HE WAS A BAD BOY

Shelley's Innocence Seems Better Proven, However.

RELIC AT THE INQUEST

Portion of Skull of Late Michael Hall Exhibited in Court Room—Evidence Seems to Support Accident Theory Crown Attorney Asks For an Adjournment and Hints at Another Suspect.

Simcoe, Aug. 20.—The rather unusual proceeding of exhibiting a piece of a dead man's body as evidence in an inquest was resorted to by Dr. Meek yesterday at Coroner W. A. McIntosh's enquiry into the death of Michael Hall, who was shot from behind as he was entering his home, in Charlotteville Township, Sunday afternoon.

Deceased was buried last Tuesday, but Dr. Meek in his post-mortem sawed out a triangular section of the skull containing the bullet hole, and produced it as exhibit "B" this afternoon. It lay on the table in front of the aged Mrs. Hall during her one and a half-hours' examination. The skull of some other party unknown was also displayed for the purpose of showing precisely the location of the fatal wound.

While conclusive evidence was adduced identifying the boy, Emory Shelley, and his 22-calibre rifle, with the Hall vicinity at the time of the fatality, and also showing the boy to be of rather wild habits, the theory that the shooting was accidental seemed to strengthen.

Crown Attorney Slaght asked for an adjournment at 6.30 p.m., because he believed that more evidence might be gathered that might put suspicion for the killing of Hall on some party other than the accused.

W. E. Kelly, K.C., was granted the privilege of cross-examining the witnesses in the interest of young Shelley and succeeded pretty well in making light of the allegations as to the desperado tendencies of the prisoner, until a letter from his mother to one of the lad's former employers was produced.

FAVOR NEW SIGHT

O.R.A. Officers Foresee Adoption of B.S.A. Device.

IT HELPS POOR MARKSMEN

Major Helmer, D.A.G.M., at Semi-Annual Meeting, Proposes That Government Will Take Up New Peep-Sight—Will Work Wonders in Standard of Rifle-manship—Used at Bisley.

Long Branch, Aug. 20.—It is only a matter of time till the B.S.A. peep sight, which experts agree is the best rifle sight ever invented, will be issued by the Government to the Canadian militia, in the opinion of Major Helmer, D.A.G.M.

Many prominent officers of the militia discussed the new sight at the semi-annual meeting of the members of the O.R.A. here yesterday on a motion by W. H. Moore of the 77th regiment, Dundas, that the association council be urged to adopt the sight as has already been done by the Bisley association.

Major Alex. Elliott, who is a skilled optician explained that not more than 10 per cent. of marksmen have good eyes, and that the new sight was such an aid to the eye that all competitors would be practically placed on the same footing. It had been shown at the Bisley matches, another officer stated, that an ordinary rifleman using the B.S.A. sight could shoot all round an expert using any of the sights now generally in use. Major Helmer explained as the reason for the new sight not having been adopted this year, that the lack of facilities for distributing them, made it inadvisable. Only a few rifle-men had the B.S.A. sight, he said, and by permitting their use the great bulk of marksmen would have been at a disadvantage. The matter of adopting the new sight will be considered at the next meeting of the O.R.A. council.

The meeting was held at the noon hour in the officers' tent at the ranges, E. B. Osler, president, in the chair. Besides a hundred or more members the following prominent officers were present: Col. Macdonald, Lt.-Col. John Bruce, Major W. C. King, Major DeBury, Major Dillon, Major Mercer, Major Elliott, Major Helmer and Captain Miller, secretary.

The following were elected to represent the O. R. A. on the council of the D. R. A.: Major Mercer, Major King, Captain Pain, Captain A. A. Smith, Major Hutheson, Major McCrimmon and Captain A. T. Phillips. A committee consisting of Majors Helmer, Dillon and Mercer, Captains J. Crowe and Pain, was appointed to choose a team to represent Ontario in the shoot at Ottawa for the London Merchants' Cup in the D. R. A. meet.

A veteran among Canadian sharpshooters, Captain C. R. Crowe, of Guelph, pulled ahead in the final stage of the City of Toronto match, which was shot off yesterday afternoon, winning a gold medal and \$25.

Pte. A. Wilson of the 43rd, D.O.C. R., Ottawa, made the high score in the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York match, winning a silver medal and \$25. Sgt. Morris, of the 46th Bowmanville, a Bisley man, won second prize, consisting of a bronze medal and \$20, while P. M. S. Craig, of the 10th Grenadiers, Toronto, secured third prize, \$15.

The wind was the trickiest that the marksmen have had to deal with during the meet, and the scoring was low. Such shooting as a miss following a bullseye was very common, even among the crack shots.

An 8-Year-Old Traveler.

New York, Aug. 20.—Although he is only 8 years old, Master E. Maxim Joubert, grandson of Sir Hiram Maxim, inventor of the Maxim gun, left here Wednesday on the Lusitania of the Cunard Line, to visit his grandfather in Dulwich, England. His parents went to the boat with him, saw that his baggage was put in Cabin B 71, and asked the stewardess who had charge of that room to keep an eye on the lad. As the vessel backed out into the stream the boy stood at the rail waving adieu to his parents.

"He can take pretty good care of himself," said his father on the pier, "and we won't worry about him."

New York, Aug. 20.—Angry farmers found the body of Frederick Krouse late yesterday where he had hanged himself from a tree not far from the house of George W. Smith, at Parsippany, N.J. At daybreak yesterday morning he attacked Smith's wife with a club. She is in the hospital here with a fractured skull and a broken arm.

Niagara Falls Cemetery.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Aug. 20.—There will be no lonely cemetery under the tall dark pines beside the Whirlpool. Coroner F. W. E. Wilson, whose jurisdiction extends over the territory round the Whirlpool does not approve of the proposition of the Queen Victoria Park Commissioners to inter all bodies recovered from the Whirlpool, which are not identified and claimed by relatives in a necropolis beside the pool.

The coroner thinks that a board which has so much money to expend on the up-keep of the park should be able to spare the forty dollars necessary to give Christian burial to each unfortunate victim of Niagara.

Grain Traffic Decreases.

Kingston, Aug. 20.—The grain elevators here this year experienced the smallest grain delivery since 1884, the smallest on record.

In 1908, there was the greatest amount of grain ever shipped to Kingston, about 15,000,000 bushels, being reported to the local Government Canal Agent. In 1907, over 13,000,000 bushels were received here.

This year only about one-quarter of last year's figures has so far been received. There will be cargoes throughout the fall, but it is doubtful if more than one-third of last year's elevator business will be done.

Militia in Ontario.

Port Arthur, Aug. 20.—A new company will be formed in connection with the 96th Regiment here, making a complete regiment in this city. The Fort William companies will withdraw and form a new regiment to be known as the 103rd Fusiliers.

This makes three regiments in place of one in the past four years, the other being Kenora and Rainy River.

The 96th Regiment received much praise in a letter from Col. Steele for action during the strike trouble at Port William.
