MEDICOS IN SESSION.

Meeting of Maritime Association Opened at Charlottetown Today.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., July 14.—(Special)—The meeting of the Maritime Medical Association opened here this morning with a good attendance, President Dr. P. C. Murphy of Tignish, in the chair.

Mayor Prowse welcomed the visitors to the city. Drs. Atherton, Fredericton; Chisholm, Halifax; McLauchlan, Charlottetown, were appointed a committee to deal with Dr. Ruddle's suggestion submitted to a meeting of the Provincial Association registration this morning.

Dr. A. F. Miller of Saranac, N. Y., read a paper on the diagnostic value of tuberculin in pulmonary tuberculosis.

Tonight President Murphy will deliver his annual address on the educational responsibilities to mankind in general of the family doctor.

He will speak of grave responsibilities bestowed upon the latter, who is made guide, counsellor and friend in the home. The dangers of motherhood will be referred to, and great care to be exercised at critical state emphasized.

The doctor will speak strongly against diseases resulting from immorality and point out the duty of the physician who should attend to the correction of a vicious heredity by properly instructing their clientele.

In dealing with tuberculosis Dr. Murphy believes in encouraging system whereby the weak shall be provided for by mating with strong and the process of true national selection brought about. The white plague would thus be eradicated without danger to the social system.

MAY HAVE SKIPPED.

Creditors of Newcastle Man Anxious Concerning His Whereabouts.

CHATHAM, July 14.—(Special)—Creditors of O. A. Coto, who conducted a clothes pressing and dyeing business here for some months, are anxious about his disappearance from town a few days ago, and it is thought he is away to the States.

Lately he has been into the Starr Steam Laundry business with S. A. Gould, and has left the books in a bad state, collecting a lot of debts, and failing to pay the employees of

the laundry. Coto was in town Saturday, and is known to have collected considerable money.

Telephone messages from his wife who lives in Newcastle, stated he was sick in bed there. If Coto has absconded much sympathy will be felt for Mr. Gould, who has worked hard to build up his laundry business, and has been defrauded by his partners on three separate occasions.

MONCTON BUDGET.

Pathetic Features in Connection with the Tragic Death of Walter Steeves.

MONCTON, July 14.—(Special)—The I. C. R. new board of management is calling for tenders for the erection of a car repair shop at St. John, N.B. Tenders, it is understood are to be in before the end of the month.

Coroner J. D. Ross has decided that an inquest is not necessary in regard to the death of Walter Steeves, the young man who received fatal injuries by falling under a working train on the G. T. P. near this city yesterday afternoon.

There were unusually pathetic features in connection with the fatality. Steeves' brother was an eye witness of the affair, the two brothers just having eaten dinner together, when Walter boarded the train, slipping beneath the wheels before the eyes of his horrified brother a minute later, and being terribly crushed.

The deceased young man had been married but four months, and his death was a fearful shock to the bride. He was inspector for Corbett & Ploesch company on the new railway line.

THE I. O. F. MEETING.

Address of the Acting Supreme Ranger--General Business Transacted.

After the reports of the high court officials had been submitted, A. S. Harper of Toronto, acting supreme chief ranger, and L. W. Fraser of P. E. Island, were introduced, the former making a brief address. The following committees were appointed:

At last evening's meeting A. H. Harper of Toronto, acting supreme chief ranger, delivered an interesting address in explanation of the mortuary benefits of the order. He stated that mortuary benefits were based on the constitution of the order, and it was important that members should read the conditions of their contracts. He pointed out that the supreme court had not done away with total disability benefits which equal one-half the amount of insurance carried and is paid in one payment. Those who have come in since 1899 must pay in five annual payments. There is also the total disability allowance for those attaining the age of 70.

He explained that a person having

BAPTISTS IN SESSION.

Two Hundred Delegates in Attendance at Association Meeting--Encouraging Reports.

GIBSON, E. B., July 13.—The United Baptist church of this place opened its doors in welcome to the ministers' conference which precedes the meeting of the N. B. United Baptists Association. There were about fifty ministers present, about all sections of the province being represented.

Rev. J. H. McDonald, of Fredericton, was elected chairman; Rev. S. J. Perry, of Parkdale, assistant chairman; Rev. A. A. Rideout, secretary and treasurer.

Rev. C. W. Townsend read a very able, comprehensive and helpful paper on pastoral visitation, and after a hearty discussion a unanimous vote of thanks was passed.

Rev. C. T. Phillips, of Jacksonville, then read a most instructive, thoughtful paper on The Strength and Weakness of the Denomination. It also was thoroughly discussed and he was heartily thanked.

The programme for next year was left in the hands of the executive. A resolution was passed urging upon the association the necessity of formulating a rule governing the admission of others to the Baptist pulpits.

At the evening session, Rev. F. E. Bishop, of Fairville, preached the annual sermon of the association from the 2nd Thess. second chapter and fourteenth verse. He said there was much criticism of the church in these days, that it was not representative of Christianity. He wished to make a plea for the church. First, the church took its principles from the Kingdom. If it was too narrow for men, then was the Kingdom too narrow, second, a church is founded on regeneration principles and is a voluntary organization; third, the church aims to shape a man into the character of Jesus Christ; fourth, the church gives us an opportunity for mutual worship, therefore a great mistake is made when other organizations exalt above the church. The church has done great work, but its fundamental work is to save men's souls and to maintain a life in active communion with God. The church cannot work apart from individual consecrated service. When this is realized then shall the purposes of the church be accomplished. It was a magnificent effort.

At its conclusion, Evangelist Beatty led a social conference, which was participated in by many.

GIBSON, July 14.—Beautiful weather greets by all odds the largest attendance that has yet been at an association of the United Baptists of N. B. There are about 200 ministers and delegates present. The services opened by a religious conference meeting from 9 to 10 o'clock, led by Rev. H. H. Saunders, of Sussex. It was a magnificent service.

The regular business session of the Association opened at 10 a.m., Rev. Z. L. Fash, of Hillsborough, in the chair. In the absence of the clerk, Judge F. W. Emmerson, of Moncton, the Ass. Clerk, Rev. A. A. Rideout, of Fredericton, acted. Rev. Prof. E. M. Kierstead, of McMaster University of Toronto led in prayer.

It was resolved that a telegram of condolence be sent to Rev. E. L. Steeves, of Middle Sackville, pastor of Hartland, who was stricken with paralysis at Hillsborough while preaching last Sunday evening.

Rev. R. J. Colpitts, of Port Elgin was given charge of enrollment of ministers and delegates.

Revs. C. P. Wilson, W. R. Robinson and J. H. McDonald were chosen a committee on arrangement. The nominating committee was composed as follows: Revs. Dr. McIntyre, Fletcher, G. W. Foster, B. H. Thomas, F. E. Bishop, Geo. Howard, M. E. Nobles, W. E. Wentworth, E. C. Coty and Messrs. J. E. Slipp and C. W. Weymon.

Miss H. Blackmer, returned missionary led a prayer service. Miss Bennett gave the annual report, showing 18 new societies organized and great progress. Mr. W. E. McIntyre, of St. John, Supt. of Missions Boards, reported 5 new boards organized and a large increase in finances.

The President's address was then read, after which a workers conference was held, led by Mrs. D. Hutchinson of St. John.

Moderator Fash presented his annual report as follows: God has given Baptists a splendid heritage in these provinces. Everyone should feel their responsibility for its care. The census gave Baptists as 80,946 people—more than twice as numerous as the next numerous protestant body. There is no dislike against others fighting the same battle as they were. Baptists stood for liberty of conscience. They also stood for strong convictions which were of one power. These opportunities urge to missionary zeal. A great need of the denomination was increased giving to nothing towards world-wide salvation. There is also a great need of spiritual power. That is the greatest need of all. He urged to prayerfulness and Christlikeness.

Rev. Dr. McLeod, Cor. Sec. presented his report. There were 286 churches arranged in 10 districts. 233 churches reported 26,851 members of whom 20,188 were residents. There were 649 baptisms—a net gain of 515 members. There are 101 pastors serving 237 churches. There are 27 church buildings. There are 27 licentiates. There was raised a total of \$122,687.25; \$58,638.53 for salaries. The average amount paid per resident church member was \$6.04 for all purposes. For foreign work it was but \$1.05.

The report was discussed vigorously by Revs. D. Hutchinson, Dr. Phillips, and the fact that though the figures seemed somewhat bewildering, yet because of the inaccuracies and omissions of the report, they were not a fair statement of work done and contributions given. The Revs. Dr. McIntyre, R. B. Smith, Dr. E. M. Kierstead, G. D. Milbury, H. C. Colrae, J. H. McDonald and H. C. Creed also spoke.

Jas. Patterson of St. John, treasurer, reported as follows: Amount on hand, \$208.16; total receipts, \$1,348.34; expenditures, \$948.34; investments and trust funds on hand are \$7,128.36.

Revs. Dr. Kierstead, of Toronto; H. T. De Wolfe and J. W. Higgins, of Wolfville, and M. L. Gregg, of Providence, were invited to seats in the Association.

Rev. Dr. McIntyre, of St. John, Supt. of Home Missions, reported that a number of outside men had come in relieving the lack of men heretofore complained of. 34 fields had received help to the amount of about \$4,000. Rev. B. Beatty had been engaged as an evangelist with good results, and Rev. Dr. Phillips now engaged as a general missionary. The outlook was very promising for a forward movement.

Rev. F. E. Bishop was thanked for his excellent sermon and he was invited to publish it. The Sussex Main street church asked the Association to meet with it next year. It was accepted. The 7th district meeting in a communication urged a maritime union of Home Mission interests and the ordination of Licentiate Clifford T. Clark, of St. John west. A petition to the latter effect was also presented from the Chance Harbor church.

The Women's Missionary Society met in the Methodist church. Mrs. C. W. Weymon, of Abohaqui in the chair.
