WHAT IS THE POINT?
Mr. Connec—What is the point of order?

The speaker—The honorable member from North Toronto says that a member must not say any disagreeable thing about another member. I do not know that we have a rule upon that point. Loud Liberal cheers greeted this statement.

Sir Wilfrid—I am a pretty old member now of this house. I have sat in opposition. I have sat on the treasury benches, and I am not aware and I place myself in the judgment of the house, in that of the gentlemen opposite, as well as of this side, that I ever said an offensive word to anybody. I have tried to carry on the debates in this house. I have to be courteous to all members of this house, but, sir, I am human after all. (Loud Liberal cheers). When a member tells me to my face that if I did not take a certain course, if I did not prosecute certain cases, it was because I was afraid of the consequences, because I had shared in the proceeds—

Mr. Foster—Will you allow me. I state here as a member of the house and I call the speaker to witness that if I recollect my words, they were like these: I was asking why it was not done and I said 'Is it because you have shared?' as I uttered the word 'shared' the speaker rose and called me to order.

Mr. Connec—You said it twice.
Mr. Taylor—Keep quiet.
Mr. Connec—You had better keep quiet.

Mr. Foster—There is a gentleman (pointing to Mr. Connec) who sits there and insults me.

Mr. Connec—You started it.
Mr. Foster—I think the sergeant-at-arms should take care of him.Great uproar.
The stormy debate was kept up for some time, those taking part including Messrs. Foster, Laurier, Borden, Connec, Sproul, Hart and Taylor. Members of both sides were howled down and the wildest confusion prevailed.

A point of order was raised by Mr. Foster, and the Speaker in giving his decision said: "My view is that the words 'I never manipulated trust funds' are not in themselves offensive words. There may be an inference to be drawn from them, but that is a matter which every member of the House can judge for himself."

The debate was continued until after midnight.

ATTEMPTED HOLD UP.

Moncton Man Shot at by Tramp near
Salisbury.

MONCTON, April 3.—(Special) — While walking along the track of the Salisbury and Harvey railroad yesterday morning, George R. Harmer, Moncton, was shot at twice by a tramp.

Mr. Harmer in telling the story to the local police, said a tramp approached him asking for a match, and when the Moncton man said he had none, asked him what his hurry was, at the same time pulling out a revolver. Harmer ran, and the tramp fired two shots, which went by Harmer's ear.

A chase then followed, but the tramp could not catch up to Harmer. The incident occurred about a mile from Salisbury, and has aroused the indignation of Salisbury people.

REPLY TO NOT-A-CRANK.

Anti-Humbog Takes Exception to Statements of a Correspondent.

To the Editor of the Herald:—

Dear Sir: The anxious haste with which your correspondent "Not-a-Crank" rushes to the defence of the Board of Aldermen against a supposed reflection upon them by a city clergyman from his pulpit, the evident authority with which he undertakes to speak for the Council, the general tone and style of his communication and the adoption of his name de plume, all point quite unerringly to the gentleman who on several occasions of late has sought to make himself offensive to a large body of respectable citizens, from whom he differs, by characterizing them as Cranks and Temperance Fanatics. The frequent use of these appellations, no doubt, aords pleasure to Mr. Not-a-Crank and his friends.

He does not deny the truth of the alleged statement of the Methodist clergyman, that drunkenness has increased in this city during the past few weeks, but he seeks to make the commission and the police force responsible for it, ignoring the fact that the increased drunkenness is, of course, due to the illegal sales and persistent violations of what is still the law, by hotel and saloon keepers, to whose support Not-a-Crank and his friends owe their present success.

If these people did not illegally sell intoxicating liquors there would be no drunkenness to call attention to. It is well known to Not-a-Crank, as it is known throughout the city, that this Board of Aldermen some weeks ago at their canvass unanimously decided that they would to use his phrase—"do things by abolishing the commission and dismissing the (to them) objectionable members of the police force." It being so decided and it being necessary under the ruling of the council, that all information for violation of the Scott Act shall in the first instance be filtered through the "Justice" Committee, it is not to be wondered at that the uselessness of any honest attempt by the officials to enforce the Scott Act has been recognized and acted upon.

It will, however, be exceedingly gratifying to all good citizens to hear the assurance of your correspondent, who, no doubt, speaks with authority, that as soon as the new council can get to work there will be no more what ever to complain of any infringement of "Dominion, Provincial, or Civil Laws,"—a pretty big contract, by the way, for even a man of the recognized authority of Mr. Not-a-Crank. If he honestly seeks to carry out this programme what showers of blessings (?) he will bring down upon his head from all his friends of the same kidney who, he would no doubt assure us, are not "Cranks."
