When first uncovered the reptile was torpid, but when brought to the light it showed more signs of life.

FLEET IN REVIEW

Press Delegates Witness Huge Naval Spectacle.

GREATER ONE IS COMING

Largest Fleet Ever Collected Is Passed In Review at Spithead—Manoeuvres In Which Mediterranean Squadron Will Join Are to Take Place Off Coast of Scotland Beginning on June 14th.

London, June 14.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—Imperial Conference delegates were profoundly impressed by their inspection Saturday of the home fleet at Spithead.

The 18 miles of warships, included four Dreadnoughts and seven Invincibles, and constituted the most powerful fleet ever assembled for review.

Sir John Fisher, First Lord of the Admiralty, accompanied the delegates. On the arrival of the Victoria they gave him a great ovation and escorted him to his car, singing "For he's a jolly good fellow."

All the delegates admit the fleet was a wonderful object lesson to them of the Empire's naval might.

Among the 24 battleships were seven Dreadnoughts, while supporting these lines of capital ships lay 24 cruisers, thirteen scouts and auxiliaries, 48 torpedo-boat destroyers and 35 submarines. Had they been placed end to end they would have formed a double line 18 miles long.

All the vessels were dressed with thousands of flags, and with the crews on deck manning ship and the bands playing, the scene was full of animation and color.

A salute from Nelson's old flagship, the Victory, announced the arrival of the Admiralty yachts, bearing the lords of the Admiralty and the newspaper guests. After traversing the line of the fleet, the visitors went on board the Dreadnought and witnessed a sham attack of submarines and destroyers on the battleship. The sea front of Portsmouth was black with masses of spectators and the Roadstead was filled with steamers thronged with sightseers from all parts of the kingdom.

Plans for Manoeuvres.

London, June 14.—On June 17 a great mobilization of the British fleet for the grand manoeuvres will take place, all the nucleus crew ships being brought up to their complement and placed on a war footing.

In order to give them an opportunity of participating in the training the three great bodies of naval reserves have been invited to volunteer for service on this occasion. But for good and sufficient reasons it is not anticipated that there will be any large response, and it has been officially announced that all the ships can be officered and manned from the active service, without the reservists. The Royal Naval Reserve men, mostly merchant seamen, can only be expected to find time between the trips of their vessels, and few of them can spare a month.

The Mediterranean fleet has been specially summoned home for these great manoeuvres, in which altogether not fewer than three hundred and fifty ships will take part. The scene of the operations will, it is believed, be somewhere off the northwest coast of Scotland, but no official pronouncement has been made on this subject. It is not known either, what strategic scheme of operations has been decided upon, but it is presumed that Sir William May, the commander-in-chief of the home fleet, will command on one side, and that Sir Ascheton Curzon-Howe, commander-in-chief of the Mediterranean fleet, will command on the other.

At the conclusion of the navy manoeuvres the main fleet will proceed to the North, and the ships will take up their anchorage in the river on Monday, July 19. The exact distribution of the ships has not yet been decided upon between the port of London authorities and the Admiralty, but provisionally the arrangement is as follows:

From the Houses of Parliament at Westminster to London Bridge, there will be two lines of torpedo boats and submarines; from London Bridge the lines will be continued by destroyers and gunboats, scouts and smaller cruisers as far as Greenwich and Blackwall. In the reaches to Northfleet will lie the heavier cruisers, including those of the Dreadnought class, the Indomitable, the Inflexible and the Invincible, near Greenhithe.

Between Tilbury and Gravesend the line of battle ships begins, extending down through the Lower Hope reach, past Thames Haven and Canvey Island, to Southend, where, off the pier, the Dreadnought battleships will be clustered, and continuing to the anchorage at the Nore. Altogether, near upon one hundred and fifty vessels, in columns covering between forty and fifty miles of river and water space.

Only on two or three previous occasions have there been naval reviews at the water gate of the capital of the British Empire, but never before has

there been seen such a unique display of naval might in such circumstances as the citizens of London and the dwellers of the Thames will have at their doors on Tuesday, July 20.

Sir George Wyatt Truscott is responsible for the suggestion that the Admiralty should bring the fleet into the Thames. In his position as lord mayor he called upon Sir John Fisher and proposed the idea, which the First Sea Lord accepted with alacrity. With his officers of state, the sheriffs and common councilmen, the lord mayor, with the board of admiralty, will make a civic progress down the river on July 20, and it will be strange indeed if the populace does not turn out in thousands to welcome and express enthusiastic appreciation of the bluejackets.

It is a curious circumstance that the lord mayor of London has no flag which it will be possible for the fleet to salute, but the salutes can be given to the Admiralty flag in accordance with historic custom, the salute being taken by the chief magistrate of London.

When the lord mayor arrives at Southend, which is only a little more than thirty miles from the metropolis, and therefore easily accessible by rail and river, he will go on board the Dreadnought and there witness a naval exhibition by the destroyers and submarines.

On Wednesday, July 21, the city will entertain upward of a thousand bluejackets and marines, the naval brigade with their guns marching through the streets of London. This will be not the least interesting part of the program, for, although thousands of people will doubtless travel to Southend and Sheerness to see the Dreadnoughts, many thousands will turn out in the gaily decorated thoroughfares to watch the march of the seamen to the Guildhall. Then on the following day there is to be an entertainment for the officers, and it has been further suggested that if the fleet remains in the Thames over Sunday the seamen may attend the services at the principal places of worship in the city.

Strange Dynamiting Outrage.

Ottawa, June 15.—A large frame building on the Montreal road, one mile from the city, was wrecked on Sunday night at 11.30 by a dynamite charge placed under one corner. The building was used as a hotel, and the license was canceled, four years ago. The kitchen and an occupied room over it were demolished. Joseph Laporte, a wife and child, were in a room immediately adjacent, but were unharmed, as were Joseph Guiseppe and his three sons in another part of the building. Every window, however, was broken, and windows in houses within a radius of 200 yards were also wrecked.

It is thought the dynamite was secured from a nearby quarry.

Forged Money Order.

Stratford, June 15.—Albert Butterfield, a carpenter, pleaded guilty yesterday to the theft of a money order for \$10, payable to the superintendent of the Fegan Boys' Home, Toronto, on May 9.

The order was made out in Tottenham, and was cashed at the branch postoffice on Elm street, Toronto, by forging the signature of Superintendent Rettan. Butterfield's writing compared with the endorsement on the order.

conviction was secured by Postoffice Inspector Henderson.

Press Delegates Use Royal Train.

London, June 15.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—The Imperial Press Conference delegates left Euston station yesterday on a special London Northwestern train composed of royal saloon carriages, the finest train that ever left the station. Messrs. Wright and Skipworth, London Northwestern officials, received the delegates at the depot.

Kenora Is Threatened.

Kenora, June 15.—Terrible bush fires are raging within a mile of this town, and unless rain soon comes serious consequences will ensue. Already several farms on the outskirts of the town have been burnt. There does not seem to be any immediate prospect of the situation being relieved, no rain being in sight.

How It Happened.

Ottawa, June 15.—Later details as to the error on board the Perry C. Walker, which caused the \$50 disaster, say that the engineer is a seagoing officer, and when he received the signal "two bells," he interpreted it as "Go ahead," whereas on the lakes, "two bells" is the signal to "stop."

Sloan Hopes for Senatorship.

Vancouver, B.C., June 15.—William Sloan, M.P., says he is not a candidate for the governorship in succession to Dunsmuir. It is understood he will be one of the three new Senators to be appointed next session from British Columbia.

G.T.P. Bridge Contracts.

Vancouver, B.C., June 15.—The Canadian Bridge Co. has been given a four hundred thousand dollar contract for the steel for six bridges on the G.T.P. H. Ferguson of Toronto gets the contract for the concrete work.

CENSURE FOR GREY

Governor-General Criticized For Going to Race Tracks.

ONE MAN STANDS BY HIM

Methodist Conference at Toronto Adopts Report Which Censures the Earl, With One Dissenting Vote—Would Close Bars Earlier—Want Greater Power for Municipalities—To Control Shows.

Toronto, June 15.—Earl Grey had one defender at the Toronto Methodist Conference yesterday afternoon, when the question of race-track book-making was before it.

The report of the committee on temperance, prohibition and moral reformers declared that the time had come for the enactment of a law abolishing barrooms, the treating system and drinking in clubs.

It urged Methodists to support local option bylaws and regretted the continuance of the three-fifths clause. The clause was decidedly objectionable.

The membership was called upon to petition the Ontario Government to limit the hours of sale of liquor to 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The report also urged legislation to empower municipalities to prohibit pool-rooms, five-cent shows and moving picture exhibitions of prize fights.

The report condemned the quasi-legalized race-track gambling and regretted that the Dominion Government had so far neglected to grant effective legislation. The report declared race-tracks to be a university of gambling and crime. It profoundly regretted that the Governor-General and others high in positions of honor had by their presence given countenance and support to a debasing evil, which permeated all classes of society in one form or another, and was a menace to the moral welfare of the nation.

The committee condemned military training in public schools declaring it to be the greatest mistake Canada could make to place the burden of militarism on the shoulders of the people.

The report was adopted with one dissenting vote, Rev. T. H. Nurgan protested again the conference censuring the personal conduct of the Governor-General.

MRS. GOULD OBJECTS.

Calls It Cruelty to Demand Pledge of Her.

New York, June 15.—Abandonment will be the sole issue upon which the suit for separation brought by Katherine Clammons Gould against her husband, Howard Gould, third son of the late Jay Gould, will be decided. This ruling was made late yesterday in the Supreme Court by Justice Dowling. This sweeps away the cruelty allegations.

"Howard Gould's attempt to have his wife pledge herself not to drink, in itself, constitutes cruelty," declared Clarence Shearn, Mrs. Gould's attorney, in resisting the limitation. It was this clause in the agreement that had been asked the wife to sign before he would consent to live with her again, that Mrs. Gould most strongly objected to. "What," she had exclaimed earlier in the day, during cross-examination, "have me sign myself a drunkard? Never!"

Mrs. Gould testified that it was "very bad taste" to wear a gown twice.

"One of them," she said to counsel for Mr. Gould, "was given to your own sister, who is on the stage. I have aided many poor girls to get stage engagements by equipping them with my discarded gowns."

Mr. Gould said his income was \$770,000.

Longshoremen to Get Increase.

Owen Sound, June 15.—The board of conciliation, consisting of Donald Ross, Barrie, chairman; Wallace Nesbitt, K.C., Toronto, representing the C.P.R., and J. G. O'Donoghue, Toronto, representing the longshoremen, have forwarded their report to Ottawa, after hearing the evidence in connection with the application of the longshoremen for higher wages.

Recommendations for increases are, it is reported, made, in some cases the advance meaning from forty cents to sixty cents on a day's work. For some lines of work, it is said the men will receive twenty-three cents an hour for overtime and Sundays, and sixteen, seventeen and eighteen cent for other work, for which they are now receiving fifteen cents.

Ex-Judge Loses Liberty.

Chicago, June 15.—Former Judge Abner Smith, who probably will be taken to the Joliet Penitentiary today to begin his sentence for bankruptcy, spent many hours Sunday riding through the parks of the city and in visiting scenes he may never see again.
