### WASPS EASILY TAMED.

Make Excellent Pets When Properly Treated.

Useful hints on the domestication of the wasp are given in an article on "Wasps as Pets" which appears in the National Review.

The great secret with wasps, we are told, is absolute stillness and determination. If you waver or move your head when a wasp is buzzing up your cheek he realizes that you are frightened and acts accordingly. The writer declares that, after great experience, she found only two wasps which she was utterly unable to tame. All the others were very easy to manage.

The way to start the taming process is to give them honey from the hand, and then place them in a large glass jar. After some hours of imprisonment they get hungry, when the hand should be thrust into the jar with honey on it, and, after the wasps have settled on the honey, they should be withdrawn, still on the hand, and allowed to fly freely about

the room. When they discover that they cannot escape from a room they must be caught by enclosing them with the hands and be put back in the jar. They speedily become so tame that they allow themselves to be picked up after a little dodging. Sometimes they play tricks. One very tame wasp had a habit of creeping down its captor's neck and going to sleep there. But, as a general rule, their behaviour seems to be good.

### Arrest in Hudson Bay Case.

Cobalt, July 26.—Inspector Joseph Rogers and Provincial Constable Woods arrested at New Liskard Andrew Kelvey, director of the Hudson Bay Mining Co., charged with giving a bribe of \$25,000 to John Piche, who was arrested some time ago after a chase over half the continent. Kelvey was released on \$4,000 bail.

### Charge Against Minister.

Wolland, July 26.—Rev. Frank C. Harper, pastor of Drummond Hill Presbyterian Church, Niagara Falls, Ont., whose conduct has been under investigation by a church committee, has resigned. He is chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Masons of Canada. He claims that he is innocent, but prefers resigning in order to end the controversy. The investigating committee will make a report on August 3.

### Dined With the King.

London, July 26.—(C.A.P. Cable).—Sir Frederick and Lady Borden and Hon. L. P. Broderick dined with King Edward at Buckingham Palace on Saturday. Madame Broderick was prevented from obeying the royal command.
