BEFORE PARLIAMENT.

Central Railway Report Discussed at Ottawa Today--Pugsley Ready for His Traducers.

OTTAWA, May 5.—(Special)—It was expected that the attack on Hon. Dr. Pugsley, based on the findings of the New Brunswick Royal Commission, would be opened in the Commons today, and members of the opposition came fully armed for the fray.

As a preliminary, Mr. Foster moved for leave to lay on the table the order-in-council appointing the commission and the findings of that body.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier pointed out that the motion was absolutely out of order, no notice having been given. "There is another reason which I might urge," added the Prime Minister, "but I think that is sufficient."

Mr. Borden jumped to his feet and heatedly observed that the Prime Minister appeared to be very much afraid of documents. "Inasmuch as the report of that commission contains matter affecting a member of his own government," said Mr. Borden, "I think he should be the first to rise in the House and move as a matter of privilege and without notice that copies of the documents should be laid on the table. He is strong on the rules, but I think it would be a pity that the report of a commission, which as every member knows, gravely touches the public conduct of a member of this House, should not be laid on the table of the House."

The Speaker—The hon. member cannot discuss a point of order.

Mr. Borden—I am discussing a point of order. I say that inasmuch as this report touches the conduct of a Minister of the Crown, Mr. Foster is entitled as a matter of privilege, and without any notice whatever, to have the documents laid on the table.

Hon. Mr. Fielding—I think it is ment.

MR. BURCHILL'S PLAN.

G. T. P. Trains on Eastern Division May Be Operated by Electricity.

MONTREAL, Que., May 5.—(Special)—The project of electrification of the G. T. P. from Montreal to Moncton, 460 miles, seems to be taken seriously. The officials of the company here have it under consideration, and the government of Canada and New Brunswick also have it in hand. The power that would be utilized would be the Grand Falls on the St. John river, about half way between the two points, and connection with the Lakes would give 150,000 horse power. The officials here are very reticent and beyond saying that it is under their serious consideration decline to make a statement. The chief reason for its use if it becomes a fact is the cheapness and the great saving it would mean in the absence of bush fires in the immense stretch of spruce through which the line passes.

EMERY SEWELL DEAD.

Well Known Lumberman Passed Away at his Home in Gibson Today.

The death took place at his residence, Gibson, at noon today, of Mr. Emery Sewell, one of the best known and respected residents of this section. He had been a sufferer from heart trouble for several years, and had been confined to his home since last fall. While his death was not unexpected, it will be heard with sincere regret by a large number of friends.

The deceased gentleman, who was in the 71st year of his age, was born at Lincoln, and resided in this section of the province all his life. He conducted a mill at Upper Mauder-ville for several years, and also kept a general store and post office at that place. He has also been connected with other lumbering operations along the river, and at one time was the owner of a fleet of tugs. His work brought him into close contact with lumber operators and those engaged in the river trade. He was of a warm hearted, kindly disposition, and enjoyed the respect of all who knew him.

The late Mr. Sewell took up his residence at Gibson about twenty years ago, and has since taken an active interest in the affairs of that place. He is survived by a widow and two sons, Mr. Arthur Sewell, of Gibson and Dr. Ernest R. Sewell, of

St. John. Mr. Odhur Sewell of Lincoln, is a brother of the deceased. The hour of the funeral will be announced later.

ATTEMPTED ESCAPE.

Prisoner Tries to Cut His Way Out of the Guard Room.

It is reported that a daring attempt to escape from the guard room at the barracks was made a few nights ago by one of the three men now awaiting trial by court martial for desertion and insubordination. The man, after breaking through a radiator in a wall at the rear of the guard house, using a piece of the broken radiator he bored a hole through the stone to within a few inches of the outer wall. The attempt to escape was discovered in time by a member of the guard.

The soldiers are now occupying separate cells, and a double guard, part of whose duty it is to watch the rear of the guard room, has been placed on the building. The men are taken out at one o'clock each morning for exercise, and at that hour a guard of five armed men accompany them. They will be tried by court martial on Friday next before Lieut. Col. Ogilvie and Captains Osbourne and McPeake.

CHILDREN SUFFOCATED.

Three Little Ones Meet Horrible Death at Sackville:

SACKVILLE, N.B., May 5.—(Special)—There is general feeling of gloom here as a result of yesterday's sad affair, the death of the little daughter of Mrs. Fred Allen, as a consequence of burns received several days ago, suffocation of the three Crossman children, and sudden death of H. P. Trueman.

Mrs. Crossman is in a serious condition as a result of last evening's tragedy, but it is not thought that her condition is especially dangerous. She was formerly Miss Lizzie Hill of Sackville. Mrs. P. Dayer of Moncton is a sister. It is not yet decided when the funeral will be held, probably on Thursday.

One theory as to the cause of the fire is that a lamp left burning had exploded. Another is that the fire had its origin in the kitchen. Neither can be verified. It is also believed now that the two younger children were awakened early by the fire and crawled from their bed, but becoming frightened, ran back again.

SACKVILLE, N.B., May 4.—Three children lost their lives by suffocation here tonight, in a fire which broke out in their home off Foundry street, while their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Crossman, were absent. The bodies were recovered by the firemen. One child was saved.

Much sympathy is felt for the stricken parents, who, on learning of the fire, hurried to their home, but too late to be of any avail.

The names of the children are George, aged eight, Gerald, six, and Gretchen, four. Joseph, who was saved by Jeremiah Brownell, a boarder in the house, is eleven years old. Mr. and Mrs. Crossman went down town earlier in the evening, leaving one day has cast a gloom over the four children and Mr. Brownell in community.

MURDERER STILL UNKNOWN.

Coroner's Jury Returns Open Verdict in Kinrade Case.

HAMILTON, Ont., May 4.—The jury which was empanelled over two months ago to enquire into the death of Ethel Kinrade, brought in an open verdict late tonight. They declare the girl came to death at the hands of a person or persons unknown, and add a rider requesting that in view of the unsatisfactory nature of some of the evidence the crown continue its investigation.

Jimmie Baum, actor mechanic, from Portsmouth (Va.), was the chief witness tonight. He told of playing with Florence Kinrade in vaudeville theatre in Portsmouth. He often found her weeping behind the scenes. She told him she was afraid of some one whom she wouldn't say. Asked why the girl left Portsmouth, he said she told him this party had threatened unless she left the stage he would shoot her and drag her across the footlights. Again this party had sent a note threatening that unless she went home he would write and tell her father she was playing in a dive down south.

Baum also told of Florence receiving a box of chocolates from some one and being afraid they were poisoned. He wound up by assuring the jury that Florence Kinrade had nothing to do with her sister's death, and advised them to seek a mysterious individual who had driven the girl from Portsmouth.

Detective Pender told of his trip to Virginia to seek evidence. He could find no one connected with the Manchester church who knew the girl. Could find no one named Foster, who she said was the choir leader. So far as he could learn the girl had lived most respectably in every way while in the south. She had seemed in great trouble when she went there first and wept almost constantly for four or five days.

THE RACE MEETING.

Time for Receiving Nominations Extended Until May 15th.

Yesterday Mr. Hugh O'Neill, superintendent of the track, Mr. D. McCatharin, vice president, and Alds A. B. Kitchen, a director, visited the local track and made a thorough inspection. The stalls will be put in readiness for occupancy at once and will be allotted to applicants upon payment of the usual charges.

The track will be opened for use on Monday next, the directors who inspected it yesterday being unanimously of the opinion that it would be wise to allow horses on it before that date.

It is officially announced by the management of the Fredericton Trotting Park Association's races on June 30th, July 1st and 2nd that the time for receiving nominations for the stake races in the programme has been extended. This step has been taken on account of the erroneous announcement made by the American Horse Breeder that the stakes would close on the 15th inst instead of on May 1st.

Mr. W. H. Gocher, secretary of the National Trotting Association, was communicated with at the Murray Hill Hotel at New York, where he was attending a meeting of the Board

of Review yesterday, and the circumstances were stated to him in a telegram. He replied immediately instructing the association to make an official announcement that nominations would be received up to May 15th, thus extending the time.

This move on the part of the association is not evidence that the stakes have not filled because the response on the part of horsemen has been a most generous one. As an instance it can be stated that about ten nominations have been received for the 2.24 trot stake for \$400 guaranteed by the Queen Hotel. This stake was one about which there was some doubt as to its filling.
