A STORMY DEBATE.

affidavit which Mr. Hazen read at St. John? Surely not."

Dr. Daniel—That is the original affidavit, sworn to by Mr. Mayes and read by Mr. Hazen.

Dr. Pugsley—My honorable friend must see that this cannot be the original affidavit. He said in his speech that the original affidavit read 1907, not 1905 in a second.

Dr. Daniel—The Minister holds in his hands both affidavits, one sworn to on October 12, 1908, and a second affidavit with correction made as to date.

Dr. Pugsley—What I have long sought through letters from my solicitors to Premier Hazen and others was the original affidavit. Mr. Hazen read a false affidavit and read it with intention of misleading and deceiving the people.

Loud cries of order greeted this statement, and several opposition members were on their feet at the same time to raise points of order.

Speaker Marcell declared amid considerable uproar that no specific point of order had been raised, and that in any case he would not allow two or three members to speak at the same time.

Mr. Crockett jumped to his feet to say something, but Dr. Pugsley, who was also on his feet waiting to resume his speech, would not give way and the Speaker also rose. For a few moments all three remained standing, while the House was in a hub-bub. Dr. Pugsley in deference to the Speaker, sat down, but Mr. Crockett still remained standing.

Finally the Speaker induced both members to take their seats.

Mr. Crockett then asked if the Speaker's ruling on the point of order raised by Mr. Lennox did not mean that the statement made by one member of the House need not necessarily be accepted as true by another member.

NOT THE POINT.

Speaker Marcell—That is not the point. In this case it is simply a question of two different versions as to what took place at the St. John meeting. It does not refer to the proceedings in this House.

DR. PUGSLEY'S SPEECH.

Dr. Pugsley, resuming, noted amid loud Liberal applause, that the original affidavits, which it was now alleged had been corrected at the St. John meeting on Oct. 12th last, had evidently not been fully corrected until March 24th last, for corrected affidavits as laid on the table of the House was only sworn to on one of later date. "This admittedly false affidavit," he said, "which I asked for over and over again, has been kept concealed until now and no attempt has been made to correct it until last month."

Proceeding, Mr. Pugsley asked Dr. Daniel what he thought next day when he read in the St. John papers the statement that he (Mr. Pugsley) had received money in 1907 when he was Minister of Public Works. What did he think of the editorials which charged that as a Minister of the Crown he had prostituted his office and received that money. What efforts did he take to correct the wrong impression conveyed to the public?

Dr. Daniel—When I saw it in the press I just thought, the reporters at the meeting had failed lamentably in their duty. (Oh, oh, and laughter.)

REMISS HIMSELF.

Mr. Pugsley—What does the honorable gentleman think of his own failure of duty to let the public know that the affidavit was wrong? What does he think of the failure of duty on the part of Mr. Hazen, who has not expressed the slightest regret for the wrong done to me? Was it not strange that through a typewriter's error the reporters had fallen into the same error and that all the Conservative papers from the Atlantic to the Pacific should have been guilty of the same error? There was evidence in the affidavit outside the date that those who had to do with the affidavit deliberately got to work with the intention of inducing people to believe that he had received money in 1907. Again he asked, was it not strange that the date should have been put forward from the time when he was acting as solicitor for Mayes to the time when he was Minister of Public Works. In the affidavit Mayes stated that he (Mr. Pugsley) had said to him that it would be nice to have some one at Ottawa to do something for him. "I want," declared Mr. Pugsley, "to denounce that statement as absolutely false." Mayes was indebted to him to a considerable amount of money for services which he had performed as solicitor. It was true that he had asked Mayes for money on account of professional services, and Mayes gave him his note for \$2,000. Was there anything in that which would render him unworthy of a position in the House or in the government?

There was another statement in the affidavit which was equally false. That statement was that he had declined to pay Mayes any money unless he settled with McAvity. That statement was absolutely false. Further, Mayes stated that he (Mr. Pugsley) held money to which he was not

entitled. There was no shadow of foundation for that statement. What relations that were between Mayes and McAvity he did not know, but he supposed they were partners in dredging transactions. In the summer of 1908 he received a communication from Mr. McAvity stating that he was interested in the contract. On August 22, 1908, he wrote to Mayes informing him that he did not intend to intervene in the matter.

ALWAYS AFTER FAVORS.

Dr. Daniel—The Minister holds in his hands both affidavits, one sworn to on October 12, 1908, and a second affidavit with correction made as to date. Mayes was constantly seeking favors from the department of public works. When he became Minister of Public Works, Mayes was seeking to have the contract which he had agreed to carry out for 55 cents per cubic yard increased to 90 cents, but if correspondence of the department was examined it would be found that he never treated either Mayes or McAvity as if they had the slightest claim upon his friendship or consideration. In every case he had acted in discharge of his public duty and had held Mayes strictly to his contract. "If," Mr. Pugsley said, "any honorable member can find in the correspondence anything upon which he might feel that a charge can be made against me as Minister of Public Works, I invite him to make the charge. That is the proper and manly course to take. My honorable friend is neither manly, nor is it the honorable conduct to be expected from public men that they should seek upon mere insinuations to destroy the character of their opponents when they are not prepared to take responsibility of submitting definite charges."

Dr. Daniel objected to be ascribed as unmanly or dishonorable. And asked the Minister to take back the words.

(Cries of take your medicine.) Mr. Pugsley said he was endeavoring to point out what the duty of a member of the House was. "I cannot," he added, "possibly withdraw that statement." (Loud Liberal cheers.)

AN UPROAR.

Amid considerable uproar Dr. Daniel repeated his demand that the words unmanly and dishonorable be withdrawn, stating that if he would follow suit.

Speaker—The words if used are not parliamentary. Mr. Pugsley—I said honorable and manly course for a member of this House, instead of making insinuations as to have courage to make a charge.

Dr. Daniel—I never made any insinuations against the minister. Mr. Pugsley—If he says he did not insinuate against me I accept his statement. But he certainly made no charges. He has certainly made that the Prime Minister ought to accept my resignation.

Mr. Pugsley, proceeding, asked if Dr. Daniel had made no insinuations what was the meaning of the suggestion that the prime minister should ask him to resign. Turning again to the affidavit he described as false the statement made by Mayes that he was the only tenderer upon both occasions. If fathering the affidavit Dr. Daniel should have satisfied himself as to the truth of its statements. He knew or ought to have known from papers brought down that Mayes was not the only tenderer, but that on both occasions Haney and Miller, Toronto, also tendered. Mayes' tender was the lowest on both occasions, there being a difference of 45 cents between his and that of Haney and Miller, and the former Minister of Public Works had acted properly in accepting the lowest tender. The crown had no contract with McAvity and would have no ground of action, and no claim against him. But there was no collusion; the crown could not proceed at all. As a matter of fact he understood Mayes had sued McAvity because he had not received any favors from the department of public works. (Liberal cheers.) However, the people of St. John and New Brunswick had accepted the affidavit at its true value.

ALL THAT IS LEFT.

Resuming at eight o'clock Dr. Pugsley repeated that probably to some extent the success achieved by the Liberal party in New Brunswick at the last election was due to conduct of Conservatives. "There," he said, "pointing to Dr. Daniel and Mr. Crockett, "is all that is left of the once great Conservative party of New Brunswick." Continuing, he said: "I have always been ready and willing to meet any attacks made upon myself and it gives me great pleasure today to have the opportunity of meeting insinuations contained in the statement presented to the House. What I always desired was that I should meet my opponents in the open. I never shall be afraid to meet my enemies in the open. I desire to say in the most emphatic manner possible that I had no interest at any time either in 1905 or since, directly or indirectly
