AFRAID OF INVASION.

English Mayor Advocates Conscription to Relieve Present Anxiety.

The Mayor of Colchester, England, Councillor W. Gurney Benham, is very wide awake to the unpreparedness of Great Britain in case of invasion. Interviewed recently, he said that he was now in a "transition stage." Until quite recently he was a conscientious objector, and opposed to conscription of any description, but owing to the representations which have been made concerning the defenceless state of the country, he had come to the conclusion that it was entirely wrong for Brown, Jones or Robinson to leave Smith to do the military duty of all four.

"I fully realize the position," he said, "and am ready to do everything in my power to assist in bringing about a state of affairs which will relieve the present anxiety. We must not forget, however, that county associations have been established, and if the members of these associations, who are military experts, would invite mayors to take part in a conference on this most important subject, I have no doubt that this could be arranged, and I would do all I could to further the movement."

The mayor added that in the matter of training he would go even further than Lord Roberts suggests. "I cannot see that any harm would result," he said, "if the youth of this country were required to train for a somewhat longer period than the few weeks which are now proposed."

Colchester, it may be mentioned, is a fairly large garrison town, but it is so situated that in the event of an invasion on the eastern coast it would most probably be abandoned by our troops, who could not hope to prevent an invader occupying the place unless they had a large force of citizen soldiers to support them.

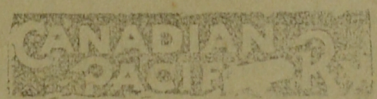

An English View of the Metropolis of the New World.

THE THIRD DEGREE.

Horrors of Police Methods of Securing Evidence---Widow Suddenly Brought Face to Face with Corpse of Murdered Husband.

NEWARK, N. J., Feb. 6.—Mrs. Mary J. Wilhelm, the widow of Frank Wilhelm, who was murdered at his home last Monday night, is in a condition of complete nervous collapse today after an unusually severe application of the "third degree," in a midnight visit to the morgue, where she was suddenly confronted with the body of her husband.

The police had evidently expected to obtain some knowledge or a statement from her, but they were unsuccessful, for when the sheet which covered her husband's body was suddenly removed she became hysterical, fell upon her knees and frantically declared her love for her husband.

An hour or so later the detectives endeavored to make use of a similar strategy to obtain a statement from Nicholas Sicca, who has been in the custody of the police since the murder.

Before Sicca reached the Wilhelm house the body of the murdered man had been conveyed there from the

morgue and placed in the position in the basement where it was found after the murder. Sicca was first led through the rooms on the first floor the detectives disarming his suspicion by attracting his attention to various objects. Sicca was cheerful and was showing the detectives about the house when suddenly one of them from the basement called the others to come down and join him in a lunch.

The other detectives with Sicca ran downstairs, and at the foot of them in the dark hallway a light was suddenly flashed up, and there before Sicca saw the murdered body of Wilhelm. For a long moment the prisoner gazed down at the body of the dead man. Involuntarily, his knees wobbled, his hands stiffened, and his eyes became glassy and white.

"Sicca, what do you know about that?" asked one of the detectives. Sicca made no response, but fell to the floor and was carried back to the cell.

MANITOBA TELEPHONES

Surplus Revenue A Quarter of A Million Dollars

WINNIPEG, Feb. 5.—After a year's operation the surplus of the Manitoba telephone system is approximately a quarter of a million dollars after deducting the cost of some 600 miles of long-distance lines and a number of rural systems which have been constructed by the Government.

In January, 1908, the Provincial Government purchased all the local plants, franchises, etc., from the Bell Telephone Company which had a monopoly in Manitoba. At the time of the purchase, officials of the Government promised a reduction in rates, but to date no reduction has been made excepting in certain classes of long-distance tolls. With this fine financial showing the Province will also announce a reduction in all telephone rates and tolls within the boundaries of Manitoba, and the bill now being prepared for presentation to the Manitoba Legislature provides for various reductions ranging from 20 to 30 per cent. from the present rates.

The example set by Manitoba impelled the Alberta Government to follow suit, and the Government system in that Province will also show big surplus for the first year.
