Temperance people in the county of Albert are greatly pleased because Manager Sherwood of the Salisbury and Havelock railway has refused to accept for transportation over his road liquor for use as a beverage.

A fine new school building is completed at Petitcodiac. This place boasts a nice new Masonic hall.

Shediac is soon to be lighted by electricity. A company is now being formed that actually means business. Construction work will begin in a very short time.

The fine new mill of the Chaleur Bay Milling Company, situated at Michaud Point, opposite Campbellton, was destroyed by fire on July 30th.

LORD KITCHNER'S APPOINTMENT.

Will Succeed the Duke of Connaught as Inspector of the Mediterranean Forces.

Lord Kitchener, commander of the British forces in India, has been appointed to succeed the Duke of Connaught as inspector-general of the Mediterranean forces, which post the duke recently resigned on the ground of "the ineffective nature of the work and the useless expense to the nation involved therein."

Lord Kitchener will take the rank of field marshal and also become a member of the committee of imperial defense. The inspector general has command of the garrisons at Malta and Gibraltar and all the British troops in Egypt, the Sudan and Cyprus.

The appointment of Lord Kitchener is coincident with added importance being attached to the post. The Duke of Connaught in an official announcement says:

"In view of new developments in the organization, the Mediterranean command assumes increased importance and will be taken up by Lord Kitchener with the object of giving

it its proper place in the scheme of imperial defense."

It is understood that as a result of the imperial defence conference which is now sitting, it is intended to co-ordinate all the military forces of the empire and place Lord Kitchener at the head of an organization having the imperial army for its special care. As a preparation for this work for which he had gained valuable experience in India, on vacating Indian command in September, Lord Kitchener will go to Japan to represent Great Britain at the Japanese grand manoeuvres in November and afterwards make a tour of Canada, Australia and New Zealand to study the military organizations and consult with the colonial governments concerning them.

Lord Kitchener is the youngest field marshal in the history of Great Britain. Lord Roberts was sixty years old when he was raised to the rank, and Lord Wolseley was sixty-two. Lord Kitchener was fifty-nine years old in June.

SAW HEAVEN.

Kansas Girl Was Pronounced Dead by Physicians and Says She Went to Heaven.

Wichita, Kan., Aug. 6.—Miss Eula Wilson, a Wichita girl, who two years ago asserted that she died and went to heaven, has been released from the Girls' Industrial School at Beloit, and is again in Wichita living with her parents. She insists on the veracity of her story.

"Of course, I insist the story is true," she said. "Do you think I would tell a lie about such a thing as that? Why, it is just as plain now as it was that night. I am not going to give any more lectures and have no idea that I shall again appear in public. I am going to stay right at home and help my parents."

All the spring of 1907 Eula Wilson a slender girl of 15, lay in bed in a semi-conscious condition. One night, when the doctor was present, she apparently died and the undertaker was called. He came in the morning and found the girl sitting up. She was evidently entirely well and has never since been sick.

She arose from the bed while the family was around her mourning, and walking across the room, stooped, opened her eyes and asked the whereabouts of the Lord. She then told of visiting heaven and described it. She said, after lingering there a while the Lord called her to Him and said she would be sent back to serve her friends and to work for Him.

People came from all over the United States to see the girl and she finally fell under the influence of the religious fanatics who took her from her parents. The juvenile court then stepped in and she was sent to the Industrial School. While at school more mail arrived for her than for all the officials and the other inmates together, and she was not allowed to see it. Mrs. Perry, matron of the school, agreed with the attorneys for the child's parents that she would be given a parole and it was done.

THE TEMPERANCE WAVE.

South Carolina Is Now a Dry State.

Columbia, S. C., Aug. 5.—On Tuesday of this week South Carolina was added to the fold of state-wide prohibition territory. However, the drought in this state is to be temporary—unless the voters in the 21 dispensary counties that are to hold local option elections on Tuesday, Aug. 17, declare for perpetual dryness.

Due to the strategy of the prohibitionists in the South Carolina legislature, the dries have all to gain and nothing to lose in the approaching contests. Literally, this state is half-and-half, 21 counties being already in the prohibition camp.

The law enacted by the last session of the legislature took no account of the territory already dry, providing only for elections in the wet counties to determine whether they should remain wet. Further, that the folk in the dispensary counties might have a taste of prohibition before depositing their ballots, the prohibitionists had it provided that all dispensaries shall close two weeks before the elections and remain closed until the result of the election is known.

A howl went up from the wets when Attorney General Lyon delivered an opinion to the effect that the results of the election "would not be known" until officially declared by the state board of canvassers which means that county groggshops will be closed for at least a month.

In the elections each county votes as a unit, and it is admitted that a number of them will set the seal of disapproval upon the sale of intoxicants within their borders. Richland, in which Columbia is situated, and Charleston are among the counties which will participate in the election.

Greer Investigates Death.

Bayfield, Aug. 7.—Interest in the strange death of Mrs. W. J. Burns, who was found dead in her home July 17 last, with a bruise on one of her temples, and a stocking knotted loosely about her throat, has been revived by the appearance of Provincial Detective Greer.

The detective was sent here at the request of the woman's husband, who desired to set at rest certain rumors. A coroner's jury a few weeks ago found the woman came to her death from causes unknown to it, but it is understood Detective Greer, as the result of his investigations, has decided that death was due to heart failure.

Hustling Baddeck No. 1.

Petawawa Camp, Aug. 7.—The finishing touches were given to Baddeck No. 1 yesterday afternoon, and J. D. McCurdy confidently expects to attempt flights to-day, when much is expected of the new aerodrome.

Casey Baldwin said yesterday that "it was a refined product of the inventors' art."

As soon as the trials at Petawawa are concluded, Baldwin and McCurdy will visit England with an all Canadian aerodrome, to carry out a program of flights which will be arranged later. That they will surpass Blériot's recent performance over the English Channel is earnestly wished.

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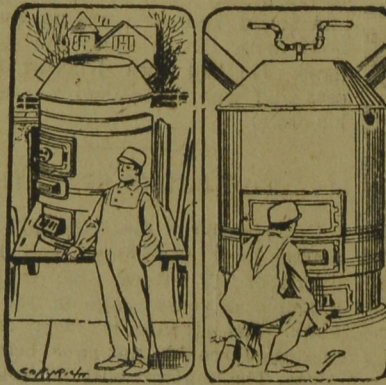

PUBLIC NOTICE

Notice is hereby given that The Canada Loose Leaf Company, Limited, will apply to the City Council of the City of Fredericton for a loan and certain exemptions hereunder set out pursuant to Chapter Thirty Nine, Acts of Assembly, 6 Edward VII.

The Company will make application for exemption from water rates sewerage rate and taxation generally for a term of five years, renewable for a further term of five years, and a loan of three thousand five hundred dollars, repayable in instalments of five hundred dollars annually without interest, the first instalment to be paid five years after the loan is made.

In consideration of such assistance the Company on their part agree to repay such loan as aforesaid and to employ forty five people with a gross annual wage of not less than three hundred and fifty dollars weekly, and to actively carry on the business of manufacturing loose leaf ledgers and other loose leaf devices to the amount of not less than \$50,000 annually.
