"AN EXPERIMENT."

The Moncton Times, a subservient Tory organ, which is ever ready to apologize for the short comings of the Hazen government, hastens to explain that the suspended highway act was "of an experimental nature, to get the views of the people."

This is certainly the most remarkable and refreshing piece of information yet suggested in connection with Mr. Hazen's abject surrender.

An experiment! indeed. Why the people of this province were told by Mr. Hazen and his supporters that the new highway act was one of the best laws ever placed on the statute books of this or any other country. It was indeed the real thing, and under its operation New Brunswick roads would soon become perfect, so that the farmers could get to market with their produce in better time, and everybody would have reason to rejoice at the new order of things inaugurated through the wonderful wisdom of Premier Hazen.

An experiment! indeed! Where? and where? The new law has not been brought into operation, because Mr. Hazen has heard the protests of an indignant people. His road law, as well as his general blundering, has been passed upon in two constituencies, and in both Mr. Hazen's candidates were defeated.

An experiment! Mr. Hazen dared not bring his law into force in its present shape, and it is hanging up for another year, while the much condemned highway act of his predecessors continues to govern road making in this province.

The Moncton Times adds that "the question is a difficult one to deal with and the government, fresh in power, did not feel competent to submit any act that would beyond doubt meet every reasonable objection even."

This is a remarkable confession after all the boasting the government made respecting the perfection of its new road law, which it has discovered is so vicious in principle and so loosely framed that Mr. Hazen dare not bring it into operation until he has submitted it to the municipal councils.

There was no such proposition when the bill was before the legislature, and it is only second thought, after Mr. Hazen has discovered the unpopularity and unworkable character of his boasted highway measure.

WELL PROTECTED.

The record of fire losses in Fredericton during the past year shows the insignificant sum of less than \$1,200, and it is creditable alike to the city, which has provided an efficient water supply and well equipped its fire department, as well as the men whose duty it is as firemen, to protect the property and lives of the citizens.

Chief Rutter, in his well written and exhaustive report of the fire department's activities during the year, notes with satisfaction the very slight fire losses, and calls attention to the fact that the measures which the city has taken to provide ample fire protection, has resulted in a reduction of twenty per cent in insurance premiums. The Chief also expresses satisfaction with the equipment of the department, which he says requires no reinforcement at present. The efficiency of its fire brigade is one of Fredericton's boasts, and under the present Chief the department meets the public demand in a most satisfactory manner.

THE ASYLUM FIRE.

The destruction by fire of a portion of the Provincial Lunatic Asylum at Fairville, fortunately was unattended by loss of life, but it is horrible to contemplate what might have occurred had the flames broken out later in the night and spread rapidly to the portions of the building inhabited by the five hundred unfortunates, receiving treatment there. Some twenty-six years ago the Alms house of Halifax was burned, and a score or more of the inmates perished in the flames, but the New Brunswick institution for the insane, although partially burned, was spared a horror of that kind.

There seems to have been some delay in handling the fire, and the lesson is enforced that the Asylum should have a complete fire fighting apparatus, capable of coping with any reasonable emergency, and of protecting the lives of the inmates and the property of the province.

The original motion was carried on the same vote reversed.

On motion of Ald. Winslow, seconded by Ald. Clarke, a legislative committee of three members was appointed.

The Mayor named as the committee Alds. Winslow, Clarke and Hooper.

The city clerk said that as there were several law suits pending against the city, it was desirable that a committee should be appointed to advise with him.

It was decided that the city clerk advise with the committee controlling the department.

On motion of Ald. Winslow the council adjourned.

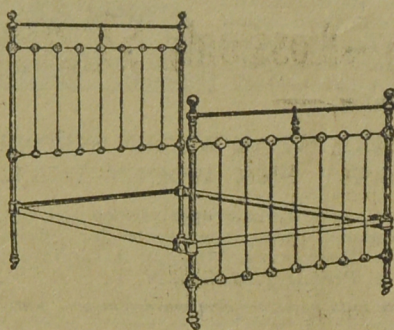

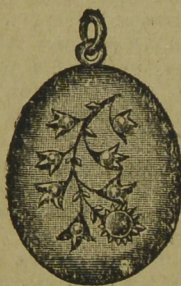

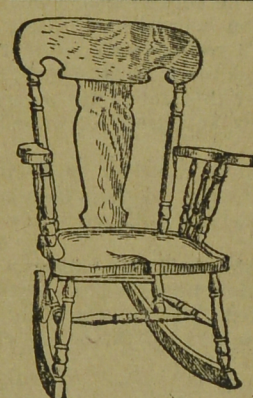
