PROMPTLY NABBED.

Rich Chinaman Escaping from Montreal Justice Arrested at Halifax.

MONTREAL, Feb. 18.—(Special) Lee Chu, a wealthy Chinese tea and general merchant was tried on 23 charges of selling cocaine. He pleaded not guilty, but when he got a hint that he was to be fined, he disappeared from the court room, and it is thought he went to Halifax or St. John. He is badly wanted, for if he is caught the court will be richer by \$1,025 and costs, for that is the fine.

Detectives think he is on his way to the West Indies or to Europe.

HALIFAX, Feb. 18.—(Special) The police arrested on the arrival of the Maritime express this morning a Chinaman named Lee Chu, wanted by Chief Detective Carpenter at Montreal, on a charge of perjury. The prisoner is held awaiting instructions.

HAZEN'S STAR CHAMBER.

Charges Against Albert Liberal Officials Heard in Private—Great Efforts to Displace Prominent Liberals.

ALBERT, Feb. 18.—The investigation of the charges against Alexander Rogers, registrar of deeds, and M. B. Dixon, registrar of probate, the former for alleged partisanship, and the latter for irregularity of attendance at his office, which was begun here yesterday before Commissioner J. King Kelley, of St. John, was finished last evening, some ten witnesses in all being examined. The proceedings were held in Jones' hotel, and were private.

In the investigation of the charges against Mr. Rogers, evidence was given by seven witnesses Tuesday, the number including I. C. Prescott and C. L. Peck, the latter gentleman being the applicant for the registrarship of deeds, the office which some of the Conservative party are endeavoring to take from the present holder, who has been a particularly competent and obliging official.

The evidence taken at Tuesday's session had reference to Mr. Rogers' conduct on election day, March 3rd, 1908, and indicated that a good deal of scurrying had been done to get pretty small results. Three more witnesses were examined yesterday. The whole thing would appear to be simply an endeavor to carry on the policy of the Hazen party, as was put into effect after the third of March, the displacing of Liberal officials wherever possible. Strange to say, even the deplorable condition of things as a result of the dismissal and appointments so far carried into effect seems to be no deterrent to the desperate endeavors of the Hazenites to get rid of Liberal office-holders. An onlooker might naturally suppose that if the Albert county Conservatives had an interest in the permanency of the Hazen government they would be able to see a lesson in the things already unfortunately accomplished.

Hon. C. W. Robinson of Moncton, was present at the examination in the interests of Mr. Rogers, W. B. Jonah being in attendance in connection to the charge preferred. Mr. Rogers gave evidence yesterday in rebuttal of testimony given.

BRITISH COLUMBIA BUDGET.

Provincial Treasurer Tatlow Announces Big Surplus and Reduction of Public Debt.

VICTORIA, B.C., Feb. 18.—(Special)—In the budget debate in the legislature last night Finance Minister Tatlow showed a surplus of a million and a half. The revenue for the next fiscal year would reach six millions and the expenditure five and a half million, of which nearly three millions would be for public works, the largest in the history of the province. The public debt had been reduced from \$11,500,000 to \$2,000,000 within a year.

The minister proposed greater development when the A. B. C. route, as the minister styled the Alberta and British Columbia grain route, would in the near future be in operation, and the Panama Canal completed.

THE HOUSE OPENING.

Elaborate Preparations Being Made this Year for the Military Display.

Col. George Holt White, D. O. C. has issued his orders for the military turnout in connection with the opening of the Legislature here on Mar. 19th. The Royal Regiment will furnish the guard of honor and the band of the 71st Regiment will take part. The customary salute of fifteen guns will be fired by a detachment from the 19th Field Battery of Moncton.

A detachment of two officers and ten gunners will arrive here from Moncton on the 9.20 train on the 18 and the officer commanding will at once hustle down to the Crown Land office and report to Mr. R. S. Barker private secretary to his Honor the Lieutenant-Governor. He will then repair to the old Government House, trot out the two nine pound field pieces stored in one of the outbuildings, proceed with the same to Fenwick Avenue and unlimber. After the salute has been fired the guns will be returned to their summer and winter quarters and the artillerymen will take the evening train for home.

Lieutenant Col. J. W. Bridges, P. A. M. C., will be detailed for duty with the artillerymen, while the salute is being fired.

The guard of honor from the R. C. R. will be the full strength of "H" company, or about seventy-five rank and file besides the band.

Officers of the active militia and retired officers who wish to attend the opening ceremony will rendezvous with Col. White at the parliament building at 2.40 o'clock, in full dress.

Lieutenant Governor Tweedie will give the usual state dinner in the evening at the Queen hotel.

A ST. JOHN BLAZE.

Double Tenement House Guttled by Fire this Morning.

ST. JOHN, Feb. 18.—(Special)—A fire resulting in damage to the extent of about six hundred dollars occurred this morning in a house owned by Mrs. Margaret Hilton, at 96 Sheriff Street. The building is of wood, two and a half stories high. The lower flat is occupied by Mrs. Hilton, the second by Mrs. Ross and the top flat by Mr. Pierce.

The fire broke out in the top flat supposedly from an overheated kitchen stove.

The top flat was completely gutted and Mr. Pierce lost practically all his furniture.

The second flat was also extensively damaged by the fire, chemical and water.

Mrs. Hilton carries \$1,000 insurance on the house but no insurance was carried by the tenants.

BLOWN INTO ETERNITY.

Another Transcontinental Railway Laborer Victim of Dynamite Explosion.

MONCTON, Feb. 18.—An Italian named Jasmino Tabbelli, aged about thirty years, a workman employed on the G. T. P. construction at Corbett's No. 1 near Canaan was blown into eternity about five o'clock yesterday afternoon by an explosion of dynamite.

Just how the fatality occurred is known. Tabbelli was engaged to explode charges of dynamite ahead of the steam shovel. He was alone at the time and the workmen nearby heard the explosion and when they arrived on the scene they found Tabbelli dead, having apparently been killed by concussion. The face of the man was not disfigured, but fatal injuries were inflicted about the abdomen.

MISS CARVELL'S CONDITION.

Daughter of Carleton M. P. is Seriously Ill.

OTTAWA, Feb. 18.—Mr. and Mrs. Frank Carvell are very anxious concerning the illness of their daughter, Mildred, who came with them from Woodstock last month, to attend the Ottawa Ladies' College.

It is thought now that she was attacked by the typhoid germ before she left home. For nearly two weeks she has been in a private ward in St. Luke's hospital, and on Tuesday her symptoms were of so grave a character that a well known specialist, Dr. Lafleur, of Montreal, was called in consultation with Drs. Argue and McAlister. Mr. Carvell's sister, who has been a graduate nurse for some time in Boston, has been telegraphed for.

WOLFVILLE, N. S., Feb. 18.—The second match in the Intercollegiate Hockey League was played here last night between the Acadia and University N. B., when the U.N.B. defeated their opponents by a score of 9 to 1.

Referee Young of Halifax blew the whistle for play to begin at 8.15. Immediately after the face off the U.N.B. made their first goal. Then for several minutes play was down in the Acadia's territory, but Bates saved the day by several good rushes, but for all that U.N.B. found the net once more and performed the same trick within three minutes. Babbitt was then put off for tripping. Now the play was pretty much in middle ice, when Acadia shot goal, but it was off side. But a few minutes later Acadia caught the net again. Then after some good individual playing on U.N.B.'s part they made another goal. A few minutes later the puck again found the net for U.N.B.

At half time the score was 5 to 1 for U. N. B. Four minutes after half time Acadia scored their second goal. Shortly after U. N. B. performed the same thing, and immediately after a face off made their seventh.

Play was for some minutes around the centre ice, when Acadia scored her third, and after some pretty work up the ice by Bates, Patillo and Lewis, Acadia scored again. A good deal of checking was done throughout the game. Now U. N. B. again found the nets and shortly after again.
