A SERIOUS FIRE.

The store of Mr. R. W. Hammond at Edmundston, was destroyed by fire on Thursday night with most of its contents. There was \$9000 insurance on the stock.

TEACHER'S APPOINTMENT.

Miss Rhodie McDougall of Shediac, formerly a successful teacher at Milltown, has been appointed to a position on the Model school staff, in place of Miss Annie Richardson, resigned.

MRS. FINNAMORE'S FUNERAL.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Jas. Finnamore took place at two o'clock this afternoon and was largely attended. Rev. Sub. Dean Street conducted the service at the Cathedral and interment took place at the Rural cemetery.

CRICKET MATCH.

The Fredericton and Military Cricket teams are playing a return match at Sculley's grove this afternoon. The Fredericton club will play a return game with the St. John team at St. John about Thursday next, and will probably play another game in this city about September third.

CALLED TO SYDNEY.

Mr. McConnell was received a unanimous invitation to the pastorate of the Methodist church at Sydney, (C. B.) to take effect at the close of the present conference year in June 1910.

LICENSE FEE DEMANDED.

Organizer Odell, of the Boot and Shoe Maker's Union, who has been here for the past few weeks in connection with the shoe factory strike, was waited upon by Chief Hawthorn yesterday and requested to pay a license fee of \$5 per week for the privilege of doing business here. He was naturally surprised at the proposition and asked for time to look into the matter. The local union men declare that there is no precedent for such a course and talk of carrying the case to the city council which meets on Monday.

FUNERAL LAST EVENING.

The remains of the late Douglas Bell, who died at Moncton, were brought here on Friday night by C. P. R. Undertaker J. G. Adams met the remains at Salamanca and the interment took place at Forest Hill at nine o'clock last evening. Rev. Dean Schofield conducted the service. Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Hay and Mrs. J. M. Bell, of Moncton, accompanied the remains here. The deceased gentleman was a son of the late T. M. Bell of this city.

COUNCIL MEETING.

A special meeting of the city council has been called for Monday afternoon to deal with the question of the appointment of a city engineer in succession to A. K. Grimmer. It is understood that there are several applicants for the vacancy. The question of paving Queen street from Carleton street to city hall will also be considered. The feeling is strong in favor of having the work completed this fall.

PICNIC TUESDAY.

The Catholic picnic at Oromocto will be held on Tuesday afternoon and evening of next week, and a large number are going to drive down from this city. A fine program of sports have been arranged. Music will be furnished for dancing, and a good time, good refreshments, good meals, and a good drive will be in it for anyone attending from here.

AT GRAND FALLS.

In three automobiles the St. John river commissioners went to Grand Falls to inspect the work being constructed there, toward generating power from the stream. They found that considerable work had already been done and that the project promises to prove a great factor in the development of the St. John river valley.

BROKE HIS ARM.

A young son of Mr. Edward Reynolds, of Hainesville, fell down cellar at his father's building, St. Mary's, on Friday afternoon and fractured his left arm. Surgical aid was summoned and the injured boy attended to.

THE JUDICATURE ACT.

Copies of the new judicature act which will come into effect in September have been received in the city. Under the new legislation the present supreme court and equity court will be replaced by the supreme court of judicature, which will be divided into two sections, the King's bench and chancery divisions. The new act is similar to that in force in England and in most of the other provinces in Canada. The practice is simpler and one advantage will be that a lawyer going from New Brunswick to any other part of Canada will find it easier to adapt himself to his new surroundings.

LOTS OF CANDIDATES.

The municipal contest in the parish of Douglas promises to be a warm one. The candidates in the field are Coun. Rogers of Nashwaaksis, Geo. Colter, Jr., Jesse Merrithew and Fred Flewelling of Keswick, and William Seymour of Royal Road. They are conducting a vigorous canvass and are all confident of success. Mr. Seymour is a brother of the late Mr. George Seymour, who represented the parish for a number of years. In the parish of Bright it is understood that the veteran Coun. McKee has made up his mind to retire. Mr. Cleveland Patterson and Mr. John Noble are in the field. Coun. Reynolds will likely seek re-election.

COW MOOSE SHOT.

Hartland Observer: A cow moose that had become almost domesticated around Barter's Hotel at the Forks of Miramichi was shot two or three weeks ago. The remains were found just fifty yards from the hotel. Mr. Barter was away at the time and no other men belonging to the place were about. Prof. W. P. Watson was a guest at the hotel at the time. He had just returned from a fishing trip when he heard three pistol shots fired in rapid succession. Later the moose was found, and upon examination three bullets from a revolver were discovered.

BIG GAME PLENTIFUL.

Mr. Charles Cremin, the well known guide, returned last evening from a trip to his camps on the Nepisiguit river. Mr. A. C. Brown, a prominent New York lawyer, has already arrived at Mr. Cremin's camps and will remain there until October 1st. Mr. and Mrs. Underwood, of Boston, are also on the Nepisiguit, taking photos of big animals and otherwise amusing themselves. Mr. Cremin reports big game exceedingly plentiful on the Nepisiguit this year.

DEATH YESTERDAY.

The death took place on Friday evening of Mr. Fred W. Estey, son of Mr. J. F. Estey of Nashwaaksis, after a lingering illness. The deceased young man was twenty years of age, and was for a time on the Bank of Nova Scotia staff in this city. He is survived by his parents, two brothers and two sisters. The funeral will take place tomorrow, Sunday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. Service will be held at the house and interment will be made at the Pickard cemetery, Douglas.

TODAY'S MARKET.

The market today was very well attended. Some of the produce sold well, but eggs and butter were slow sellers owing to the unreasonable prices asked. Butter was disposed of at 25cts; eggs brought 23cts per dozen but went slowly; blueberries sold at 70cts per pail; apples 20 cts per peck; potatoes 20cts per peck; beans, 20cts per peck; currants 60cts per half peck; turnips sold at 1ct each; beans 5cts per bunch. A quantity of lamb sold at 11 cents per lb.
