MINISTER OF LABOR.

Ex-Liberal Organizer Sees Great Future Before Hon. McKenzie King.

Ottawa, June 4.—One of the best posted men on political affairs in Canada, Alex. Smith, former Liberal organizer, states that there is a great future ahead of W. L. MacKenzie King, and that it was with this view that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has made him a member of his government.

Successful as Mr. King has been up to the present, Mr. Smith states it is doubtful if he would at this early stage of his parliamentary career, at the age of thirty-four, be a member of the cabinet unless the future of which Mr. King gives high promise, held strong sway on the mind and judgment of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. "There is no doubt," said Mr. Smith, "that in making his choice of minister of labor, Sir Wilfrid had a view his own career and particularly that portion of it at the time Alex. MacKenzie invited him to a seat in his cabinet at the age of thirty-five. By choosing young Laurier, Alex. MacKenzie enhanced and enriched the Liberal party and with similar hopes Sir Wilfrid has now chosen MacKenzie King."

To fill the position of entomologist and botanist, held by Dr. Fletcher, it is understood the civil service commission has recommended the appointment of two men—one an entomologist and the other a botanist. Professor Charles Morgan Hewitt, of Owens College, Manchester (Eng.), where he was a lecturer in entomology, will be the entomologist. The position of botanist will probably be filled by the appointment of Hans Gussow, of Breslau (Ger.), who has been offered the position, but no reply has been received yet. For six years past he has been employed in botanical work by the Royal Agricultural Society of England. Both of these men are noted in their respective spheres. Professor Hewitt has accepted and appointment and will arrive about September. He is a man of great promise and has already done a great deal of useful work in economic entomology. The active work for the deepening of the St. Lawrence channel to thirty-five feet will not be commenced until next spring. The marine department will then be in a position to successfully undertake the work. There will then be completed three very powerful dredges, one of these which, when completed, will be the largest in the world, is now being built in the government yard at Sorel. It will be capable of lifting fourteen cubic yards of material at each scoop. The construction of two additional dredges of similar capacity will be commenced at once. The beginning of the thirty-five foot channel work will be made in Lake St. Peter.

BERLIN PROUD OF HIM.

Hon. Mackenzie King Received in His Native Town.

Berlin, June 3.—There was a large gathering of citizens of Berlin at the station to welcome Hon. Mackenzie King, Minister of Labor, this afternoon. The reception tendered Mr. King left no doubt as to the pride which the citizens have in the new Minister. Mayor Hahn, on behalf of the citizens of Berlin, congratulated Mr. King on the honor which had been conferred upon him, as well as upon the citizens of Berlin and the county, by his elevation to Cabinet rank. Mayor Hahn is Vice-president of the Dominion Trades and Labor congress.

In the course of his remarks, he said it gave him special pleasure, as one who had had lifelong association with labor and the labor movement to welcome Mr. King as the new minister. He knew of no one better qualified to fill the position or whose appointment would be more fully endorsed by the working people, who felt that they also had been honored by the Premier's choice.

Mr. King stated that his elevation to the Cabinet had been due not to any particular merit of his own, but was due to the fact that he had been identified for some years past with labor and social questions, and that he represented a rising, which was one of the most important industrial centres of the Dominion. He thought, too, that the Prime Minister himself, a descendant of the French race, was pleased to have the opportunity of selecting as a member of his government one who represented a rising which was known to have such a large proportion of Germans. Both the Mayor's speech and Mr. King's reply were received with rousing cheers, in which citizens of both parties heartily united.

Vaccination for Militia.

Ottawa, June 4.—Militia orders announce that owing to smallpox in parts of the Dominion, commanding officers will be held responsible that no person not protected by vaccination to the satisfaction of the medical officer will be allowed to proceed to camp.

Favor Suffrage

Buffalo, New York, June 3.—The Western New York Federation of Women's Clubs, numbering 32,000 members, in convention here yesterday adopted a resolution expressing sympathy with and endorsing the efforts of women to secure the ballot.

Boy Drowns at Chatham.

Chatham, June 4.—Thomas, 16, aged 16, son of George, of Darrell, was drowned in the Thames at the rear of Judge Bell's property, at noon yesterday. He was swimming with some other pupils and was taken with cramps.

Immigration Figures.

Ottawa, June 4.—The total immigration into Canada for April was 24,275, as compared with 23,723 in April of last year. The immigration from the United States was 12,600, as compared with 9,084.

Smothered in Saw Dust.

London, June 4.—Gordon Knowles, the 2-year-old son of Mr. Arthur Knowles, of 1 High street, was smothered at noon yesterday when a pile of sawdust upon which he was sliding buried him in a shed near his father's foundry, sliding from the top to the bottom.

PRESIDENT HUTCHINSON SIGNS.

Wolville, N. S., June 4.—Rev. W. B. Hutchinson, D.D., after two years' service as president of Acadia University, in which he assisted in the completion of the Forward Movement fund, has tendered his resignation to the board of governors, to take effect forthwith. The governors sent a delegation to wait on the president, but he continued to press his resignation, as he preferred the less strenuous work of the pastorate to the responsible administrative duties of his present position. The resignation was therefore accepted.

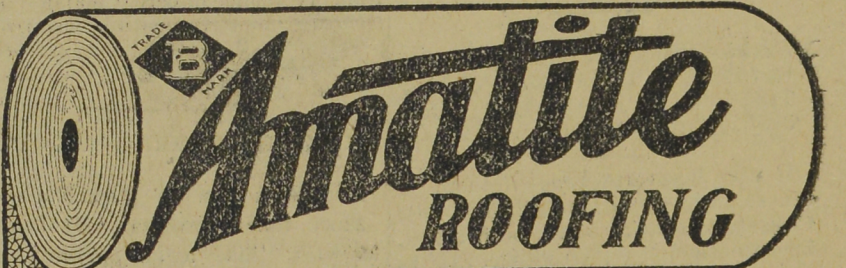
