SETTLEMENT WORK

Miss Jane Addams Tells of the Slums of Chicago.

LADY GREY OPENS SESSION

Regular Meetings of Quinquennial Are Begun at Toronto and Delegates Are Welcomed by Her Excellency—Great Chicago Woman at Head of Hull House Addresses the Meeting Last Night.

Toronto, June 25.—Toronto undoubtedly appreciated the presence of one of the great women of the world at the meeting of the International Congress in convocation hall last night, when Jane Addams of Hull House, Chicago, rose to address the largest audience the congress so far has attracted.

There were but a few men present, but the applause from the ladies made up in duration what it lacked in masculine vigor.

Miss Harriett Marion Maclean, professor in Delphi College, Philadelphia, had already spoken on social conditions among working women and remarked upon the difficulty of preceding one who knew more of the subject than anyone else in the world.

It was her easy mastery of the question that lent absorbing interest to Miss Addams' address. A real Deborah with the tenderness of a Dorcas, she has lived the life and knows the doctrine.

She wondered why the subject of the settlements had been thrust into the middle of a program of music and literature, but undertook to do the best she could in such untoward company, but before she ended it was felt that the music and the literature were not so far away. The settlement idea, started in London 25 years ago, consists of having a group of educated persons live in an industrial neighborhood, bringing into it from without all they can of civic valor.

Hull House sits in a locality where 22 nationalities may be found touching elbows, and it is the aim of the settlement to interpret these people to the rest of the city and to each other. Great care has to be taken that the children do not contract a superficial Americanism and learn to despise their parents.

It was one of the beautiful points of the address, Miss Addams' illustration of the consistent efforts made to reveal the parents to their own children. They have established a labor museum, where Italian and Greek and Assyrian and Irish and Dutch and all the other men and women place examples of the handicrafts of their own peasant days. Those who can weave or spin, and dye, the workers in pottery, wood, metal, show something of the charm of their native background, in which the life of American cities is so sadly lacking.

Lieut. Governor Gibson presided and the Countess of Grey, the Countess of Aberdeen, Lady Edgar and many other distinguished ladies sat on the platform. Dr. Albert Ham with the St. James' Church choir contributed a number of examples of English Church music at the opening of the meeting.

The congress was formally opened in convocation hall yesterday by Her Excellency, Countess Grey.

Lady Edgar, president of the Canadian National Council, was in the chair, and on the platform with her were Countess Grey, Her Excellency, Lady Aberdeen, president of the International Council; Mrs. J. M. Gibson and Lady Sibyl Grey.

Countess Grey, as honorary president of the Canadian Council, in welcoming the delegates to Canada, spoke in part as follows:

"You come at a time when the greatness of our Canadian destiny is assured to us, and yet at a time when the lines of our national development are not so stereotyped as to prevent our adoption of the best methods of social organization, as may be suggested by the experience of other countries."

Lady Aberdeen also spoke briefly in appreciation of the hospitality of the Canadian people and ended by welcoming the congress to the "feast of fat things."

Nine sections of the congress met in various parts of the university buildings morning and afternoon.

Young Wife Gets Alimony.

Cobourg, June 25.—Appleby v. Appleby, in an action for alimony, was heard by Justice Riddell. It was an action brought by the newly-wedded wife of Alex. B. Appleby, hide dealer of Cobourg. Mrs. Appleby alleged that did not conduce to wedded happiness. Plaintiff has been residing temporarily with defendant's father and mother. Judgment was entered for Mrs. Appleby, with costs.

Free Drinks on Cars.

Toronto, June 25.—The Ontario Railway and Municipal Board has promulgated a regulation requiring electric railway companies to provide radial cars, running 20 miles or more a day, with a water cooler and drinking utensils and to keep a supply of drinking water therein for the use of passengers and trainmen.

This regulation does not apply to street railways in towns and cities.

No Benefit to Canada.

Ottawa, June 25.—The reduction by the United States Senate finance committee of duty on improved lumber from \$2 to \$1.50 a thousand will be of no appreciable advantage to lumber in this part of Canada.

Prospector Drowned.

Cobalt, June 25.—Whilst in a canoe about six miles from Gowganda, on the route to Elk Lake, Edmund L. Harris, the brother of the proprietor of the Prospect Hotel at Gowganda, was thrown out and drowned.

Sultan Victorious.

Tangier, Morocco, June 25.—The troops of the Sultan have been victorious in an important engagement fought outside of Yez with the rebel army under the command of Roghi.

Pulled Man After Him.

London, June 25.—James Allgrove, a laborer employed on the Murray Shoe Co.'s new building, fell off the scaffolding yesterday afternoon and in falling he pulled down with him another man, George Moore, the distance to the ground being thirty feet. They landed on the G.T.R. track which runs close to the building. Allgrove got off comparatively well, while Moore had his right arm and leg broken, his mouth and head badly cut, and he also sustained serious internal injuries.

Crop Report Favorable.

Toronto, June 25.—The reports we have received as to crop conditions in the northwest continue very favorable," said D. R. Wilkie, general manager of the Imperial Bank to a reporter yesterday.

"Is there anything special to note?" he was asked.

"No, I can't say that there is. It rains one day and is sunshiny the next, and the result is just right. You may say that providence is doing the best possible for the crops."

Notice is hereby given that The Canada Loose Leaf Company, Limited, will apply to the City Council of the City of Fredericton for a loan and certain exemptions hereunder set out pursuant to Chapter Thirty Nine, Acts of Assembly, 6 Edward VII.

The Company will make application for exemption from water rates, sewerage rate and taxation generally for a term of five years, renewable for a further term of five years, and a loan of three thousand five hundred dollars, repayable in instalments of five hundred dollars annually without interest, the first instalment to be paid five years after the loan is made.

In consideration of such assistance the Company on their part agree to repay such loan as aforesaid and to employ forty five people with a gross annual wage of not less than three hundred and fifty dollars weekly, and to actively carry on the business of manufacturing loose leaf ledgers and other loose leaf devices to the amount of not less than \$50,000 annually.
