BOARD OF TRADE.

(Continued from Fourth Page.)

A communication from the secre-
tary of the Canadian Manufacturing
Association in reference to the re-
modelling of the form of bill of lad-
ing now in use, occasioned some dis-
cussion.

Mr. McCready thought that as the
matter was now in the hands of ex-
perts it could very well be left with
them.

Mr. McCready thought that the in-
terests of the merchants should be
protected in any changes that may be
made.

A motion approving of the new
form of bill of lading was adopted.

President Hodge referred to the re-
cent increase in rates by the N. B.
Telephone Company and suggested
that a conference be held between the
Board and directors of the Company
on the subject.

The suggestion was approved and
the president and secretary were ap-
pointed a committee to arrange for
such a meeting.

Mr. J. T. Jennings spoke strongly
in favor of the Board of Trade hold-
ing meetings once every three months
instead of annually. He thought it
would have a tendency to bring about
greater interest in the work of the
Board, and would broaden its influ-
ence.

Ald. Clarke strongly endorsed the
remarks made by Mr. Jennings. He
referred to the success of the Board
in having the arbitrary freight rates
removed and thought there was im-
portant work along other lines that
might be done.

Mayor Chestnut submitted a com-
munication from Mr. Robert Rich-
ards of Annapolis, Ont., embodying
a proposition for the establishment
of a clothespin factory in this city.
The industry will employ from ten to
fifteen hands and require about one
million feet of hardwood lumber, for
which he would be willing to pay \$10
per thousand cut in the round logs.
Figures were given to show that
clothespins could be manufactured at
a handsome profit.

Mr. Lemont expatiated eloquently
on the great necessity of having more
factories in Fredericton.

Mr. Jennings spoke briefly along
the same line.

On motion of Mr. Diblee a com-
mittee composed of the Mayor and
secretary was appointed to take the
matter up with Mr. Richards.

Mayor Chestnut brought up the
question of discrimination against
Fredericton in the matter of passen-
ger rates and urged that the matter
be placed before the railway commis-
sion as soon as possible. He pointed
out that at present the fare from
Fredericton Junction to Fredericton
was added to the St. John rate on a
ticket to Fredericton from west-
ern points.

Mr. Diblee stated that the matter
had already been referred to the
council.

The meeting then adjourned.

A Rotary Rudder.

There is on view at the Lepine toy
exhibition in Paris the invention of a
French engineer which will, its in-
ventor contends, revolutionize marine
and aerial navigation. The invention
consists of a rotary rudder, said to be
capable of turning a vessel in its own
length or at any desired angle. All ex-
isting steering contrivances are limited
in their action to a deflection of 90
degrees to right or left. It is claimed
that by the adoption of the new in-
vention sea collision will be prevent-
ed and warships will be able to turn
in their own length. An aeroplane
fitted with the new rudder would be
able to leave the ground instantly.

Artificial Black Diamonds.

Carbon in an amorphous fused con-
dition—real black diamond—is produc-
ed in a simple manner by a process
lately patented in France by M. Bon-
net. A vessel of bronze or other metal
contains two carbon electrodes, be-
tween which is a rod of carbon over a
small vessel of carbon bisulphide, and
as the first current is passed the liquid
is vaporized, generating a high pres-
sure. Under this pressure and the
temperature of a high tension current
the carbon rod is changed in a few
moments to black diamond, the ma-
terial so prized for drills and as an
abrasive.
