A GREAT ENTERPRISE.

Dominion Steel Company Branching
into many Lines of Industry.

SYDNEY, N. S., Jan. 8.—(Special)—The indications are that during the year 1909 the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. will greatly enlarge its operations, and will be sellers of a large and more varied line of products from its departments.
At present the company manufactures and sells pig iron of different grades, steel in bars, billets and blooms, and rails and rods. Of different by-products it has sulphuric acid, sulphate of ammonia and tar to dispose of, besides the furnace slag which it sells to the Sydney Cement Co.

For some time there have been rumors that the company might embark in the manufacture of steel plates. This was in contemplation some time ago, and the mill was purchased, but nothing further has

been done.
Now it is stated that the company will this season go a large way into the manufacture and sale of lime. As is well known the company has large areas of the best limestone and a modern kiln and would be in a position to command the market.
During the month of December the actual output of pig iron was 21,670 tons, steel 27,000 tons. Shipments aggregated 22,150 tons, and except for the delay in the arrival of shipping this would have run up to 27,000 tons as sufficient material was on hand to make up this quantity. It has since been loaded on the "Indian Monarch," which sailed on Monday evening, or is now being shipped on the Fridtjof Nansen, which is expected to sail at the end of this week or the first of next.

MET DEATH ON TRAIL.

Englishmen Who Started For Gold Fields Have Disappeared.

The mysterious disappearance and probable death of two young Englishmen bound from Edmonton to the placer gold diggings on the Ingenia river last summer is the essence of another tale which has just reached the outside from the recesses of the lonesome wilderness of the north. Messrs. T. R. Wilson and A. Luffenden, arrivals from Port Essington by the steamer Camosun recently, brought the report.

On March 28, Harry Phipps and Matthew Tummon started from Edmonton for the Ingenia. They had spared no expense in securing a good outfit for the long overland trip, and with four horses loaded down with provisions and camp equipment they expected to make the journey without privation or great hardship.

On June 4, the two men reached Fort Grahame, on the Findlay river. They had made fairly good time considering that they had not pushed their animals which were all in the best of condition. Supplies were rather low and these they replenished while resting at Fort Grahame. They left the Hudson Bay post on June 8, following the banks of the Findlay river in the direction of the new diggings. Sixty miles north of Fort Grahame they made the camp at which they were last seen on June 13. From that date they never returned to their camp.

The four horses were discovered by Indians shortly after the two men were last seen. In the camp were found all the provisions and equipment carried by the missing men. A shotgun was lying in their tent. For several weeks the camp was not touched by the Indians, who took it for granted that the owners were out prospecting and would eventually return, though some wonder was caused by the fact that no provision had been made for the horses to secure feed. Finally the Indians reported the disappearance of the men to Hudson Bay Agent Fox at Fort Grahame.

About this time Messrs. Wilson and Luffenden ran across the camp, and learning the facts of the case they took an inventory of the supplies and took the horses to Fort Grahame. Mr. Fox took charge of the animals and sent out a report of the case to the Government agent at Hazelton.

While the fate of the men is a mystery, it is generally believed they were drowned. It is not believed they could have got lost, as they had the river to guide them even if they had strayed away from their camp. Mr. Fox, at last accounts, was awaiting the arrival of an expert Indian tracker to send him out to search for the bodies of Phipps and Tummon.

Pulling the Eagle's Tail.

I know an Indian, Yellow Eagle, who in order to get his coup feather dug a hole in the ground on the open prairie far from camp or habitation. Over it he fixed a covering of brush, upon which was laid the carcass of a freshly slain antelope. In this trap he lay for three days awaiting the eagle's coming. When at last, lured by the bait, one did alight he seized it from below, and despite its dapping and clawing and pecking he plucked the precious feathers before freeing the astonished and terrified bird. I recall none but the American aboriginal who has been able successfully to pull the American eagle's tail.—Army and Navy Life.

In World's Race Now.

That Nova Scotia is able to compete with the world in steel-making has been established. The general manager of the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. of Sydney, C.B., announces that an order has been received by the company for steel rails to be manufactured for the Southern Punjab Railway Co. The quantity consists of 9,000 tons of eighty-pound rails, and will be sent direct by steamer via the Suez Canal. The order has been secured in competition with the mills of the world, and had to be approved by the Viceroy of India.

Using Nova Scotia Apples.

The bulk of London's apple supply for popular purposes for the time being is derived from the Nova Scotia crop. The apples are not only large but of exceptionally good quality, and are meeting with much appreciation.

BOY DROWNED.

Albert County Lad lost his Life while Skating.

RIVERSIDE, N. B., Jan. 8.—(Special)—A very sad accident occurred at Chester, near here about four o'clock yesterday afternoon by which Horace, the young son of Simon Colwell, lost his life.

He, with some younger brothers was skating on the bank of a small stream near their home, when he slipped on the ice and fell into the water, and before aid could be summoned the swift current of the stream, which was greatly swollen by the freshet, had carried him out of sight. Up till nine o'clock the body had not been recovered. Much sympathy is being expressed for the bereaved parents.
