LOTHARIO BY TRADE

Man in Frisco Is Charged With Wholesale Bigamy.

HAD 25 WOMEN VICTIMS

John Madison Is Arrested After a Career of Marrying and Swindling Middle-Aged Widows All Over the Country—Operated in Toronto and Hamilton Some Time Ago—Numerous Aliases

San Francisco, Cal., July 12.—"Yes, I annexed a couple of merry widows, but I wasn't fool enough to marry all of the women the police say I did."

Sitting in his cell in the city prison, John Madison, alias Christian C. Johnson, alias John C. Anderson, alias C. O. Moeller, cogitated on the follies of his old age. The police are busy untangling his voluminous record, which is said to extend to a dozen different cities and involve the affections and bank rolls of about 25 women. Included in the roster is a marriage in Toronto and Hamilton, Ont.

The authorities say they have established his marriage to ten women and his engagement and possible marriage to 14 others. Each is said by the police to have lost more or less money through acquaintance with Madison.

Among those to whom Madison is alleged to have been married appears the name of Mrs. Mary Higgins Drown of Springfield, Mass., who is said to have lost \$500.

Mrs. Sylvia Pollard de Bonnett of this city is another of his alleged victims. Mrs. de Bonnett and "Johnson," it is alleged, were married in San Rafael in August, 1906. Immediately afterward, after getting some of her money, Madison is said to have deserted her.

Advices from Stockton are to the effect that Mrs. Jessie Tretheway of that city has left for San Jose to swear to a complaint against him, her marriage to "Johnson" having been performed in that city. In the event that the warrant is issued in San Jose the case will be turned over to San Jose authorities and "Johnson" will be prosecuted in that city.

"Johnson" stoutly denied yesterday that he had ever assumed the name of Madison. He declared that it was laughable to connect him with so many women. "I married two of them," he said. "Mrs. McLeod of this city and Mrs. Tretheway of Stockton are the only wives I ever had. I am willing to plead guilty to a charge of bigamy if they will be a little lenient with me and do not try to saddle too much trouble on my shoulders."

John Madison has not been heard from since 1903. It was about this time that Christian Johnson began his operations, and the police believe that Johnson and Madison are the same man.

Madison's record is a long one and includes dealings with women in Cincinnati, Ohio; Louisville, Ky.; Kalamazoo, Mich.; Hot Springs, Ark.; Kansas City, Mo.; Olean, N.Y.; Toronto, Canada; Los Angeles, Stockton, San Francisco; Gettysburg, Ohio; St. John's, Mich.; Hamilton, Ont.; and in Germany. Almost without exception his alleged victims have been widows or women of middle age.

Sleep-Walker Has Narrow Escape.
Ravenna, Neb., July 12.—While walking in her sleep Miss Lois Campbell, the 16-year-old daughter of President Campbell of the Frisco System, leaped from the rear platform of her father's private car attached to a Chicago-Burlington and Quincy flyer, as the train was speeding over the prairies west of Ravenna, early Friday.

She was practically uninjured.

Constable's Act Appreciated.
Vancouver, B.C., July 12.—In connection with the attempted hold-up of train No. 58, near Ducks, on the night of June 21, on account of Constable Decker's action in endeavoring to capture the would-be hold-up, resulting in his being shot, the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. have placed with the Royal Trust Co. \$2,500 to be used for the education of Constable Decker's son.

Liberal Wins in Yorkshire.
London, July 12.—The bye-election held on Saturday in the Cleveland division of North Riding, Yorkshire, in consequence of the promotion of Herbert Louis Samuel to the chancellorship of the Duchy of Lancaster in succession to Lord Fitzmaurice, resulted in the re-election of Mr. Samuel, who obtained a majority of 971 votes.

A Dangerous Fire.
Providence, July 12.—A drifting barge, sending forth frequent explosions from her cargo of 135,000 gallons of burning oil, and a quarter of a square mile of the harbor water ablaze from the same cause, endangered the entire waterfront and shipping of this city for 18 hours.

Seven Years for Fraud.
London, July 12.—Dominique Taddeo, the young Italian found guilty by Magistrate Love on nine charges of fraud and of uttering forged postal notes, with the intention of defrauding the Government, was sentenced Saturday to seven years in Kingston Penitentiary.

Two Drown.
North Bay, July 12.—Edward Q. Wordsworth, whose relatives are in England, and Gustave Ekenstam of North Bay, were drowned in the Missanabi River, on the line of the National Transcontinental Railway.

Kitchener Goes to Australia.
Melbourne, Australia, July 12.—(C.A.P. Cable)—Lord Kitchener has accepted the invitation to visit Australia and report on the condition of the military defenses.

TO ADMIT CHINESE.

Canadian Immigration Law Is Made Less Severe.

Vancouver, B.C., July 12.—Acting upon the request of the Chinese of Vancouver, the Dominion Government has, by order-in-council, approved on May 4, 1909, removed many of the restrictions imposed on Chinese immigration.

According to advices received yesterday from Ottawa, the scope of exempt class, that is those Chinese who are not called upon to pay the head tax of \$500, has been greatly widened. Immediately the order was approved, its terms were forwarded to all Canadian immigration and customs authorities, but so quietly that the public till to-day never received an intimation of the change in regulations. In a word, the new order widens the scope of the Chinese immigration act of 1906, with the amendment of 1908 in regard to the privileged class of Chinese, that it practically leaves only Chinese laborers to pay the head tax, with paupers, lunatics and sufferers from infectious diseases still prohibited. The new order puts even "students of manners and customs," in the student and merchant class and exempt from the payment of head tax.

Finance Bill Passes.

Berlin, July 12.—The Reichstag finished the finance reform legislation Saturday evening. It is eight months since the measures were first introduced. The complete legislation comprises but little the Government's original proposals.

The scheme finally adopted consists of higher taxes on beer, tobacco and brandy, and higher duties on coffee, effervescent wines, cordials and tea. The duty on tea has been quadrupled. The House also adopted a stamp tax on checks, stubs for the renewal of dividends, and coupon sheets, as well as a higher stamp tax for issue of new stocks and bonds, which will affect foreign securities. A tax on transfer of real estate was also adopted, with a resolution requiring that a bill be introduced by April 1, 1911, for taxing the unearned increment in land values.

The National Liberals, Clericals and Socialists voted against all the bills.

Cure for Diabetes.

New York, July 12.—After a series of experiments in the clinics of Mount Sinai Hospital in this city carried on for the last two years and a half by Dr. J. Rudisch of the visiting staff, it has just made a preliminary report on the use of atropine in diabetes. He considers it a cure for that widespread disease which is attacking more and more New Yorkers every year in these "strenuous life" days.

Atropine is the active principle of belladonna or "deadly nightshade." It has never before been tried in kidney troubles, though it was well-known that it was chiefly eliminated by the kidneys and therefore exerted a pronounced effect on those organs.

Wouldn't Pay for Leg.

Windsor, July 12.—Minus one leg, the body of Thomas G. McDonald, former mate of the steamer Douglas, drowned June 29, and picked up in Detroit River Thursday, was buried Saturday at Algona. The leg is in Wayne County morgue and will probably be taken care of by the county. Coroner Burgess says the relative refused to pay \$15 asked by local undertakers for its preparation for shipment. This leg was picked up by Edward Lilly, the young man who was drowned the next evening almost at the point where he found the leg.

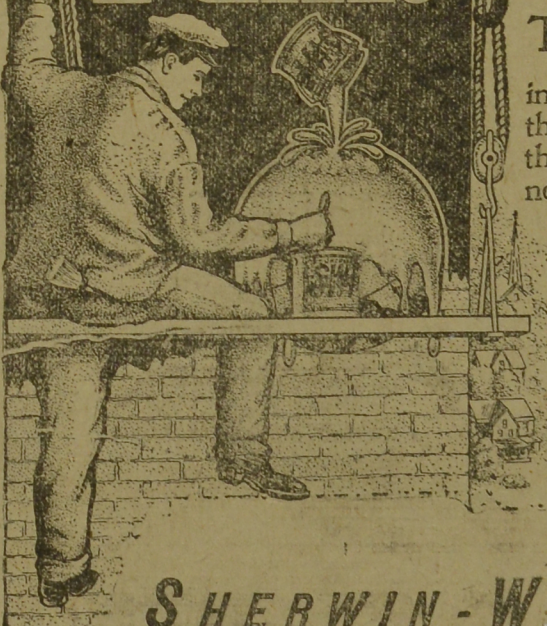
