LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

Hazen Government Spent Princely Sum of
\$240 Last Year to Help the "Poor
Settler."

The Legislature met at three o'clock on Wednesday. The following bills were read a third time: To enable Trinity church to issue debentures; to amend the Creditors' Relief Act; relating to the custody of children; relating to the extension of School street.

Petitions were presented as follows: By Mr. Wilson in favor of the bill relating to sewerage maintenance in city of St. John; by Mr. Lowell against the bill respecting marsh lands in the parish of Musquash; by Mr. Wilson in favor of the bill relating to the union of city of St. John and Portland; by Mr. Cyr in favor of the bill to authorize the town of Edmundston to issue debentures; by Mr. Pinder in favor of the bill to authorize the school board of city of Fredericton to issue debentures.

Mr. Lowell gave notice of motion relating to the provincial hospital and to the St. John suspension bridge.

Mr. Slipp reported for the Corporations Committee and Mr. Dickson presented a report from the Agricultural Committee.

Hon. Mr. Flemming tabled the report of the Central Railway Commission.

The House went into committee of supply, Mr. Sproul in the chair.

On the items for Poultry & Fruit Growers Association, Dr. Landry said that the grant of \$300 to the former was intended to encourage the raising of poultry and holding of exhibitions. There were several Societies in the province doing very good work along that line and they had asked for assistance. The Fruit Growers had also asked for a grant of \$100 towards the expense of holding orchard meetings where demonstrations in spraying and other orchard practices might be given.

With regard to the school for the Deaf and Dumb in St. John, Mr. Hazen stated that it had run behind to the extent of about \$1500 and \$165 was paid for each pupil. This had been found sufficient and legislation would be asked for to increase the grant.

With regard to the item of \$9000 for school books in reply to Mr. Corp. Mr. Flemming said that there were a lot of books on hand at present and with the monthly payment coming in from the vendors the amount asked for would be sufficient to cover the expenses for the year; even after providing for the several books it was proposed to add to the reduced list such as the Health Reader, Grammar and Algebra.

On the item for \$100 for free grants Mrs. Currie called attention to the fact that there were several people in Restigouche County who were entitled to free grants but who had been unable to obtain the patent because the land surveyor refused to make the return of survey.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer said that there were many of such cases in the province. The surveyor referred to refused to make the return of survey and it would cost \$250 to make another which the province should not be called upon to pay, neither was it fair that the settlers should pay it. However, it was proposed to send a man round to do the best he could.

Mr. Byrne regretted that the item should be cut down from fifteen hundred last year to a thousand this because the conditions referred to by Mr. Currie were as bad in Gloucester as in the province. Even the Chief Commissioner had admitted that in some parts of that county the situation of the residents in some of the back settlements was deplorable.

Mr. Tweeddale said that the money which was voted for this item should be applied to the purposes for which they were intended, but instead of doing this the government had last year only spent \$210 out of the fifteen hundred voted and had carried the balance in order to increase their surplus.

He considered it was the duty of the department to make enquiries as to where the money could be most satisfactorily laid out and should apply it accordingly. Instead of cutting down the item, it should be increased. He moved that the amount be \$5000, and the motion was declared out of order.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer said that the members should bring to the notice of the government the requirements of their constituencies. Unless they did so it was impossible for the government to know what was required.

Mr. Robinson thought that the amount should be increased rather than decreased, but it was only proper that the surveyor general should have sufficient money at his disposal to satisfy any application that might be made to him.

On the item of \$4,500 for mining Hon. Mr. Hazen explained that the Agent General in London had undertaken to open an office in a suitable location and to keep someone there who was capable of giving all the necessary information to enquirers on the advantages of this province and to advertise these advantages in the press.

On the item of \$4,500 for mining and mineral development, Hon. Mr. Grimmer explained that this amount was largely to cover the operation and repairs to the Diamond and other drills which had been very extensively used in the past few months.

On the grant of \$90,000 to the provincial hospital, Hon. Mr. Hazen said since the grant was made last year, considerable alterations had been made last year in the management of the hospital. Formerly Dr. Anglin was paid a salary of \$4,000 and certain perquisites which made his salary worth \$5,390, taking everything into account. There was also a steward, Mr. Quinton, who was paid \$1,700, and Mr. Gordon Boyne was paid \$600. In the opinion of the commissioners there was really no necessity for a steward or a secretary, so they had arranged with Dr. Anglin to take over their duties and to pay him an inclusive salary of \$5,000 a year.

Mr. Tweeddale presented the petition of J. E. Stewart and others in favor of the bill of the Tobique Pulp and Paper Co.
