CROSS IS UNVEILED

Memorial to Irish Immigrants
Dedicated at Grosse Point.

MANY NOTABLES PRESENT

Hon. Charles Murphy is Chief Orator at Splendid Function When Celtic Cross is Unveiled to Memory of Incoming Irish Who Died in 1847—Mgr. Sbarretti Speaks—Visitors From Distant Points.

Quebec, Aug. 16.—A monument to the Irish immigrants who died in 1847 was unveiled at Grosse Isle, 27 miles below Quebec, yesterday. It takes the shape of a handsome Celtic cross, erected by the Ancient Order of Hibernians. Perfect weather attended the unveiling ceremonies on Grosse Isle. A fleet of six large steamers carried the crowd down the river. There were visitors from Washington, New York, Boston, Toronto, Ottawa, Kingston, Montreal, and other places. The Canadian Government steamer *Druid* was at the disposal of the committee in charge, and the steamer *Alice* had on board the Lieutenant-Governor, Chief Justice Fitzpatrick, and Hon. Charles Murphy, Secretary of State, with whom were Mgr. Sbarretti and Archbishop Begin. The scenes on the island were impressive. A small temporary altar had been erected on the flat ground back of Telegraph Hill, near the cemetery, and there a low Mass was said by Rev. Father Hanley, Redemptorist, rector of St. Patrick's Church, Quebec. Mgr. Sbarretti and the archbishop in their robes attended, and after the Mass the archbishop sang the *Libera*, or prayer for the dead, assisted by a fine choir from St. Patrick's, Quebec. Under the blazing sun, in the swamy flat and up on the hillside, the congregation knelt in a wrapt devotion. They listened to a sermon by Rev. A. E. Maguire, chaplain of the Hibernians who, making no effort at all at eloquence, told the story of the famine, but dwelt with reiterated detail upon the performance of the forty-two priests, most of them of French extraction, who during the prevalence of the disease, went fearlessly among the dead and dying. Father Taschereau, afterwards cardinal, was one of that band. Father Hugh McQuirk of New Brunswick was another of those priests. The spirit of the French clergy also animated the French-Canadian people, who took into their families and reared as their own children six hundred of the orphans of Grosse Isle. Mgr. Sbarretti having imparted the Apostolic benediction to the vast congregation, Archbishop Begin delivered a short address in English. He drew an affecting parallel between the French and Irish Catholics in Canada, who had both learned upon that spot the lesson of bitter hardship, and for whom the symbolism of the Cross had the same meaning. The unveiling of the monument was then performed on top of the hill. The majestic Celtic cross of Canadian granite occupies a most commanding position, and can be seen at a distance of ten miles from the river. It was flanked yesterday by the banners of Ireland and Quebec, these being the only flags in the immediate vicinity, although Canadian and American flags were elsewhere abundantly in evidence. On the three sides of the stone bears the following inscription in English, French, and Irish: "Sacred to the memory of thousands of Irish emigrants, who, to preserve the faith, suffered hunger and exile in 1847-48, and, stricken by fever, ended here their sorrowful pilgrimage. Erected by the Ancient Order of Hibernians in America, and dedicated at the Feast of the Assumption, 1909."

Present with Mr. Charles J. Foy of Perth, Ont., national president of the A.O.H., were the Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec, Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, Hon. Charles Murphy, Hon. L. A. Taschereau, William Power, M.P., C. J. Doherty, M.P., Montreal; Hon. Charles Devlin, E. Devlin, M.P., M. Turcotte, M.P., Dr. Guerin, Montreal, Matthew Cummings, and E. McCrystal, representing the national board of the Hibernians. Mr. Foy's opening speech was a masterpiece, and when he called upon Mgr. Sbarretti to draw aside the veil from the front of the stone, the apostolic delegate spoke a few sentences praising the popes for their love of Ireland. The fourth inscription on the stone read: "Memorial tablet to the priests who voluntarily ministered to the typhus-stricken emigrants." After Mr. Matthew Cummings had spoken, Hon. Charles Murphy made a fine plea for the erection of a tablet to the Canadian clergy, both Protestant and Catholic, who had died in 1847 by the contraction of typhus.

Trains Collide; Eight Killed.
Colorado Springs, Aug. 16.—Eight are dead and fifty injured, some fatally, as a result of a head-on collision between train No. 8, northbound, and train No. 1, southbound, on the Denver & Rio Grande and Husted, 13 miles north of Colorado Springs, Saturday morning. The trains, both running at terrific speed, met on a curve. No. 8, drawn by two engines, telescoped the baggage car and smoker of No. 1, and all three engines, were thrown into the ditch. With more than 400 passengers on the two trains, the excitement following the accident was indescribable.

First Samples Arrive.
Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 16.—The Ogilvie Flour Mills Co., received on Saturday the first samples of new wheat. They consisted of about ten pounds each and came from Rosenfeld and Rathwell. The Rosenfeld sample was a beautiful one of pure red fife wheat of a deep amber shade and would grade extra No. 1 hard, and will make a very strong flour. This farmer will have a yield of 26 bushel to the acre. The sample from Rathwell is fine plump wheat and will grade No. 1 northern. Both farmers cut this wheat last Monday.

Three thousand steel pressed car works strikers escorted to the grave the body of one of their number killed while attacking a non-union man.
James Dent of Montreal, who a year ago jumped overboard from an ocean steamer in the St. Lawrence, a supposed suicide, but who later turned up alive in London, is back in Montreal.

McLean Goldie, representative of the Nova Scotia Government, has sailed from Glasgow on the Mongolian with a party of settlers. Mr. Goldie has secured emigrants representing a capital of over \$100,000.

A despatch from Teheran says that despite his protests Ahmed Mirza, the young Shah of Persia, will be officially married soon, and that his household is now being arranged. The Shah is eleven years old.

Workmen Leave Gary.
Chicago, Ill., Aug. 16.—Laborers are deserting Gary, Ind., the "marvelous steel city," in such numbers as to threaten embarrassment to the United States Steel Corporation in the operation of its big plant. Unofficial reports are that more than five hundred unskilled men have left the town and that more are preparing to go because the "12" is on tight and it is virtually impossible to buy a glass of beer or a drink of any kind in the town.

Company Won't Negotiate.
Montreal, Aug. 16.—James Ross, president of the Dominion Coal Co., wires an emphatic denial that any negotiations are in progress with a view to settle the coal strike.

He also reiterates the company's absolute refusal to make any possible concession to the strikers.

A Man to Buy Her Trousseau.
Vancouver, B.C., Aug. 16.—To buy gowns and trills and furbelows for the marriage of Princess Funt, third daughter of the Japanese Emperor, to Prince Asaka, next March, the vicemaster of ceremonies of the Japanese Court, is to leave Japan on Sept. 7 for America and France.

Little Girl Burned.
Toronto, Aug. 16.—While playing with matches about noon Saturday the 3-year-old son of James Penrice, 120 May street, ward seven, set fire to his clothing and received injuries so severe that the two doctors in attendance are doubtful of his recovery.

Crew Rescued.
Sydney, N.S., Aug. 16.—A message was received from North Sydney yesterday to the effect that the crew of the schooner *Myrtle*, which was wrecked at Langan on Wednesday night, were picked up and landed at Bell Island.

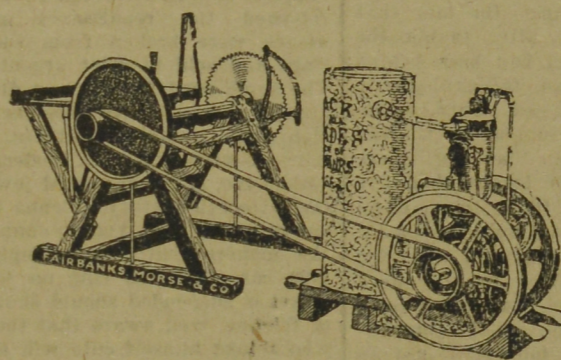
