TWO BOYS DROWNED

John and James Hamilton Lose
Lives in Lake of Bays.

BROTHER SWIMS ASHORE

Two Sons of Rev. R. M. Hamilton of
the Presbyterian Church at Weston
Perish Near Wawa, While Third
Manages to Get to Safety—Two
Women Drown at Jasper—
One Man at Schreiber.

Toronto, Aug. 23.—John and James
Hamilton, sons of Rev. R. M. Hamilton,
pastor of the Presbyterian
Church at Weston, were drowned near
the Wawa, Lake of Bays, Muskoka,
on Sunday.

Henry Hamilton, twin brother of
John, saved himself by swimming
ashore.

The three boys were in a canoe when
it upset. James and John were expert
swimmers, but they locked themselves
in a deadly embrace and sank,
while Henry struck out for the shore,
which he reached safely.

The double drowning occurred two
or three miles from the Wawa, near
which the Hamilton family have been
camping for a couple of months. Mrs.
Hamilton went up with the boys when
the season opened, and Rev. Mr.
Hamilton joined them about three
weeks ago.

James was 15 years of age, John
and Henry, the twins, 17. Another
brother, Gordon, aged 12, is purser of
one of the boats of the Niagara Navigation
Co., and did not go with the
other members of the family to Muskoka.

Drowning at Schreiber.

Fort William, Aug. 23.—Geo. Ross,
for some sixteen years C. P. R. conductor
on the east end, but latterly a
butcher of Schreiber, was drowned
yesterday a few miles east of Schreiber.
He was out with Crown Timber
Agent Oliver of Port Arthur in a
canoe and upset. He leaves a widow
and six children.

Two Women Drowned.

Smith's Falls, Aug. 23.—A double
drowning occurred at Jasper, six miles
from here, Friday afternoon, the
victims being Mrs. Harry Stephens, aged
23, and her sister, Miss Jessie Jones,
aged 21, of Syracuse, N.Y., both of
whom were visiting in the village at
the home of Mrs. James O'Neil.

About 3 o'clock the ladies went out
in a boat to fish in the small creek,
and three hours later were found dead
by a boy.

Found Body at Lewiston.

Lewiston, Aug. 23.—The swollen
body of a man was taken from the
river here last evening. It is supposed
to be that of Augustus Spahr,
18 years of age, who while swimming
in the river near the Mill of the
Mist Landing on Monday last, was
swept into the rapids. He was last
seen alive near the spot where Capt.
Webb lost his life, and afterwards his
body was seen floating in the Whirlpool.

A Narrow Escape.

Newport, L.I., Aug. 23.—Four men
had a narrow escape from death last
yesterday afternoon when the 51-foot
cabin launch Allegro caught fire and
burned at a point about three miles
east of Brenton's Reef lightship.
Thrown into the water by the capsizing
of the tender in which they had
taken refuge from the burning launch,
the four kept themselves afloat for
nearly an hour until rescuers arrived.

Three Killed in Auto Races.

Indianapolis, Aug. 23.—Three more
lives were sacrificed Saturday in the
mad speed carnival which has inaugurated
the great Indianapolis motor
speedway.

One mechanic and two spectators
paid the penalty of their lives to satisfy
the extreme desire for speed.
The fatal accident came when a National
Car, driven by Charles Merz,
in the three hundred mile race lost
a tire and crashed through a fence into
a group of spectators, spreading
death and destruction in the wake of
its wild plunge.

The dead are: Claude Kellum of Indianapolis, mechanic in the National Car; Ora Joliffe, Trafalgar, Ind.; James West.

Big Barn Burned.

Woodstock, Aug. 23.—Fire, which
started from a mysterious origin early
Saturday, destroyed the fine bank
barn of Ex-County Councillor T. E.
West, on the eastern outskirts of the
city, with all of the season's crops,
four horses and other stock. Insurance
\$2,000. It is thought that a
tramp set fire to the barn.

Former Toronto Man Killed.

Windsor, Aug. 23.—James Wilcox,
aged 35, unmarried, employed as a
yard conductor in the yards of the
Michigan Central at West Detroit,
was crushed to death between two
cars Saturday night.

Wilcox came to Detroit two years
ago from Toronto, where he has a sister,
Miss Nellie Wilcox.

Change in Telegraph Rates.

Chicago, Aug. 23.—The Postal and
the Western Union Telegraph Companies
announced Saturday that they
have postponed until Dec. 1, the application
of the new rule making
cipher messages payable at the rate of
five letters to the word, instead of
ten, as at present.

Fatal Fight Over Dog.

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 23.—Reese
Huck, a prominent farmer, was shot
to death and four others were probably
fatally wounded in a feud fight
growing out of a controversy over a
dog, at Huntersville, 12 miles from
here, last night.

Dropped Lamp, Started Fire.

Brantford, Aug. 23.—Mrs. Fred
Marks, 111 West Mill street, dropped a
lighted coal oil lamp on the floor in
the kitchen Saturday night and the
fire destroyed the rear part of the
brick structure. The woman escaped
unhurt.

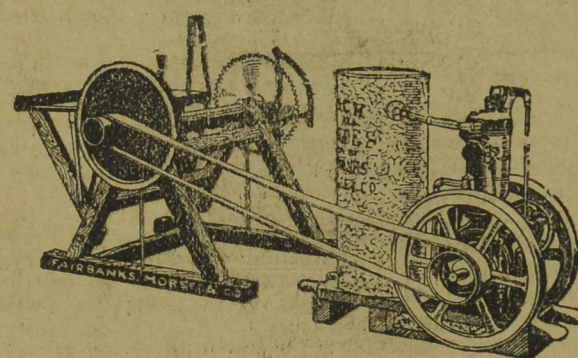
