MORRIS IS THIRD

Londoner Wins King's Prize at Bisley Meet.

MATCHES ARE FINISHED

Corpl. Burr Stands First in Fight for Big Trophy and First Canadian is Eight Points Behind, Winning a Badge and \$200—Lieut. Morris Comes First in Two Other Matches on Saturday.

London, July 26.—Lance-Corporal Burr of the London Rifle Brigade is the winner of the King's Prize of \$1,250, the N.R.A. gold medal and the N.R.A. gold badge.

In the Martin's Challenge Cup match at Bisley Sergt. Blackburn of Winnipeg and Sergt. Copping tied for first place. Their names will be bracketed as winners of the cup, and they will divide the money.

The Prince of Wales, replying for the princess, said: "Our brothers from across seas are always welcome here, and I am pleased to learn that 280 have come over to compete for the various prizes. I understand Canada is represented by the best team we have ever seen here, and I heartily congratulate them on having won amongst other prizes, the MacKinnon and Kolapore cups and the Jubilee cup, my own special prize."

In the competition for the Association cup the following Canadians won \$15 each with scores of 77: Staff-Sergt. Stack, Sergt. Kerr, Corpl. D. McGinnis and Lieut. Morris. Winners of \$10: Kerr, Stack, Gougeon, Huggins, Richardson, Marsdon, Mitchell and Copping (twice). In this

competition "lucky" members of the Association nominate and a competitor may represent more than one lady.

Blackburn First in Wingrove. Blackburn was first in the Wingrove, winning a silver cup, price \$125. Sergt. Smith was 20th, and Sergt. Kerr 25th, each winning \$5.

For the Grand Aggregate, Freeborn was fifth, winning \$25; Mitchell ninth, \$25; Richardson 11th, \$25; Lt. Smith 13th, \$25; Sergt. Smith 20th, \$25; McGinnis 23rd, \$10; Huggins 32nd, \$10; McVittie 41st, \$10; Russell 66th, \$10; Stack 96th, \$10; Kelly 113th, \$10; Jones 133rd, \$10; Blackburn 150th, \$10. The Grand Aggregate is composed of the highest scores made in the King's, St. George's, Alexandra, Derby (Graphic), Daily Telegraph and Graphic competitions.

In the Territorial Aggregate-Freeborn was 6th, Morris 11th, Mitchell 14th, Huggins 17th, McVittie 46th, each winning a bronze medal; Kerr was 57th, winning \$10. Scores in the King's first stage of the St. George's, first stage count in this aggregate.

In the competition for the McQueen cup, Mortimer was 5th, winning \$28; Bayles 16th, \$5; Jones 20th, \$5; Sgt. Smith 32nd, \$5.

Mortimer took second place in the shoot for the Winchester Challenge cup, winning a Winchester self-loading rifle and \$15. The prizes are awarded to the competitors whose three best scores made in any one day make up the highest aggregate.

In the "Range Prize," at 500 yards, Lieut. F. H. Morris of Bowmanville was first, winning one of the rifles presented by the London Small Arms Co., and \$25. Staff-Sergt. Richardson was third, winning \$10; Lieut. Mortimer, 27th, \$5; Lieut. Smith, 32nd, \$5.

In the "L.S.A. Range Prizes" at 600 yards, Capt. McVittie was 9th, winning \$5.

In the "Cortis," seven shots at 600 yards, Staff-Sergt. Bayles was 8th, winning \$7.50. The match is open only to volunteers over 50 or under 21 years of age on the date of firing. In the "J. H. Steward Challenge Cup" competition, seven shots at 600 yards, open to all comers, Capt. McVittie was 9th, winning \$10; Sergt. Blackburn 10th, \$10; Sergt.-Major Huggins 19th, \$5; Sergt. Kelly 20th, \$5; Col.-Sergt. Freeborn 30th, \$5; Staff-Sergt. Bayles 34th, \$5; Lieut. Mortimer 35th, \$5.

"St. George's Vase." In the second stage of the "St. George's," fifteen shots at 900 yards, open only to the 100 competitors taking the highest scores in the first stage of 500 and 600 yards, the Canadians scored as follows out of a possible 75: Col.-Sergt. Freeborn, 13th, Hamilton, 63; Sergt.-Major Huggins, Hamilton, 62; Capt. McVittie, 48th Hamilton, 62; Sergt. Mitchell, Bowmanville, 54; Lieut. Morris, Bowmanville, 57; Staff-Sergt. Richardson, 58; Lieut. Smith, Chatham, 58; Lieut. Mortimer, Ottawa, 68.

The totals of the Canadians in the two stages of the "St. George's" was as follows: Lieut. Mortimer, 135; Col.-Sergt. Freeborn, 130; Staff-Sergt. Mitchell, 120; Lieut. Morris, 123; Sergt.-Major Huggins, 118.

In the prize list of the "St. George's Challenge Vase" competition, Col.-Sergt. Freeborn was 5th, winning \$50; Staff-Sergt. Richardson, 9th, \$50; Capt. McVittie 11th, \$50; Lieut. Mortimer 33rd, \$35; Lieut. Smith 37th, \$35; Lieut. Morris 39th, \$35; Staff-Sergt. Mitchell 52nd, \$25; Sergt.-Major Huggins 61st, \$20.

At the 800 yards range in the third stage of the King's Prize the scores out of a possible 50 were: Col.-Sergt. J. Freeborn, 35; Sergt.-Major S. J. Huggins, 33; Corpl. D. McGinnis, 42; Lieut. Morris, 42; Sergt. W. A. Smith, 38; Staff-Sergt. Stack, 42; Sergt. Blackburn, Winnipeg, 41.

In the third stage of the King's Prize, at 900 yards, the scores were: Blackburn, 41; Stack, 34; Sergt. Smith, 37; Morris, 43; Freeborn, 43; McGinnis, 46; Huggins, 45.

In the third stage, at 1,000 yards, the scores were: Blackburn, 34; Stack, 41; Sergt. Smith, 47; Morris, 43; Freeborn, 40; McGinnis, 38; Huggins, 37.

Lieut. Morris of Bowmanville is third with 918, winning the N.R.A. badge and \$200, and Corpl. McGinnis fourth, is the nearest Canada could come to the King's prize this year. McGinnis gets the N.R.A. badge and \$150.

The score of Lance-Corpl. Burr was 224, or 8 more than that of Morris. Burr tied for the King's prize in 1910, but lost the shoot-off.

In The Standard of Empire, open to colonialists who shoot in the King's prize, Lieut. Morris is first, winning a jubilee commemorative shield and \$105. His total money winnings in the King's prize, therefore, is \$305.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

Gold is said to be plentiful in the Sturgeon Lake country.

The codling moth has done \$1,000,000 damage to the apple crop in Pennsylvania.

The steamer Laprairie of the R. & O.N. Co. was burned to the water's edge at Montreal.

Two pedestrians were caught between two street cars at a crossing in Winnipeg and killed.

The Detroit motor boat squadron visited Chatham on Saturday and was tendered a royal reception.

Six persons lost their lives when a Wabash passenger train plunged into the Missouri River near Kansas City.

An explosion occurred on the gasoline yacht Caprice at Kingston, and two men working on it narrowly escaped with their lives.

Canadian delegates to the International Nurses' Conference laid a wreath on the tomb of Queen Victoria at Frogmore on Saturday.

Owen Sound financiers are considering the advisability of harnessing the Eugene Falls on the Beaver River for the supply of electricity.

The majority of the Board of Conciliation in their report on the Sydney Mines dispute find that the international union should not be officially recognized.

Italian Discovered New York?

New York, July 26.—On the strength of their claim that Giovanni de Varrazano sailed through the Narrows and landed a boatload of men on Manhattan Island in 1524, Italian and French citizens of the United States have secured the incorporation of a Franco-Italian celebration in the Hudson-Fulton proceedings here next September.

Varrazano was an Italian navigator in the employ of the French Government, and inasmuch as Hudson admittedly did not enter the river which now bears his name until 1609, the Latin-Americans who are pushing Varrazano's claims convinced the Hudson-Fulton committee that the very least that could be done in justice was to grant them a place in the coming celebration for glorification of Varrazano on their own account.

Alfonso Is In Disfavor.

Madrid, July 26 (via Bayonne).—Owing to the grave situation here, especially the revolutionary propaganda, among the troops, a strict censorship has been established over all telegrams. It is impossible to send anything direct from Madrid. The revolutionary activity has assumed astonishing proportions, characterized by fierce attacks upon King Alfonso for being subject to foreign—that is, English—influences. He has therefore cancelled his projected visit to Cowes, greatly to the disappointment of Queen Ena, who had been building on it for some time. The King's action in punishing his cousin, Don Alfonso Bourbon, for his romantic marriage with Princess Beatrice of Cobourg is actually, also, made a ground of attack.

Death List Grows.

New Orleans, July 23.—With definite reports yesterday of thirteen additional deaths as the result of the hurricane in Texas and Louisiana on Wednesday, the death list last night totals 41. Also six previously reported victims of recent years have been able to boast of such an array of members of Parliament as spoke Saturday afternoon from the platform erected in London's great open air meeting place in support of Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George's budget. The crowd in the park probably approximated 500,000 people.

Balloonists Collide.

Newton, Ill., July 26.—During a balloon race here yesterday, Clarence Duncan and Roy Eastman, both of Vincennes, collided in the air. They had just cut loose from their balloons, which probably saved their lives, as they were about 2,000 feet above the earth. Eastman's leg was badly crushed.

After Forty Years.

Geneva, July 26.—The ice axe of Dr. Spitz of Baltimore, who was killed by an avalanche in 1879, was found yesterday at the bottom of the Bossons Glacier at Chamonix. The axe bears the name of Dr. Spitz.

Kingston C. I. Appointment.

Kingston, July 26.—H. P. May, M.A., of Battledore has been appointed teacher of history and assistant Latin teacher in the Collegiate Institute. There are two other vacancies.

Killed by Auto.

Little Falls, N.Y., July 26.—An automobile driven by Dr. Kerr of Hamilton, Pa., on Saturday struck and killed John Donovan, a farm hand.

MRS. THAW'S NEW BOOK.

She Bitterly Assails the Memory of Stanford White and Accuses District Attorney Jerome of Hounding Her Unfortunate Son.

New York July 23.—Insanity experts and District Attorney Jerome are sharply criticized in the pamphlet issued at White Plains by Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw, mother of Harry Thaw now confined in the Westchester County Jail pending a continuation of the hearing to determine if he is of sound mind and should be released.

Mrs. Thaw makes a devoted defence of her son; attacks the memory of Stanford White, and in an appendix, prints a panegyric of her late husband, William Thaw.

The pamphlet is entitled "The Secret Unveiled." Mrs. Thaw fires her first shot at the District Attorney in her introduction, printing there copies of two letters sent to Jerome by inmates who had appealed to him to assist in obtaining their release. The letters, Mrs. Thaw says, indicate clearly from the District Attorney's own lips that he knew he had no right to take part in any movement made to detain Thaw in that institution. She says in explaining her attack:

"Exceptional conditions demand exceptional treatment, and the fact that District Attorney Jerome has on four occasions left the quite sufficient responsibilities of his own district to pursue this case into a district which as he himself acknowledges with his own signature (see below) he has no jurisdiction, compels this unusual procedure on my part."

"The following two letters on official paper with his own signature make it perfectly clear that Mr. Jerome is laboring under no delusion as he is actuated by malice or is catering to his duties, and therefore he must rich evildoers."

"The first" letter, dated June 2, is as follows:

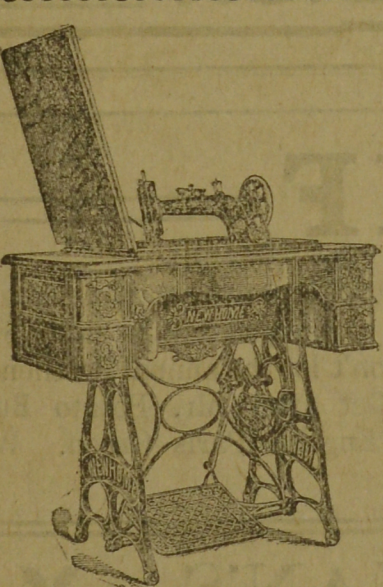

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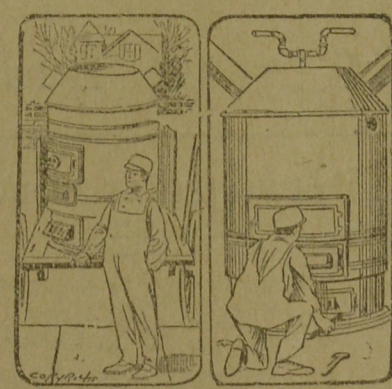
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
