EXPORT OF PULPWOOD.

(Toronto Globe.)

If our timber was an ordinary product of industry and could be reproduced, there would scarcely be a valid excuse for interfering with the owners in the disposal of it. Left to themselves, they would adopt the most profitable method, and that would be best for the country at large. But the forest is a product that requires the steady growth of ages, and we have not yet been able to manage it on the basis of continuous yearly or periodical reproduction. That is why restriction on the export of timber in the rough, while diminishing the immediate returns of the lumberman, gives more than compensatory advantages by saving an important product for better markets in the future, as well as by promoting the establishment of local industries. The Liberal government of Ontario took action in this regard some time ago by attaching conditions of local manufacture to sale of timber. This has checked an export that was threatening to denude some of the best timber land of the province, and has promoted the establishing of sawmills where logs were formerly exported. Interest is now centering in the pulpwood which product of the Canadian forests. Up to the present time the supply has been so abundant and the sources so many that suggested plans for the checking of exports have not promised satisfactory results. With many provinces to draw from, the consumers of spruce would not feel for some time any result from a policy of restriction on the part of Ontario. But the eagerness of foreign paper makers and consumers to buy Canadian pulpwood, in advance of the demand has caused a general awakening to the strength of Canada's position and the need of taking full advantage of it.

The most important practical move that has yet resulted has been made by Premier Gouin of Quebec, who announced at the Liberal banquet in Montreal his intention of prohibiting the export of pulpwood from Crown lands. His policy as roughly outlined will follow that adopted by the Ross government in dealing with pine timber. The provinces have no power to impose an export or import duty, but as owners of the standing timber they can impose any terms they see fit in disposing of it. It was by virtue of the power of this position that the Ross government imposed the condition of local manufacture in sales of pine, and similar conditions may be required in sales of pulpwood. The policy to be adopted in Quebec clears the ground, and leaves no reason for any longer neglect of similar precautions in Ontario. Special restrictions and requirements would have but little effect in Ontario if there was free export from the forests of Quebec. But the new policy announced by Premier Gouin removes all difficulties regarding the adoption of a similar policy by this province. Canada's control of the pulpwood situation will be a source of increasing profits from year to year. Now that Quebec is alive to the possibilities of this important natural advantage, Ontario should take immediate steps to complete the timber policy already adopted by extending it to pulpwood. It is simply a business proposition, and it is the duty of the government as trustees, to dispose of the people's property to the best possible advantage.

CURRENT COMMENT.

Mr. Alex. Rogers, registrar of deeds, for Albert, was dismissed from office because he seems to have made an effort to keep Mr. W. B. Dickson, M. P. P., out of the legislature.

Members of the opposition party in St. John county held a meeting yesterday and decided to call a convention at once to nominate a candidate to contest the county at the bye-election to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of Hon. H. A. McKeown to the bench. The Liberals are confident that they can hold the constituency.

The political sins of the Hon. J. King Pinder appear to be finding him out. He opposed Mr. Bliss' appointment to the office of Judge of Probate, employing underhand methods not creditable to a public man, and was thrown down by the government. He tried to play a double game in reference to the shrievalty of York a few weeks ago, and was neatly hoisted on his own petard. Mr. Pinder seems to be drifting rapidly in the direction of the has-been class.

The investing public has shown its faith in the future of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway by investing over a million dollars in lands at

Prince Rupert, the Pacific port of the new transcontinental line. If further proof of public faith in this line was needed it has been furnished by the fact that the five million dollar branch line bond issue, guaranteed by the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta, had been greatly over-subscribed in the London market.

Carleton Sentinel: As many throughout the County will know before this issue of the Sentinel reaches them Mr. Carvell, the popular representative of Carleton County in the Federal House has declined a position on the Supreme Court Bench of the Province. This position yielding a salary of \$6,500 per year is not a bad every day. But Mr. Carvell declined the position as he felt that the people of this County, who had so recently elected him to the honorable position which he now occupies in the Federal House, would not desire him to resign at the present time and put the country to the expense of another election. Mr. Carvell will remain in politics as long as he does a certain ambitious gentleman of the Conservative party will remain out.

ATTACKED BY BULL-DOGS

Went Into Yard to Play With Them and Was Terribly Mauled.

ST. LAMBERT, June 5.—The eighteen months' old son of Mr. M. Grant, horseholder, in Montreal, was terribly bitten by a couple of prize bull-dogs here, and it is said, will be disfigured for life.

The little boy, who had always been fond of playing with dogs, wandered into the neighbor's yard, where two thoroughbred English brindle bull-dogs were kept by Mr. H. Thomas, a dog fancier. For some reason not known, both dogs flew at the youngster, making for his throat and face.

The child's screams brought his mother and a couple of men to his assistance, and the dogs were beaten off, but only with the greatest difficulty. One of the men had to use a hammer before they could be made to loosen their hold.

Dr. Mitchell was at once summoned, and was obliged to put in nineteen stitches in the little chap's face and neck. The little boy's nose was almost bitten off, and other injuries were very painful. He is reported to be recovering rapidly, however, and there is believed to be no more danger from hydrophobia.

It is said that these dogs attacked and killed a goat last fall. They were not destroyed, being considered too valuable.

THE PRESS CONFERENCE.

Berlin Paper Thinks It Won't Achieve Its Mission.

BERLIN, June 5.—An article published by the influential Conservative organ, Neuste Nachrichten, on the Imperial press conference, betrays the feeling felt here that a gathering of influential public men from all parts of the British Empire may tend to consolidate the Greater Britain.

The Neuste Nachrichten devotes two columns to an elaboration of the theory that there are more points of difference than symptoms of unity between the different parts of the Empire, and concludes by expressing doubt whether the conference will really lead to closer relations between England's overseas dominions.

"The imperial press conference is worthy of our attention," says the Neuste Nachrichten, "because the movement which gave rise to the conference is really based on the antagonism between Great Britain and Germany." There can be no doubt whatever on this point. It is intended that the directors of all the great newspapers of the British dominions beyond the seas shall be convinced by the colleagues at home that the uniform organization of the fleet and arms is necessary for protecting the British world empire.

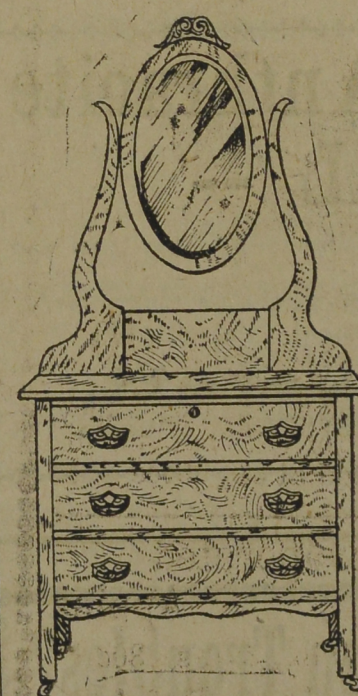
