NEW BILLS MISSING.

Express Package Which Was Lost Contained New Issue.

Ottawa, April 2.—The parcel of bills reported lost or stolen while in transit from Montreal to Toronto is in reality a series of new bills which were sent via Dominion Express Co. by the British American Bank Note Co. of Ottawa to the head office of the Traders Bank of Toronto.

They were sent March 26 and have not yet arrived. The probability is that they were stolen.

The parcel consisted of the first batch of a new issue of bills by the Traders' Bank. They were in sheets of 100 and were not signed. The denomination was five dollars and there was \$20,000 worth.

They will not be easily negotiated as they are entirely different from the present bill, having a shipping scene vignette on the face and on the back a picture of the Traders' Bank of Toronto. None of this peculiar style have yet been issued by the bank.

The local agent of the express company professes no knowledge of the parcel. The bank does not stand to lose anything, as the goods were never delivered.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

The Senate has killed the Lancaster crossings bill again.

Jos. W. Bailey of St. Thomas was killed while blasting at Cobalt.

A. D. Elliott of Winnipeg was killed in a runaway accident at Holmfield.

At Sorrento, Italy, Marion Crawford, the novelist, who has been ill for some time past, has developed symptoms of bronchial pleurisy.

At a meeting of citizens at the Windsor last night it was decided to hold an "old home week" in Montreal during the coming autumn.

A gas buoy exploded accidentally on King's Wharf, Quebec, about noon yesterday. Two men named Granier and Huppe were mortally wounded.

C. E. W. Smith of Montreal has recovered judgment for \$1,250,000 in New York against the Western Pacific Railway as commission on a sale of bonds.

John Evans, an employee of McClary Manufacturing Co., at London, fell 20 feet down an elevator shaft yesterday afternoon and died of his injuries a few hours later.

Mrs. W. Hewes Oliphant of Toronto is the winner of the \$400 prize offered by the Navy League of Canada for the best essay on the question, "Shall Canada have a navy of her own?"

Preston Demanded Investigation. Winnipeg, April 2.—W. A. Preston, M.P.P. of Fort Francis, whose company is alleged to have been mixed up in a deal to defraud the Ontario Government out of a couple of thousand dollars in timber dues, was in the city yesterday and gives a denial to the story which was sent out from his town, Mr. Preston said:

"The story is untruthful and maliciously misleading. Mr. Johnston, the discharged bookkeeper, did not, as stated in the article, prefer the charges referred to. He demanded \$500 from the company, claiming that he had falsified returns, and thereby saved the company a large amount of money. On receipt of this document I placed the matter in the hands of Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Lands, Forest and Mines for Ontario, and demanded a full investigation."

CATTLE MARKETS. Cables Steady—Hogs 5c Higher at Buffalo and Chicago.

LONDON, April 1.—London cables for cattle are steady, at 13 1/4c to 14 1/4c per head for Canadian steers, dressed weight; refrigerator beef is quoted at 9 1/2c per pound.

Toronto Live Stock. TORONTO, April 1.—The railways reported the receipts of live stock at the City Market for Wednesday and Thursday as being 122 carloads, consisting of 2070 cattle, 1836 hogs, 410 sheep and 174 calves.

Exporters—Export steers, \$3.30 to \$5.00; bulls, \$4 to \$5. The bulk of the export steers sold around \$3.40 to \$5.50.

Butchers—George Rowntree bought for the Harris Abattoir Co., 600 cattle during the two days, therefore we give his quotations of the cattle bought to kill which were as follows: Eastern, fancy, cattle, \$5.00 to \$6.25; exporters, \$5.30 to \$5.60; butchers, \$4.50 to \$5.30; cows, \$3.60 to \$4.60. Included in the 600 cattle were two loads of the best heavy finished cattle that have been on the market this year. They weighed 1390 lbs. each.

Twenty-two of them were fed by Irwin Halliday, seven by Charles Hammond, and twelve by A. Snyder, all Waterloo farmers. The cattle were a credit to these men, and an example for other farmers to follow.

Stockers and Feeders. Harry Murby reports trade light. Mr. Murby bought 200 cattle at following quotations: Steers, 900 to 1100 lbs. each, at \$4 to \$4.75; steers, 800 to 900 lbs. each, at \$3.75 to \$4; stockers, 500 to 700 lbs. each, at \$3 to \$3.25.

Trade in milkers and springers was not nearly as good as it has been. Prices ranged from \$20 to \$56 each, the bulk selling around \$40 to \$46.

Veal Calves. The general quality of veal calves was not good, only about one calf in 25 was worthy the name of veal. Prices ranged from \$3 to \$7 per cwt. with few at latter price.

Sheep and Lambs. Receipts light. Export ewes, \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt.; range, \$3.50 to \$4.25; yearling lambs grain-fed, \$7.25 to \$7.75; common, \$5 to \$6 per cwt. Spring lambs sold at \$5 to \$6 for the bulk.

Hogs. Prices steady. Selects, fed and watered at the market, \$7.15, and \$6.90 f.o.b. cars at country points.

Gas Export Must Cease.

Welland, Ont., April 2.—The Provincial Gas Co. received official notice from Ottawa this week that its permit to export natural gas, expiring March 31, would not be renewed, and Wednesday night at midnight the supply going to Buffalo was shut off. One-third of the Buffalo supply came from Canada.

Greek Cabinet Resigns. Athens, April 2.—The Greek Cabinet, of which G. N. Theotokis was Premier, has resigned in protest against the action of the King, who received a deputation of citizens, contrary to the Government's wish. The deputation sought the dismissal of the director of customs.

Swallowed a Diamond.

Ottawa, April 2.—Bernard McGarry, a Toronto man, who recently entered Rosenthal's jewelry store here and got away with a \$150 diamond, was yesterday morning sentenced to nine months in Central Prison. The stone was not recovered, and it is thought he swallowed it.

Children No Obstacle.

Albany, N.Y., April 2.—Landlords may no longer refuse to rent apartments because the tenants applying have children without being subjected to a fine for committing a misdemeanor, if a bill introduced yesterday by Assemblyman Goldberg becomes a law. The bill also prohibits a provision in a lease that such lease shall terminate on the birth of a child, in such house or apartment. The measure applies only to first-class cities.
