BECOMING SERIOUS.

House of Coal Company Official at Sydney
Damaged by an Explosion.

Sydney, N. S., July 27.—(Special) —At 6 o'clock this morning the house of underground manager Simpson at Dominion Number 10 (Emery), a charge of explosive, a high power explosive, exploded under the verandah, completely wrecking that part of the house and blowing out nearly all the windows. The inmates of the house escaped injury. The explosion could be heard a considerable distance, startling the entire neighborhood. No clue has been found as to the perpetrators. Those who saw the house after the explosion say the escape of the inmates was remarkable. Had the explosive been put under the main part of the building the result would have been fatal. Number 10 is one of the reserve stope.

The general situation is unchanged. The output today was 8,672 tons. There was a falling off in the output from the banks, but an increase in the amount actually mined. By the end of the week an output of at least 7,000 tons is expected from the collieries alone. Number 2 is expected to produce 2,000 tons today and more tomorrow.

THE McTAVISH MURDER.

Cambridge Police Believe That Mrs. Richmond May
Have Had an Accomplice.

Boston, July 27.—(Special) —There is good reason to believe that the Cambridge Mass. police are planning a coup in their investigation in the McTavish murder which will have its spectacular hearing shortly.

The police activities harbor about the very fact that the victim's money amounting to somewhere in the neighborhood of \$100, several rings and a valuable gold watch, were found to be missing in the Hotel Florence, where the murdered man was found. In the chain of evidence, in which the police claim to have established about Mrs. Elizabeth Richmond, there is declared to be a very weak link and one which her counsel would certainly use to the best advantage, the fact that Mr. McTavish's valuables were missing is no motive for the crime.

Mrs. Richmond, it is argued, was fairly plentifully supplied with money and the comparatively small amount carried by McTavish would not naturally appeal to her strong enough to incite murderous desires. It is round these facts that both prosecution and defence are now binding their energies and from the fact that the police have in no way changed their feeling of certainty that in Mrs. Richmond they have the criminal.

It is hinted that the rumored additional arrest means they will claim the woman had another accomplice. The Hotel Florence has been searched high and low for the missing valuables but without success. The search extended from cellar to garret, and even the walls were examined for a secret hiding place. It is pointed out that the condition of stupor in which Mrs. Richmond was found precludes the possibility of her having herself removed the valuables from the house.

WIFE BEATER IN JAIL.

Ontario Man Before the Court on a Serious Charge.

Toronto, Ont., July 27.—(Special) —Wm. Rhindress of Udonia, farmer, was in the police court yesterday, charged with beating his wife and was committed for trial at the fall assizes.

Bail was fixed at \$800 and as the prisoner could not raise the amount he was committed to jail.

Rhindress is accused by his wife of having ordered her to strip and then beating her with a horse whip, afterwards rubbed her wounds with salt.

THOUGHT IT A JOKE.

Five Year Old Boy Drowned While
Men Looked on and Laughed.

Montreal, July 27.—(Special) —While a dozen men in boats looked on and laughed, nine year old Gordon Gordon was drowned yesterday. The men were laying a new Y-take pipe and made a trench fifteen feet deep. Boys have so often tumbled the men into a rescue and the boys have been in no danger, that yesterday the men then laughed at the good exhibition of drowning. When the boy sank and did not appear they made frantic efforts to save him, but it was too late. Efforts at resuscitation were of no avail.

AFTER THE BRAKEMEM.

Mr. Brady Says They Must Be More
Attentive to the Ladies.

MONCTON, July 26.—W. N. Rippey has been appointed superintendent of the I. C. R. car service in lieu of T. E. Henderson, who is appointed general car tracer. This change has been spoken of ever since P. Brady became general superintendent. His impression is that car trading needs to be strengthened by an experienced man's appointment. Mr. Rippey's appointment as superintendent of car service is in direct line of promotion.

General Superintendent Brady of the I. C. R. has issued the following circular: "I notice almost entire neglect on the part of brakemen on passenger trains to assist ladies in getting on and off the trains. Conductors will see that the instructions are carried out and will advise the superintendent if there is any failure on the part of brakemen."

HOSPITAL QUARANTINED.

Woodstock, Ont., July 27.—(Special) —The Woodstock general hospital has been placed under quarantine for a period of two weeks on account of a case of smallpox having developed in the building, the victim being a patient.

MISS LETHA WAS SECOND.

El Galo Beat Out Fredericton Mare in Races
at St. John on Monday.

ST. JOHN, July 27.—At the third pushed closely by Miss Letha. Laura and last day's horse racing of the Maritime Circuit at Moosepath yesterday El Galo captured the 2.15 class trot and pace in three straight heats and Prince Louie took the Jufferin Hotel stakes in the 2.21 trot after losing the first heat to Crescent. There were about 800 people present who followed the different events with great interest. Considerable betting was carried on before the races.

Miss Letha, the fast Fredericton mare, received a lot of backing from the sports.

THE 2.24 CLASS.

The first heat of the 2.24 trot was called on a little after 2 o'clock. Seven horses faced the starter. There was difficulty in getting away and five trials were made before the horses got off. Melva P., the pole horse, immediately took the lead of the race. Miss Letha took the closely followed by Frank Power and Crescent. At the turn, Crescent forged to the front, but broke near the lower turn sending Jeneve to the first position, with Frank Power in lead. X Ray was third and Laura Merrill worked up to a close fourth. Pullen; starter, Charles Donthly.
