CATTLE MARKETS.

Cables Stronger—Hogs Steady to Lower at Buffalo and Chicago.

LONDON, June 21.—London cables for cattle are firm, at 14 1/2c to 14 3/4c per lb. for Canadian steers, dressed weight; refrigerator beef is quoted at 10 1/2c to 10 3/4c per lb.

Toronto Junction Live Stock.

TORONTO JUNCTION, June 21.—Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards were 54 carloads, consisting of 1133 cattle, 5 hogs, 173 sheep and lambs and 12 calves.

Exporters.

On Tuesday three loads of exporters were sold. Steers sold at \$6 to \$6.37 1/2; bulls, \$4.75 to \$5.25 per cwt. About 20 loads of export cattle were held over for Tuesday's market.

Butchers.

Prime picked lots of butchers' sold at \$5.75 to \$5.87 1/2; good, \$5.30 to \$5.60; medium, \$5 to \$5.25; common, \$4.50 to \$5; cows, \$3.50 to \$4.00; canners, \$2.40 to \$2.75.

Milksters and Springers.

A limited number of milkers and springers sold at \$30 to \$35 each.

Veal Calves.

Few veal calves were on sale, and prices were firm, at \$2 to \$2.75 per cwt. Sheep and Lambs.

Heavy, fat ewes were slow of sale, at \$3.50 to \$4 per cwt.; light ewes sold at \$4 to \$5 per cwt.; spring lambs were firm, at \$12 to \$14 per lb.

Hogs.

There were only five hogs on sale. These were bought by the D. B. Martin Company at \$8 per cwt., fed and watered at the market.

Montreal Live Stock.

MONTREAL, June 21.—(Special.)—At the Montreal Stock Yards West End Market, the receipts of live stock for the week ending June 19 were 250 cattle, 450 sheep and lambs, 1200 hogs and 900 calves. The supply for local consumption this morning consisted of 500 cattle, 50 sheep and lambs, 800 hogs and 100 calves. There was no important change in the condition of the market for cattle, prices for all grades being fairly maintained on account of a smaller run than a week ago, and a keener demand from both local and outside buyers.

The bulk of the offerings consisted of the bulk of them being in poor condition, and the general impression is that it would pay the farmer if he kept such stock a little longer on the grass before marketing. The estimate of buyers was large, including several from Quebec, who bought three or four carloads, and trade on the whole was more active than it has been of late.

There was also some demand from exporters, owing to the stronger cattle's advices from Liverpool, which noted an advance in price of 1/4c to 1c per pound, as compared with a week ago.

Choice stall-fed steers sold here at 6 1/2c to 6 3/4c; good at 6 1/2c to 6 3/4c; medium, 5 1/2c to 6c; and lower grades from 5 1/4c to 4 1/2c per lb. Owing to the small supply of hogs and the keener demand from packers and dealers, a stronger feeling developed in the market, and prices scored an advance of 25c to 35c per 100 lbs., with sales of selected lots at \$5.75 to \$5.87 1/2; good at \$5.30 to \$5.60; medium, \$5 to \$5.25; common, \$4.50 to \$5; cows, \$3.50 to \$4.00; canners, \$2.40 to \$2.75.

The condition of the market for small meats was unchanged. Supplies of all lines were limited, for the demand was fairly good, and sides of sheep were made at 30c to 40c per lb. Lambs brought from \$3 to \$7 each, and calves from \$2 to \$10 each, as to size and quality.

At the Canadian Pacific Live Stock Market, the receipts for the week ending June 19 were 1700 cattle for export account, and 700 cattle, 600 sheep and lambs, 800 hogs and 1500 calves for local consumption. The offerings this morning were 250 cattle, 450 sheep and lambs, 1200 hogs and 900 calves.

INSECTS AS BLUFFERS

MANY HAVE LITTLE TRICKS FOR SELF-DEFENCE.

One Caterpillar Gets Away by Disguising Itself as an Ant and Another Passes as a Scorpion—Daddy-Long-Legs Is Saved by His Awful Limbs—Bee-Flies Are Also Fourflushers in Their Appearance.

A penniless man who struts about in fine clothes, making people think he is a man of money and position, is practicing the art of bluff. Bluff, to be explicit, is the art of making much out of little, of causing people to think your brains or your position much greater than they really are.

One would have thought that an art like this belonged to human beings, because it requires some intelligence to bluff successfully. Yet many members of the insect world are just as smart and effective at bluff as men.

Take caterpillars. Now, a caterpillar is one of the most defenceless creatures in creation. As a general rule—for there are a few exceptions—it cannot bite, or kick, or strike, or sting. But its enemies are so numerous that it is compelled to resort to some trick of self-defence, and, as it has no weapons, it practices bluff.

The caterpillar of the Lobster Moth leads a life of incessant bluff. While very tiny it looks just like an ant. "That funny brown thing with the awful jaws and straggly long legs can't possibly be a caterpillar," is what its enemies think as they pass it by.

Later on in life, when it is too big to pretend to be an ant any longer, it takes to sitting on leaves with its hideous brown head and bulging tail stuck upright over its back, and its front legs projected forward in such an attitude of menace that spiders and ichneumons dare not venture near.

"That must be a dragon," they would say, if they could speak. "If I go near it, it will surely tear me to pieces." Yet, if they had the sense to look a little more closely, they would discover that it was a defenceless caterpillar capable only of wriggling when attacked.

The caterpillar of the Common Puss Moth is another master of the art of bluff. When born it looks like a tiny scorpion, and no respectable spider or ichneumon attempts to attack it. As it grows bigger, it develops a violet saddle down its back, and a decoration round its face something like a monk's cowl. Out of its tail proceed two long horns. When approached by an enemy or touched by human hands, it instantly sits bolt upright, turns its dreadful-looking face on its tormentor and shoots out of the top of each horn a waving scarlet, stinging thread.

As a rule, the enemy retreats in great fright, believing it is about to be pounced upon, bitten, and stung to death. Yet in sober truth the artful caterpillar is practicing bluff. Its terrible face is a false alarm, for it cannot bite or strike hard enough to inflict a wound, and the two stinging-like scarlet threads wave about in the air without effecting any poison.

The long-legged spider—which, by the bye, is no spider at all—is another defenceless creature that relies on bluff. In this case all the bluff is in its ugly legs. Considered as legs, they are weak, ungainly limbs, easily broken, and frequently in the creature's way when it tries to crawl through crevices.

But all the world is afraid of those legs. Girls and boys run away from them, and every insect thinks that it must be an uncommonly ferocious and terrible spider to have such frightful limbs. Yet, as we have already said, not merely is it defenceless, but it is not even a spider.

In a similar way bee-flies play the fool with their many faces. Silly little flies they are, if you only understand them properly. They don't avoid being snapped up by birds and spiders some of them wear yellow coats just like wasps, and others wear brown coats just like bees.

"If I dare to tackle that dreadful creature, I shall be stabbed to death," says the timid little spider, who is too small to tackle wasps, but would readily overcome the bee-fly if only he could recognize it. "I wish there were fewer wasps about and more flies," says the little tom-tit from his perch on a tree as he surveys a garden buzzing with bee-flies all pretending to be what he does not eat.

Many moths and butterflies deceive their enemies by pretending to be withered leaves or flowers, but, of course, a large number of insects are quite destitute of the art of bluff. Perhaps the most prominent of these is the house-fly, who may be described as the very pattern of foolish honesty.

One honest insect makes another's dinner, in the rule in the insect world, and in consequence of his brazen audacity and his ignorance of bluff the common house-fly is more widely caught and devoured by spiders, wasps, and birds than almost any other insect.

Bluff is a useful art. Mind you, it is not hypocrisy or harmful in true bluff. It is simply a means of self-protection against the slings and arrows of the world, and only becomes harmful when mixed up with vanity and wilful deception, which are quite different things.

King Edward as a Collector.

King Edward is very fond of collecting various things, and he is said to have the finest private collection of guns in the world. Many of these were presents, and one of the best of them all was a gift from King Leopold of the Belgians. But probably His Majesty's most remarkable collection consists of the programs of all the theatres and operas at which he has been present for many years past. These number some hundreds, and form one of the most interesting records of the theatre in existence. Formerly, King Edward used to collect theatrical posters, but latterly he has given them up.

A SPEEDY WOOING.

Old Toronto Boy Comes Home and Captures a Bride In Short Time.

An old romance was brought to a speedy culmination in Toronto recently when Miss Jean Frances Boyd, daughter of Mr. J. McG. Boyd, of Davenport road, became the bride of Mr. W. A. Esson, a former Torontonian, and now a prominent businessman of Chicago.

More than a decade ago Mr. Esson, was manager of the Island Ferry Co., and was known to a wide acquaintance as "Billy" Esson. He was much in the company of Miss "Daisy" Boyd, as the bride was known among her friends. Later Mr. Esson went away to Chicago, and gradually drifted away from his old Toronto associations. Just before Christmas, it being the holiday season, he returned to Toronto to renew old acquaintanceship, and in chatting with them asked if anyone knew where old Mr. Boyd, who is in the employ of the Toronto Ferry Co., lived. MILL OWNER TOO ZEALOUS.

Glencoe Temperance Worker Forgets Obligation to Hotelman.

The town of Glencoe failed to go "dry" as far as local opinion is concerned by the vote at the recent election, but it went so "dry" as far as the Levett Knitting Co. is concerned that that industry had to cease running for a day or so, and thereby hangs a tale which has caused considerable amusement in Glencoe.

The Levett Co. is an industry employing about 15 or 20 hands, which came to the town recently on the understanding that it was to be provided with free water. This stipulation was easily made good, for one of the two hotelmen had a splendid well running a couple of hundred thousand gallons a day, and he offered water for milling purposes without money and without price.

The knitting company was running nicely when the local option campaign came on. The manager of the knitting company is a staunch temperance advocate and supported the bylaw regardless of the fact that his factory was receiving its water supply from one of the men whom local option would put out of business.

The hotelman put it as a joke at first, but finally told the knitting mill owner that he would have to look elsewhere for water. The latter did look elsewhere, but looked in vain, and in the end the factory had to shut down.

By this time the town council got interested and sought to effect a settlement. Their efforts at first were futile, but the hotelman being of a genial and forgiving disposition, they succeeded in making an agreement whereby the water would again be supplied, ostensibly to the council, but through them to the factory, which is once more running as usual.
