Vonburg's stable and Davidson's livery stables were also burned and the Dunham house and Division street Methodist church were scorched. The total loss is sixty thousand and was about one quarter insured.

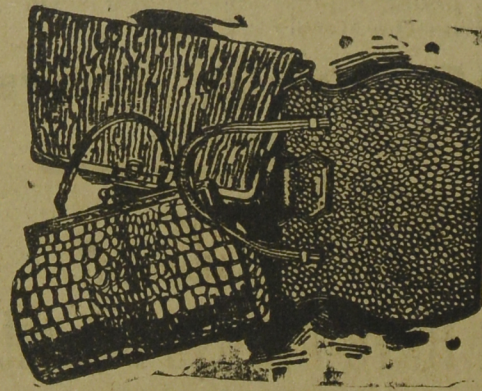
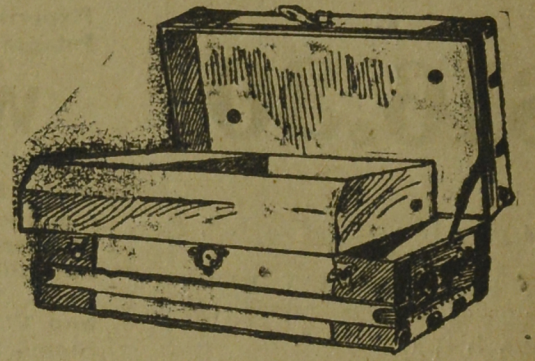
