

# YORK COUNTY COUNCIL.

## Parish Officers Appointed and other Routine Business—Scott Act Collections.

The county council re-assembled on Wednesday afternoon with Warden Hinchey in the chair and all the members present except Coun. B. one.

Secretary-treasurer Bliss submitted the following report on Scott Act enforcement from Police Magistrate Marsh:

Harvey Lawrence—Laid it out in jail.

John Dougherty—dismissed.

Cases against Samuel Graham, Alton McMillin, Samuel Bailey and Matthew McGivney—Withdrawn as with ss could not be procured.

Allan Moran—Allowed to stand.

Reyner Brewer—Served term in jail.

Benjamin Morhouse—Withdrawn.

There were some fifteen cases now pending before the court.

The Magistrate paid \$100 to secretary-treasurer and retained \$50 for costs.

The report was received and referred to the Scott Act Committee.

Coun. Timmins submitted the report of the committee on the secretary-treasurer's accounts.

The warden said that he thought the council as well as the secretary-treasurer were deserving of a good deal of credit for the financial showing. He added that it made a nice little jingle.

### BETTER PROTECTION WANTED.

Coun. Sterling moved the following resolution which was seconded by Coun. Skeen:

WHEREAS the volume of Tourist travel has assumed large proportions in recent years as the result of advertising the attractions of this Province abroad, and especially has this been true of the southern portion of the Province.

AND WHEREAS in former years the Miramichi River and its tributaries attracted numbers of anglers from abroad who expended very considerable amounts among our inhabitants, but owing to inefficient protection and other causes, of late years these waters have been practically abandoned by visitors and the employment afforded our people consequently lost.

THEREFORE RESOLVED that this Council urge upon the authorities the necessity of preserving such a valuable asset of this Province, and of restoring and efficiently protecting these waters, so that they once more may attract visitors from abroad and become valuable to the people of this country.

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Honorable the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa, the Honorable the Surveyor General of New Brunswick, and to the Traffic Manager of the Intercolonial Rail way.

Coun. Sterling speaking to the resolution, deplored the fact that the South-west Miramichi had become depleted of salmon in recent years.

The Warden in putting the motion remarked that the question was one of great importance in his section of the county and he was glad it had been brought up.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

On motion of Coun. McNally the list of parish officers for Kingsclear was confirmed. Lists of officers for the other thirteen parishes were also adopted.

### TELEPHONE RATES.

Coun. Brewer referred to the recent action of the New Brunswick Telephone Company in increasing the trunk line tolls. He wanted to know if there was legislation on the local statute books, empowering the government to prevent the Company from increasing the rates.

Mr. Bliss said that he was not familiar with the act incorporating the company but would look it up.

Coun. Robison said that an Act passed in 1907 had to do with the matter.

The Warden appointed Couns. Sterling and McNally as delegates to the annual meeting of the union of New Brunswick municipalities.

### A WILD RACE.

When the First Pony Express Was Nearing Sacramento.

Cornelius Cole, ex-senator from California, tells in his memoirs how the first "pony express" reached Sacramento, Cal., long before the first transcontinental railroad was surveyed: "Those who were there to witness it will never forget the arrival of the first of these express messengers at Sacramento. It was an occasion of great rejoicing, and everybody, big and little, old and young, turned out to see the fun. All business for the time was suspended. Even the courts adjourned for the event. A large number of the citizens of all classes, grave and gay, mounted on fast horses, rode out some miles on the line to meet the incoming wonder.

The waiting was not long. The little rider upon his blooded charger, under whip and spur, came down upon them like a meteor, but made not the slightest halt to greet his many visitors. Then began a race of all that waiting throng over the stretch back to the city, the like of which has never been seen. It may have been rivaled in speed and confusion by some of the cavalry disasters during the war that presently followed, but the peaceful people of Sacramento, I am sure, never beheld anything of the kind before or afterward.

"The whole cavalcade, shouting and cheering, some waving banners and bareheaded, riding at the top of their speed, dashing down J street, might have been taken, had it occurred on the plains, for a band of wild Comanches, but the little mail carrier paid no attention to them and kept in the lead."

### A THRILLING VOYAGE.

Crew of British Schooner Spent Four Days Near Death.

How the schooner Mystery took her crew of six as near to death for four days and nights as any man could be and live was narrated by her captain recently, on his rescue and landing after the wreck.

"In all my experience of the sea I have seldom felt so near death," said Captain Dean. "We loaded a cargo of dried codfish at Merchantman's Bay, Labrador, and sailed on Sept. 14 for Gibraltar. Though the Mystery was built over thirty years ago, she was a good sailer, and had weathered many storms.

"We were only a few hours out when a tremendous gale set in, and continued with increasing violence day after day. The sea was mountainous, and tossed the schooner about like a cork now high on the crest, now plunged in the trough. The decks were continually a-wash; great seas broke over her, and we all had many narrow escapes of being swept into the sea as we crawled about on our duties.

"For four days we battled against the gales; our craft creaked and strained, but we hoped she would remain tight till the gale abated. On the fourth day, however, the schooner strained so that she sprang a bad leak, and the next thing we learned was that there was three feet of water in the hold, rising steadily.

"All hands manned the pumps and toiled at them desperately, without ceasing, day and night, for the best part of a week. Had we rested we should have gone under, and even with the efforts that utterly exhausted us the water gained.

"No help was in sight on the tumbling ocean, and at last we began to despair. In a last attempt to save the ship we threw the cargo overboard, yet with the decks only two inches above the water we were forced to look death in the face.

"We had abandoned hope, when at the last moment, we sighted a steamer. We made frantic efforts to attract her attention, but she held on her course without seeing us.

"Such a sight compelled despair, but life is dear, and we toiled anew at the pumps of the poor old staggering wreck. Our two boats and most of the rigging were gone.

"For twenty-four hours longer we worked like slaves with the grip of death upon us. And then, just as physical exhaustion was conquering us at last, we saw a large vessel rapidly bearing down. She turned out to be the German Lloyd liner Main, commanded by Captain Jansen, from New York for Bremen. Our decks were then flush with the sea, and we had scarcely strength to keep ourselves from being washed overboard. The heavy gale was still raging, but a lifeboat was launched from the liner, and they rescued us, with much difficulty and danger. It was not easy to believe, as we stood safe on the big ship's deck, that we were still alive."
