, made by Englishmen, with an English aviator on board, called The Mail yesterday: "Plans too indefinite to enter competition."

Bullying Lawyers Scare Witnesses. Winnipeg, May 6.—The jury found at midnight that Louise Pearl James was murdered by some person or persons unknown. The coroner declared that counsel were permitted to browbeat and cast slurs on witnesses unchecked by the bench to such an extent that people were very unwilling to undergo the ordeal of the witness box, and consequently hampered the efforts of the police to detect crimes.

Great Find on War Eagle.

Rossland, B.C., After being conceded to have been practically worked out by the former owners, the Canadian Consolidated Co. has uncovered an ore body in War Eagle that contains \$22,000,000. It is on the ninth level, is four hundred feet long, and fifty feet wide, and the three thousand tons so far taken from it have averaged thirty dollars per ton.

Constitution for Persia.

Teheran, May 6.—A proclamation granting a constitution to Persia has been signed and issued by the Shah.

UNDERWATER WIRELESS.

English Scientist Proposes to Use Submarine Sound Waves.

John Gardner, the English scientist, purposes accomplishing by means of submarine sound waves very much what is now possible through the agency of Hertzian waves, but he has it in his power easily to improve upon the latter by preventing the purpose of his sound waves being blocked or interfered with by other sound waves set up by someone else either accidentally or intentionally. In wireless telegraphy and in distant control by wireless impulses or waves the rapid and continuous sending of a series of other waves will produce what is technically known as "interference," which has the same effect that two people speaking rapidly at the same time have upon a listener—there would be confusion and but little proper understanding. It was to provide against this difficulty that Mr. Gardner discovered and developed his present system of sound control.

Mr. Gardner has recourse to two simple elements in the get-up of his apparatus. One is a thin strip of tape of metal which he can tighten just as one does the string of an instrument so as to vary its pitch, and the other is a small and very delicately-adjusted microphone. Having tuned his metallic strip to the desired key, Mr. Gardner places upon this strip one of the two small carbons of his microphone. When the right

sound waves reach the receiver then, and only then, the intimacy of contact between the two carbons is broken, the electrical current is interfered with and the index hand swings to one side far enough to close or "make" a second and more powerful electrical circuit. This second circuit is strong enough to set in motion certain mechanical functions—the order in which these functions or movements take place depending upon the number of times and the interval between the arrival of the proper disturbing note. Any instrument or any medium that will produce the required tone will answer to set the necessary operations in motion, first by disturbing the vibrator, second, by varying the current flowing through the carbon pencils of the microphone, and thirdly, by closing the more powerful current so that the necessary electrical energy can flow to the various points and cause the movement of the several mechanical functions.

Mr. Gardner's laboratory apparatus—which in working principle is identical with that installed in his submarine boat—was made to go through the various movements of revolving a small propeller, swinging a rudder from side to side, and in expelling a miniature dummy torpedo. Each and every one of these operations was proved to be unfailingly responsive to the utterance or sounding of the proper note in the required order. Technical World Magazine, for August.
