IMPORTANT MATTERS

Discussed at Meeting of Maritime Medical Association - Officers Elected.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., July 15.—(Special)—The officers of the Maritime Medical Association were elected today as follows:

President, W. A. Ferguson, Moncton

Secretary, G. G. Melvin, St. John. Papers were read by Dr. Jardine, Summerside, on "Inflammation and Rheumatism in Childhood," and Dr. A. McNeill, Summerside on "Experience

with Antitoxin."

Dr. Mortizambert, Dominion Health Officer, spoke on tuberculosis, advocating diet and prevention dispensaries and home visitation.

Dr. Black, M.P., of Windsor, in dealing with prevention in disease, said the Federal government should manufacture Serims.

The question was also discussed by Lt. Col. Dr. Jones, Director General of the Medical Service for Canada, who thinks the anti-tuberculosis campaign should be conducted exclusively by medical men.

CONTRACTS RATIFIED.

Important Meeting of the City Council--Carleton Street to be Extended.

A special meeting of the city council was held at the council chamber on Wednesday afternoon for the purpose of considering matters connected with the roads and streets.

Mayor Chestnut was in the chair and Ald. Ryan Ed. Moore, Kitchen; Jewett, Farrell and Calder were present.

The contract of the telephone company for putting a conduit under the streets was confirmed and was ordered to be executed by the Mayor. The company is to pay for the privilege of tapping sewers and must reserve one duct in the conduit for the use of city wires.

The contract with Mr. R. S. Lowe for paving Queen street and that of Maxwell and Simmons for macadamizing King street were also discussed.

Ald. Kitchen suggested that the words "road committee" should be inserted in the contracts after the words "city engineer," so that the committee would be a kind of advisory board, with whom the engineer could consult on road matters. This suggestion was carried out, and the

contracts were referred to a special committee, consisting of Ald. Kitchen, Ald. Ed. Moore, and Ald. Farrell, who will arrange details and have them signed. It was also understood that the contractors will be required to sign the contracts before any further work will be done on the streets.

Speaking about the Carleton street extension, Ald. Farrell stated that he and Ald. Burchill had made negotiations with owners of the land through which the proposed street would pass. They had secured an option for the purchase of about thirty feet on the lower line of Carleton street. Mrs. Sterling Thompson would sell her share for \$300 and Mrs. Archie Jewett would remove the small building fronting on Saunders street at her own expense, and do the necessary fencing. The matter was discussed and a motion to complete the transfer was carried without division.

The road committee, with Ald. Farrell, were appointed to complete the transfer.

MANY WERE DROWNED.

Submarine Torpedo Boat in Collision With Unknown Steamer.

LONDON, July 15.—(Special)—A wireless message received at Portsmouth, states that the submarine torpedo boat CH was in collision last night with an unknown steamer near Lowestoft and was sunk with its crew of sixteen men. Another submarine boat, C17 was damaged in the collision, but the crew was saved.

It is understood that five of the crew of the C17 had no chance to escape being inside the submarine, and went to the bottom with it.

No complete report of the accident has been received, but the latest advices from Sheerness, whence assistance was sent, indicates that some members of the crew of C17 were saved.

AN OROMOCTO SENSATION.

Young Man Arrested on Serious Charge Which Subsequently Fizzled Out.

Some excitement was caused at Oromocto on Tuesday night and yesterday by the disappearance of a girl and the subsequent arrest of a young man in connection with the affair.

It appears that the girl was invited to attend a strawberry festival held below the village and later requested the young man to take her to the home of a lady friend where she wished to spend the night. Her parents becoming anxious at her not returning sent a messenger to enquire her whereabouts from the young man who took her to the festival. The parents of the young girl selected the wrong man as messenger as he was a rival of the one who took her to the festival. The messenger asked the young man where she was and he refused to tell of her whereabouts, so a warrant was sworn out charging him with seduction and he was arrested. The young man then told the constable where the girl was and stated that if her father had enquired her whereabouts in the first place he could have had the information but he did not intend to give it to his rival. He was then released from custody. He now threatens to proceed against somebody for false arrest.

The business of the Foresters High Court of New Brunswick was concluded Wednesday afternoon, after two days session. The following officers were elected and installed by acting Supreme Chief Ranger Harper of Toronto:

Chatham was selected as the next place of meeting. Most of the delegates returned home last evening.

The report of the committee on state of the order was as follows:

1. With regard to the increase of rates made by the supreme court at the last session in June 1908, your committee feel that viewing the matter from a fraternal and business basis the wisdom of the increase in the rates charged to members joining the order prior to 1899 will be fully justified, as time goes on. Your

committee trusts that the result of the actuarial estimate now being made of our own experience will prove that the increase will be sufficient for all time.

2. That the committee feel that your representatives to the supreme court are deserving of credit for having loyally carried out the instructions of this high court in opposing the increase in rates.

3. Your committee beg to report its appreciation of the educational campaign throughout the province during the past year, particularly in the larger centres of population, but regret that the propaganda was not so effectively carried on in the rural districts. Your committee believe that had the supreme court been more active in assisting the high standing committee in this work, there would not have been the large loss in membership shown by the high chief ranger's report, a very large percentage of loss having been in rural districts. We trust that the coming year will see this lost ground regained.

4. Your committee believe that the extension work carried on by Brothers Brewster and Todd has been productive of splendid results in the localities in which they labored during the past year and heartily concur in the recommendation of the High Chief Ranger that the services of the two brothers be maintained, and the work be further extended.

5. Your committee concurs in the view of the High Chief Ranger that a vigorous forward movement be inaugurated and that the high standing committee be instructed to vigorously prosecute the work of resuscitation of weak courts, particularly in rural districts. We feel the need of help there to be much greater than in the larger centres.

THEY FEAR TROUBLE.

Montreal Board of Trade wants Troops Kept at Glace Bay.

MONTREAL, July 15.—(Special)—The Montreal Board of Trade has memorialized Sir Wilfrid Laurier by telegraph against the withdrawal of the troops from Glace Bay.

The telegram states that the Board has been assured that the withdrawal of the troops would mean the destruction of property and loss of life, and cities as ground for action that the Dominion Coal company supplies fuel to railways and to many Montreal industries.

F. L. Wauvlyn, vice-president of the Dominion Coal company, has received a cypher message from General Manager Duggan that united workers are advising members to refrain from violence until the troops are withdrawn, and that they will come to wreck property and bring the company to its knees before the soldiers can return.

THE ABERDEEN MILL.

Rumor that Stetson, Cutler & Co. May Purchase the Property.

There is a rumor afloat that the Aberdeen mill property above town will shortly be disposed of by the Messrs Fraser & Sons to the Stetson Cutler Company of St. John.

Mr. J. C. Cutler, a representative of the Company, was in the city last week and he intimated that it was the intention of the Company to go into the manufacture of pulp if a suitable place in this vicinity could be secured. It is now stated that Mr. Donald Fraser Sr., who owns the Aberdeen mill property will be here next week and that the deal for the purchase of the property will be put through.

If this deal carries it will probably mean the erection of a large pulp mill in this city.

PROPERTY SALE.

Summerville, the former residence of the late Hon. Charles Fisher, which was left by the Fisher estate to the University, was sold at public auction today, and bid in by Mr. C. H. Thomas for \$5,100. The bidding started at four thousand dollars. Messrs. C. H. Thomas and Dell Gunter were the only bidders, and when the five thousand point was reached Mr. Gunter dropped out, and the property was knocked down to Mr. Thomas for \$5,100. Mr. Thomas will make the residence into a double house, one part of which he will occupy himself, and his son, Mr. Frank H. Thomas will reside in the other.
