MR. UPHAM'S POSITION.

TODAY'S MARKET.

Today's market was fairly large considering the condition of the roads. There was, however, not much of a variety of produce. Eggs were very plentiful and sold at 23 cents per doz. A large quantity of butter was also offered for sale at 25 cents per lb., but the most of it was disposed of at 23 cents per pound. Veal sold at 6 and 8 cents per lb., and ham at 11 and 12 cents per pound. Potatoes sold as high as \$2 per bbl. A quantity of honey was offered at 23 cents per bottle.

Very Rev. Dean Schofield will leave here on Friday next for St. John, from which place he will sail on Saturday next for England. The Dean expects to be absent all summer. FLEWELLING PROPERTY.

Ald. Farrell Purchases Dwelling at Auction for \$4,200.

The brick dwelling house on St. John street belonging to the Estate of the late Mr. W. P. Flewelling was sold at Public Auction in front of the City Hall at noon today. The property which is a freehold one was knocked down after some lively bidding to Ald. W. E. Farrell for \$4,200. A large number of leading real estate men were present. The bidding was started by Mr. Wm. McMullen, of the Crown Land office, at \$3,000 and that gentleman made several bids, the last being \$4,100.

Other property belonging to the estate was also disposed of. The summer camp on the Spring-hill road was bid in by Mr. Hugh Calder for \$250. It is estimated to have cost close to \$1,000.

Mr. Salomon Kerner bid in the boat house for \$25.

A rowboat was sold to Mr. Chas. Duffy for \$2.50.

The small steam launch was bid in at \$18.

Two wagons belonging to the estate were also disposed of at \$12 and \$19 respectively.

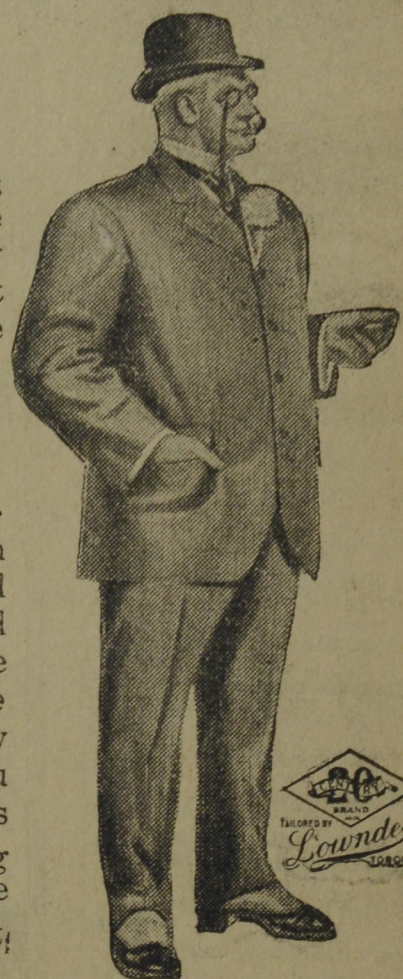

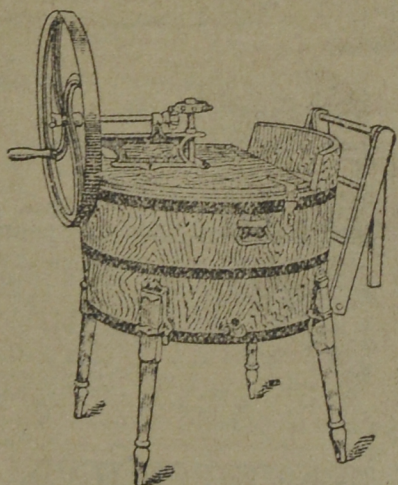
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
