Chatham, April 2.—The biggest oil deal which has yet been put through in the Tilbury oil field has been completed, and an English company recently formed will take over the property of the Roth, Argue and Sterns and other properties in the Tilbury East Canada Oilfields Co., and Sir James Shaw, one of the directors, is now on his way to Canada.

The new company is capitalized at \$1,000,000 and the deal means an expenditure of \$250,000. Two hundred thousand will be spent at once in operating the lease thus secured.

French Treaty Adopted.

Paris, April 2.—The Senate yesterday by a vote of 317 to 6, adopted the French-Canadian commercial treaty. Senators Delahaye, LeBreton and others made a last effort to further postpone action on the treaty, pending the revision of the French tariff. They directed their attacks especially against the clauses relating to cattle and agricultural machinery, asserting that the machinery clause would open a side door to the United States.

Brakeman May Die.

St. Catharines, April 2.—Geo. Aldridge, a G.T.R. brakeman, is probably dying at the hospital here.

The other trainmen on the freight on which Aldridge was employed, which was coming this way from Toronto, found Aldridge lying bruised and unconscious among the coal in the tender with the skull fractured. It is thought he was struck by a bridge.

Speakers at Congress Report on Work in Fields.

HONOR TO EARLY MARTYRS

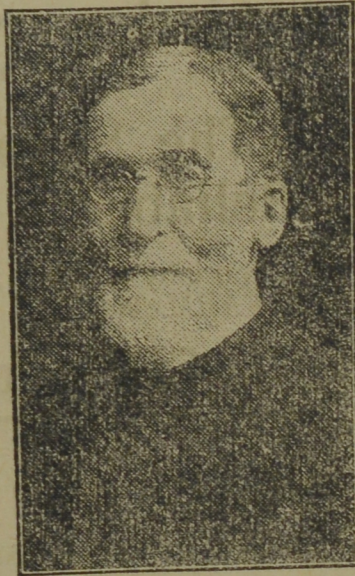
Mention of the Jesuit Missionaries Evokes Storm of Spontaneous Enthusiasm at Night Session of Big Convention—Presbyterian Moderator Leads Devotional Exercises—Speaks to Ladies.

Toronto, April 2.—"The place of the Church in the making of a nation," was the inspiring topic at the second great night meeting in Massey Hall of the Canadian National Missionary Congress.

A magnificent audience of fully four thousand ministers and lay-commissioners turned a sea of faces toward the platform.

The outstanding inter-denominational character of the congress was emphasized by the prominence given to moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly, Rev. Dr. Du Val, as leader of the devotional exercises, in succession to Bishop Sweeney of the Anglican Church, and Rev. Dr. Carman of the Methodist General Conference.

A striking incident of the evening was the outburst of spontaneous applause for the eloquent tribute to the heroism of the Jesuit Fathers paid to those early Canadian missionaries by Canon Tucker, while cheers greeted a later testimony by the same speaker.

er to the great Presbyterian Home Missionary, the late Rev. D. Robertson.

Rev. Dr. Gordon of Winnipeg spoke of the foreign population of the west, and Rev. Dr. Sutherland of the duty of Canadians to the Asiatic population. Rev. J. A. Macdonald aroused enthusiasm in his call for a higher ideal in the everyday life.

At the afternoon meeting Bishop Thoburn, Robert Speer and Dr. Zwemer were the speakers, their addresses referring to the missionary progress in Asia.

A meeting for ladies in Convocation Hall, addressed by Sir Andrew Fraser, attracted such a crowd, that an overflow meeting had to be held in the Physics Building. Another meeting for women will be held in Convocation Hall to-night.

A public meeting in connection with the congress was held last night in the metropolitan Church. S. J. Moore presided. Addresses were given on "The place of the church in the making of the nation," by Prof. W. F. Osborne, Winnipeg; Hon. B. F. Wilber, Halifax, and Rev. W. T. Etackland, Winnipeg. The church was about two-thirds filled. Another meeting will be held this evening.

At the Massey Hall meeting, the chairman, N. W. Rowell, K.C., announced that Hon. S. H. Blake was unable to be present, and his place would be taken by Rev. Canon L. Norman Tucker, representing the missionary society of the Church of England in Canada. Hon. Mr. Blake sent a short message: "Let us do our duty to our red brethren, and at this time enlarge our operations in his behalf."

Falls 60 Feet; Unhurt.

New York, April 2.—How Milton Heitz, aged four, fell 60 feet from the roof of a six-storey tenement, picked out a soft landing-place in a vacant lot dotted with big rocks, and escaped with a scratched finger, is something 125th street residents are trying to figure out. It occurred on Wednesday. He had overreached in grabbing for a toy train. When his mother ran to pick up the mangled remains he was sitting up, with a battered engine and two cars.

Two Children Burned.

Emo, Ont., April 2.—A fatal fire occurred seven miles north of here early yesterday by the destruction of the home of Robert Stirret, sr., a farmer, in which his two children, Colin, aged 7, and Ruby, aged 5, were burned to death. Mr. Stirret was severely burned and other members of the family slightly burned.

Miners Will Strike.

Lethbridge, Alta., April 2.—The Lethbridge local of the United Mine Workers of America met at noon yesterday and took action on a telegram from District President Frank Sherman ordering them to discontinue work pending a new agreement.

Explosion on Steamer.

Marseilles, April 2.—The French tank bark Jules Henry, Capt. Escoffier, in the oil trade between Philadelphia and Cette, blew up yesterday morning and was practically totally wrecked. Twelve members of her crew were killed.

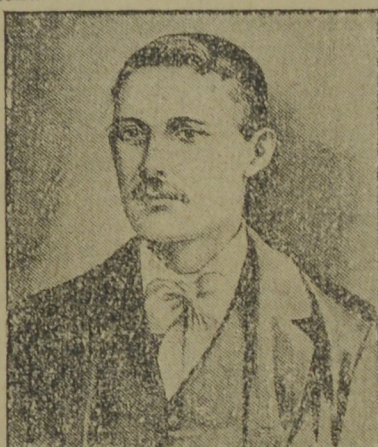
Cuban Town Burned.

Insurance Hearing is Ended.

Ottawa, April 2.—The banking and commerce committee of the Commons completed the hearing of evidence regarding the insurance bill yesterday morning. The proposed measure will now be considered by the sub-committee.

John R. Reid of Ottawa, president of the Life Underwriters' Association of Canada, presented the case for the agents before the committee. He supported the attitude of the life managers in opposing the abolition of estimates and deferred dividend policies. He objected to the publication of all salaries over \$4,000. He thought that was carrying publicity too far.

Can Restrict Business.

New York, April 2.—The section of the new insurance law of this state which limits to \$150,000,000, the amount of business which an insurance company may write in one year, was declared constitutional by Justice O'Gorman in the New York Supreme Court yesterday.

The decision was given in the case of Charles H. Bush, an agent of the New York Life Insurance Co. who brought suit to recover from that company his commission upon a life insurance policy for \$25,000 which the company rejected in December last.

The reason given for the rejection was that the company had already accepted enough business to make up the \$150,000,000 limit.

Will Accept Library.

Hamilton, April 2.—The public library board decided to accept Andrew Carnegie's offer of \$75,000 for new library, if the City Council consents. A sub-committee was appointed to advertise the present building for sale and to select a new site. Southern Limited, has offered \$25,000 for the building with the intention of using it as an office for The Spectator. It will be put up for public bid.

Manslaughter Charged.

Stratford, April 2.—A charge of manslaughter was laid by the crown yesterday against Aloysius Guerin, in connection with the death of the late Alexander Sutherland, who was found dead in the morning of Feb. 26 at the back door of Guerin's house.

He will come up for a preliminary hearing to-day.

Buffalo Plumbers Strike.

Buffalo, April 2.—Two hundred and fifty plumbers struck here yesterday. They demand an increase in wages from \$3.50 to \$4 a day and the adoption of a number of shop rules.

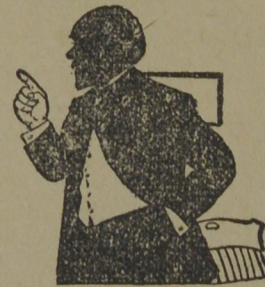
