COUNTY COUNCIL.

The York Municipal Council will meet in semi-annual session in this city on Tuesday, July 6th.

PARALYTIC STROKE.

TODAY'S MARKET.

There was a good number of country teams in the market today. Produce sold about as follows: Butter, 20c per lb; eggs 23c per dozen; veal per quarter 6 to 8c per lb; Lamb per quarter 75c to \$1.00; chickens per pair 90c; salmon per lb 17c.

BANKER TRANSFERRED.

Mr. Gordon Todd, of the Bank of New Brunswick staff, has been transferred to the bank's branch at North End St. John, and will leave for that place on Monday next. Mr. Todd's successor has not yet been named.

PROGRESSIVE MONCTON.

Moncton's building operations since the first of the year, including residences completed and in course of construction, amount to about \$50,000. Some sixty-five permits have been issued to date for buildings and remodeling.

HIGH TAX RATE.

MONCTON, June 25.—The civic tax list shows the rate this year is two per cent, which is a slight reduction from last year. The city's total assessment is \$100,000. The heaviest taxpayer is F. M. Sumner, who is called upon to pay over \$2,100. The poll tax is \$5.06.

AUDITOR HERE.

Mr. James Hutchinson, member of a large firm of chartered accountants and auditors, is here from the Upper Provinces, auditing the accounts of the Bank of New Brunswick. The bank employs no inspectors, but has the accounts of the different branches audited from time to time by competent auditors.

ST. JOHN RIVER COMMISSION.

Gregory of Fredericton, the Canadian counsel on the International commission on the St. John river, met a delegation of local lumbermen yesterday afternoon at the board of trade rooms, Prince William street, St. John. While those present at the meeting declined to give out last night anything of what transpired, it is learned that the affair was held for the purpose of obtaining the views of the local operators in the matter now before the commission. The next meeting of the board will be held in St. John on July 7.

THE NEW BANK.

The Bank of New Brunswick is advertising for tenders for the erection of a branch bank building in this city. The plans for the new building were prepared by Mr. F. Neil Brodie, of St. John, and are for a stone building which will be one of the most convenient and handsome business houses in the city when completed. The site on Queen street, opposite the Soldiers' barracks, is all ready for the work to proceed. The tenders will close on July 5th, and the building will be completed early in the New Year.
