BIG LAW SUIT ON HERE.

Case of McArthur and McVey vs. City of St. John now being Tried at Circuit Court.

The York Circuit court met at ten o'clock this morning pursuant to adjournment from the suit of George McArthur, William McVey and Joseph McVey vs the City of St. John under a change of venue. Mr. Justice White is presiding and Mr. Fred DeVine is present as court stenographer. Messrs. H. A. Powell, K. C. M. N. Cockburn, K. C. and J. W. Richardson appear for the plaintiffs, and Hon. C. N. Skinner, K. C. and M. G. Teed, K. C. for the defendant. A Jury was sworn without exhausting the panel, and after Mr. Richardson had partially outlined the plaintiff's case the court adjourned until two o'clock. The court room is heated by hot air, but the heating apparatus did not seem to be in good working order this morning, it was found necessary to adjourn the court until two o'clock.

After the usual opening formalities the roll of petit jurors was called ten of the twelve summoned as a special panel answered to their names the absentees being Messrs. J. C. Risteen, and F. I. Morrison. The following good men and true were sworn without any objection being raised by either side G. J. Colter, Ald A. B. Kitchen, Albert Neill, W. Boyd Conn M. B. McNally G. Armstrong and Charles A. Sampson.

Mr. Richardson opened the case for the plaintiff in a comprehensive address. He explained that the action arose over a contract between the plaintiff and the defendant for extending the water works system of the city of St. John to Lake Latimer.

The work, he explained was performed in four sections, and he gave particulars as to where each section commenced and ended. The plaintiff had the contract for sections Nos. 1 and 2 extending from Little River to Lake Latimer. The two sections were tendered for separately and were done under separate and distinct contracts. He read the notice to bidders for the work published by the city, and also, quoted from the form of contract which had been entered into.

The plaintiffs, he said, would prove that in pursuance of the notice to bidders they spent two days going over the different sections in company with Mr. F. A. Barbour, consulting engineer. It would be shown that Mr. Barbour had told the plaintiffs that there was no rock in section No. 2 and that the section would provide sufficient sand and gravel for the aqueduct to be constructed. On the strength of this information obtained in good faith by the plaintiffs, they made up their tender. The contract was signed on May 4th, 1905 and work was commenced soon afterwards. Soon after the work began rock was encountered at points not indicated in the profile and altogether on the division they encountered four thousand cubic yards of rock which Mr. Barbour had not shown in his plans and profiles. The discovery of so much rock made it necessary for the contractor to purchase a costly plant and employ experts in rock cutting in order to carry on the work. He claimed that the facts had been misrepresented to the city, and because of this misrepresentation and deceit they had been put to large expense. After encountering the rock, the contractors complained to the water and sewerage board and after several conferences a bonus of \$15,000 was recommended by the council to be paid to the contractors. This proposal was so hedged in with conditions

Ottawa to resume his duty. However, that the contractors had after much negotiating declined to accept it. The contractors were told to go on with the work and they would be paid a reasonable price for it.

At this stage, Ald. Kitchen, one of the jurors complained of the chilly state of the court room and requested that permission be granted the jury to move over to the sunny side of the house. This was readily granted by his Honor who also complained of the cold.

Caretaker McNally was called to the judge's desk and the information was elicited from him that the heating apparatus was being run to its fullest capacity.

Mr. Skinner proposed an adjournment until two o'clock to allow the court room to heat up and this was granted by the court.

This afternoon when the court re-assembled the room was still too cold for occupancy, and an adjournment was made to the supreme court chamber in the parliament buildings.

BY ACCLAMATION.

Hon. Mr. Templeman Returned in Comox-Atlin by Show of Hands.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 9.—Hon. Mr. Templeman, Minister of Inland Revenue, was yesterday elected by acclamation for Comox-Atlin.

This had been anticipated for several days by those in a position to know, although the more hot headed of the Conservatives wanted a fight. A very steady effect on the situation was the attitude of the Conservative papers like the News Advertiser and Province of Vancouver, which both deprecated opposition to the minister as not only likely to be futile but as illogical, and in the event of its being successful, very bad business for British Columbia.

The heads of Conservative organization took similar views.
