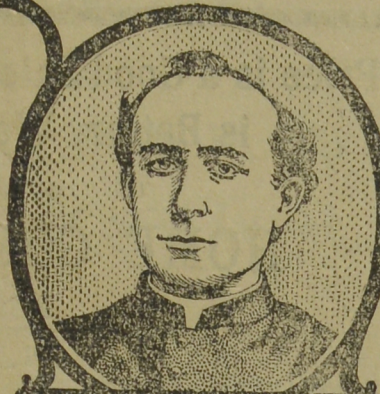

THE HONEYMOON PARADE.

Wedding Custom in One Town When the Train is Late.

A small city, which need not be located more particularly than that it is somewhere east of Boston, has its own peculiar way of speeding the newly married on their honeymoon.

For one thing, every one goes to the station to see the couple depart. This is done in many small places. The showering of rice or confetti and the throwing of the old shoe take place, not at the home of the bride, but at the station. To that extent the city referred to is not unusual.

But in this city train schedules frequently go awry, and when they do the unusual happens. The wedding, of course, has been celebrated on time, and the reception has taken as much time as such things usually take. The departure from the bride's home is made in due season to catch the train if it is on time.

The wedding guests rush to the station, where all other inhabitants having nothing better to do have assembled already. It is a free show which no one would miss.

The carriage bearing the newly married pair is drawn by white horses and decorated with white ribbons. Custom demands this, and no one has yet had the temerity to do otherwise.

The carriage arrives at the station, and it is learned that the train is so many minutes or so many hours late. Usually the measure is in hours.

The carriage doesn't wait. It goes parading. It drives around and around a prescribed route, from every point of which the driver can get due notice of the approach of the train.

The crowd remains patiently at the station. Other curious persons station themselves at points along the route just to see the wedding coach pass.

Sometimes two or three carriages, drawn by white horses and decorated in white, swing steadily around this hymeneal circuit. It seems like an endless procession. It is not unusual for a wedding pair to spend the first five hours of their honeymoon just riding round and round waiting for the train.

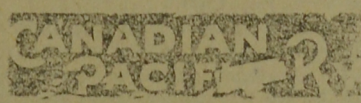
When the screech of the locomotive finally is heard the driver continues to swing up to the platform just as the train comes to a stop. Then the bride and bridegroom make a mad rush for their car amid a shower of rice and confetti and old shoes. The honeymoon parade is over—deluged.

NINETEEN DAYS BURIED.

Story of Marvellous Escape from Messina Ruins.

English papers of last week contain a despatch from Messina telling of the experiences of two girls and a boy, who spent nineteen days buried in the ruins of their home.

The eldest, Giuseppina, is 21, but looks several years younger. Her sister, Natalina, is 12, and the brother, Francesco, 9 years old. The story is best told in the words of the girl.

"We were all three asleep with mother on the second floor of our house in the Piazza del Purgatorio, when, before we could realize that we were in the midst of an earthquake, we felt ourselves plunged down deep into what seemed the bowels of the earth.

"It was pitch dark. We cried, but could not rouse mother. Later when Francesco stumbled across several boxes of matches, we saw that we were in a big cavity. Our mother lay crushed and dead in bed.

"There was a large receptacle full of water. We also gathered in a pile a quantity of olive oil which was dripping down from overhead. We found a supply of dried figs on a shelf, besides bundles of fresh onions.

"We passed most of the time in bed crying and sleeping beside mother's body. Sometime's we grew

tightened; then we struck matches to look at each other. Francesco was always trying to climb and work his way towards where he discovered a tiny chink of light. He told us he was scooping a hole through, and wanted us to come, but we were too weak. Then he disappeared.

"I called him continually, but no answer came. We grew sadder than ever till we heard the strokes of the soldier's axes and spades. Before that we never heard sounds of any sort, nor had we the least idea how long we had been buried until the doctor told us. Then we were amazed.

"The nurses put Francesco next to us; then we learned that he had burrowed a way out for himself, and sat on the top of the ruin till he was able to attract the notice of passers-by."

The little savior of the two girls was much more exhausted than his sisters. They were all given a warm bath and put to bed immediately, but they were allowed too many visits from relatives and friends laden with apples, biscuits, chocolate and marsala, which the young survivors greedily devoured, but today a more rational diet is seen to be imperative, and is strictly limited to broth, milk sops and marsala.

A DANGER OF WAR.

British People Think Japan and U. S. May Fight.

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—"It is the opinion very generally in England that there may soon be war between the United States and Japan. The English public regards the situation between the United States and Japan as being very much strained."

This statement was made to-day by John J. Conway correspondent of a London newspaper who arrived here to-day on the Majestic en route for Japan.

"What excites particular interest in Great Britain," Mr. Conway says, "is the treaty between Britain and Japan. More and more the British public are gaining the impression that the nation may have made a very unwise move in effecting the treaty."

"The public wants to know where Britain will stand in case of war between the United States and Japan, does finally come and it confesses itself wholly at sea at this time to make it out."

"The groundwork of the fear of the public that the Government may have made a blunder in negotiating the treaty with Japan probably lies in the seemingly natural fear which the white race has for the yellow, but there are being advanced now many more reasons."

Mr. Conway said he is going to Japan as a result of a desire to get at the true situation. He will make a study of social and sentimental conditions there to learn the temper of the Japanese towards the United States and Britain.

SET CHILD ON HOT STOVE.

Horrible Revenge of an Illinois Minister, Because Little One Annoyed Him.

STAUNTON, Ill., Feb. 8.—Julius Greenwalt, a coal miner, narrowly escaped rough handling at the hands of an enraged mob last night, after he had placed the four-year-old child of the woman with whom he boarded on top of a red hot stove because the child annoyed him.

Instead of taking Greenwalt to the jail the village Marshal hid him in a restaurant near the interurban station, and when a northbound car arrived he was rushed aboard and taken to Carlinville, where he will await the action of the grand jury. The child is in a serious condition from her burns.
