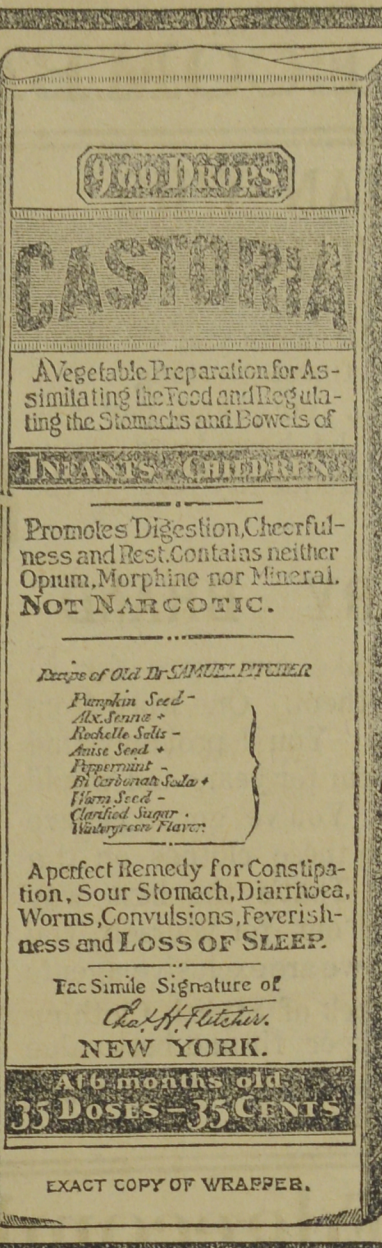

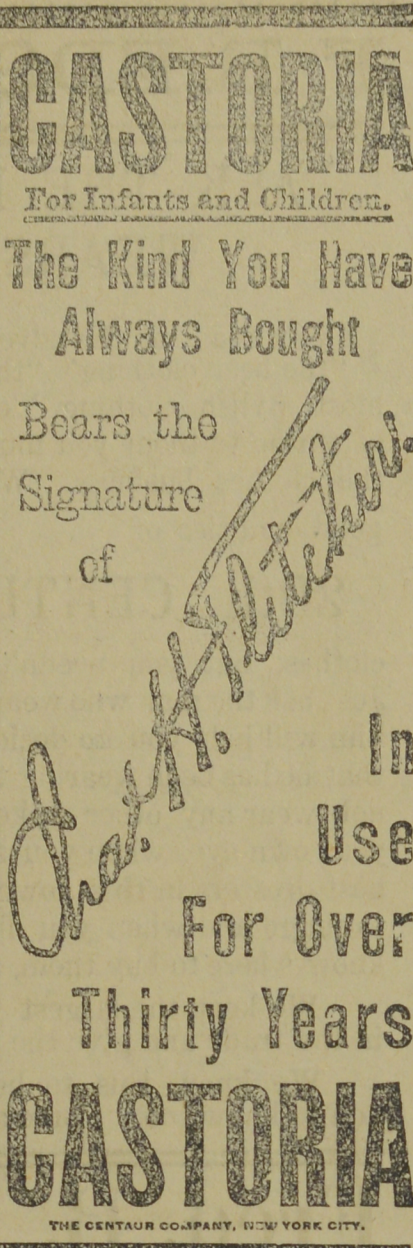

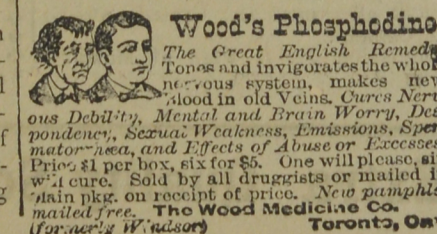

AMERICAN INVASION OF WESTERN CANADA.

Winnipeg, Man., April 17.—The American invasion of Western Canada is more pronounced this year than ever before in the history of "the last west." Every north-bound train brings prosperous American farmers who have sold out "south of the line" to make their home under the British flag. It is not by tens and dozens that they are coming out but by hundreds and thousands, and estimates carefully prepared by government agents show that fully 70,000 Americans will settle in Western Canada this year.

The majority of these homeseekers look to various Saskatchewan points where most of them buy land, only a small percentage of them taking up homesteads. Hearing of the large profits made in the past in the new towns a number of them are locating along the route of the Great Canadian Pacific R.R.—Canada's new transcontinental. The division points along this system are attracting considerable attention on account of the possibilities for them becoming cities within a very few years. However, Melville, which is to be the operating base of some 12,000 miles of the company's system seems to be the favorite of them all. There a town of 1,300 people, mostly Americans, has sprung up within the past eight months. A year ago Melville was nothing but a bare prairie; last December it was incorporated as a town. The statement issued by the assessor places the value of the property in Melville at \$724,000 and these figures will be doubled before another month if only one quarter of the buildings planned for immediate construction are erected.

Rapidly Melville is becoming the American city of Western Canada for it is American capital and American population, to a very large extent, which has built up the prosperous little town during the past nine months. (Reginald F. Robinson, Winnipeg, Canada)

Professors Resign.

Winnipeg, April 22.—Several important changes in the staff of Manitoba College will become effective at the close of the present term. Rev. Dr. Bryce and Rev. Dr. Hart have resigned and their resignations will be considered by the senate on Monday next.

The retirement of Dr. Bryce from the college which he founded over 30 years ago will be matter of regret among all those interested in the institution. Dr. Bryce was born of Scottish parents at Mount Pleasant, Ont., April 22, 1844, and was educated at the Brantford High School and at the University of Toronto, from which he graduated with honors in 1867.

Cigarette Paper Saves Him.

Harrisburg, Pa., April 22.—Harry Brown, a Reading Railroad brakeman, was saved from death after a fall from a train by means of a tiny torch, made from cigarette paper. Brown fell from his train near this city early yesterday morning and broke his leg. While lying on the track, cold and suffering intense pain, he was unable to attract attention. Finally he found a package of cigarette paper in his pocket, and, twisting the paper into small torches, he lighted several and attracted the attention of some train men. A few minutes after he was rescued from his dangerous place a train passed the track on which he had lain.

Sultan Wants to Stay.

Constantinople, April 22.—The conflict between Mussulman piety and the political ideas of the west has brought the Turkish people to the verge of civil war.

The Cabinet debated the situation for four hours yesterday.

The Sultan's primary demand is to remain the constitutional sovereign, with all the spiritual powers of the caliphate, with liberal allowance for his household, while he also asks for a variety of minor guarantees which it would not be difficult to grant.

The demands of the Committee of Union and Progress, is that the Sultan offer no resistance whatever, and submit unconditionally.

New U.S. Customs Court.

Washington, April 22.—The Senate committee on finance yesterday practically perfected an amendment to the tariff bill, providing for the establishment of a customs court to hear cases appealed from the boards of appraisers.

The court will consist of three members, to receive salaries of \$10,000 a year each.

Headquarters of the court will be in the New York district, but the court may sit in any of the other eight districts, when required.

Hungarian Cabinet Resigns.

Budapest, April 22.—The Bulgarian Cabinet resigned yesterday and the Emperor King, Francis Joseph has asked Count Andrássy, Minister of the Interior, to form a new Cabinet. The resignation is due to internal divergencies which have resulted in the breaking up of the coalition of political parties.

U. S. Steel Corporation Directors.

New York, April 22.—Heads of the various subsidiary companies of the United States Steel Corporation met in this city yesterday for one of the conferences held by them from time to time for discussion of matters connected with the management of their plants. Practically all the subsidiary companies were represented by either their presidents or their managers.

Following the meeting it was stated by the chairman of the steel corporations' board of directors, that neither the question of steel prices nor of employees' wages had been discussed.

Saskatchewan Owns Telephone Plant.

Regina, April 22.—It is officially announced that the Provincial Government has acquired the entire plant of the long distance and local exchanges of the Bell Telephone Co. in Saskatchewan.

Pending the working out of some details, further information was withheld, but it is understood the bills will be paid in cash and not in provincial bonds.

To Disestablish Church.

London, April 22.—The long promised bill for the disestablishment of the church in Wales, was introduced in the House of Commons yesterday by Premier Asquith.

Fear Bombs at Funeral.

Pekin, April 21.—Arrangements for the approaching funeral services for the late Emperor reveal the fact that extraordinary precautions are being taken to safeguard the imperial prince and high officials against the possibility of a bomb being thrown or other outrages.

The infant Emperor will not participate in the ceremony and the prince regent will participate only within the confines of the closely-guarded imperial city.

Steamer Sinks in Lake.

Mackinaw City, Mich., April 21.—The steamer Eber Ward sank in Lake Michigan, six miles west of here yesterday. Five of the crew were drowned and ten were saved.

Found Body at the Falls.

Niagara Falls, Ont., April 22.—The exposed legs of a man were found protruding from the ice that abounds at the Cave of the Winds on the American side, near the base of the American Falls, yesterday morning.

The Busman's Christmas Friend.

Perhaps the greatest Christmas-present givers in this country are the Rothschilds,—the brothers whose combined millions could buy kingdoms. It is Mr. Leopold Rothschild's custom to present all the omnibus drivers and conductors whose route takes them past his house in Piccadilly with a brace of pheasants each on Christmas Eve, and in acknowledgement of this the bus-drivers always make way for his carriage to pass, and wear a little flag in their coats on his birthday.
