The world's record for a day's run by a trans-Atlantic liner has been moved up a couple of miles by the Mauretania and now stands at 673 nautical miles for the day.

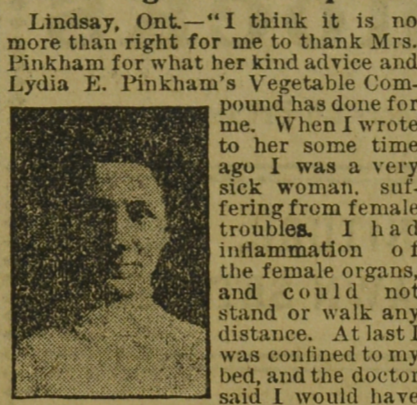

Montreal Druggists' Troubles.

Montreal, June 11.—As the result of an action taken by the Pharmaceutical Association against Hanfield, the druggist, a thousand actions are entered. Hanfield was charged with selling cocaine, and his brothers, lawyers, have entered eight actions against 150 druggists for selling cocaine illegally. These failed on a technicality. They are bound to get their revenge, and have entered a test case, to be followed by 150 others for selling liquor illegally. The practice is general by all the druggists, and the only defence can be that the offence is technical. The penalty is \$50 or \$100, of which the informer gets a quarter.

German Delegate to Woman's Congress Enter Plea.

CONFERENCE ALMOST OVER

Great Gathering of Women at Toronto Will Conclude To-night With a Big Reception to Visitors—Frau Stritt Presides in Absence of Lady Aberdeen—Lady Edgar Makes Farewell Speech.

Toronto, June 30.—"When the lights go down to-night in this beautiful hall, they will not be lighted again under similar conditions till five years hence in the Eternal City."

So Lady Edgar feelingly referred to the last night meeting of the present International Women's Congress last night in convocation hall. The congress will continue its sessions during the day, and to-night a farewell reception will be held in the Parliament buildings.

"The last time is one for solemn thoughts," Lady Edgar said. Rev. Canon Cody, speaking last Sunday, she reminded the audience, described it as "a congress of organized sympathy."

"Will you think of it as this," she pleaded.

Frau Stritt, the German leader, presided in the absence of Lady Aberdeen.

One of the speakers was Fraulein Ide Kirch of Germany, who told how legal aid was furnished to the poor by the trades union organizations, Protestant legal aid, Roman Catholic legal aid, legal aid societies for women by women, public welfare societies, political organization and municipal legal aid societies. In 1907 one million cases were dealt with by these societies. From the first the women took part in the work.

"In our work we hold it essential that a woman should stand face to face with a woman as she can enter into her case as a man cannot do," said the speaker. In marriage contracts, and guardianships of poor children, much useful advice was given, and male barristers and judges gave much assistance.

She therefore made a warm appeal to the women of Canada and the United States for the establishment of municipal legal aid offices under the direction of men and women lawyers.

D.D. for Rev. W. C. White. Toronto, June 30.—The corporation of Trinity College will confer the degree of doctor of divinity, honoris causa, on Rev. William C. White, who has been chosen by the Church of England in Canada to be the first bishop of the new Canadian missionary jurisdiction in the Province of Honan, China. The degree will probably be conferred in September or October next, shortly before the bishop's departure for China to assume his new responsibility there.

Want Canadians Stirred Up. London, June 30.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—Hon. Josiah Thomas, formerly Postmaster-General of Australia, writes to Henniker Heaton: "Can you do something to stir up Canadians to provide for state-owned telegraph lines across Canada? Unsatisfactory working by privately owned lines is interfering very seriously with the Pacific cable."

A FIGHTING SPEECH.

Hon. C. W. Robinson Exposes Short Comings of Hazen Government.

Hon. C. W. Robinson, leader of the opposition in the Local Legislature, attended the Liberal convention at St. John Monday night, and delivered an important speech which should be carefully perused. He said:

Mr. Chairman and gentlemen, delegates of the county of St. John, I thank you most sincerely for the reception. I am pleased to have the opportunity of being present and of saying a few words with my good friend, Mr. Lowell, who has so long represented the county of St. John at Fredericton. No county in the province has a representative who looks after its interests with more zeal than Mr. Lowell. Indeed, as he has told you, so watchful has he been of your interests that when the government of which he was a supporter wanted to pass something which he was convinced the county did not want he stood out against it and was successful.

"The government of the day made a special road law for the county which stood on the statute book for thirty years. Yet when the Hazen government took away your rights as a municipality and said you should elect only two members on your county board where was Hon. Robert Maxwell, president of the council? Dumb as an oyster! By assuming the right to elect the third member of your county board, the government has taken away from the county the very thing Mr. Hazen promised the municipalities—the control of their own affairs."

"I must congratulate you on the magnificent attendance here tonight and on the fact that you have many well qualified men to represent you. I must also congratulate Mr. Bentley, whom I met for the first time this evening. I feel sure he will make you an excellent representative. Your attendance and enthusiasm show that you are going into this fight with zeal and are sure of victory when the day of election comes. (Cheers.)"

"You have maintained your grip on Mr. Lowell for a long time and I hope you will continue to do so. He is a man who has won the respect not only of his friends or the opposition but of all Mr. Hazen's supporters. They fear him because he stands up for what he believes to be right."

AFFIDAVIT ORGAN ANSWERED.

"By the Standard this morning I see I am asked to apologize for the financial statement issued before the last provincial election. I am sorry the editor of the Standard is so ignorant. I have not seen any proof that the statement was incorrect. It was prepared by a chartered accountant and I have no apology to make except that I was not able to present the affairs of the province in as good a light as I should like to have done."

"I think you will agree with me that, during the last few months, we have had all the evidence we want of lack of candor and jugglery with figures on the part of the present government. They have issued only one financial statement so far, which they could call their own. They claimed a surplus of \$40,000 for the year ended Oct. 31st, 1903. Now there were certain sums paid after October, 1907, which could not be included in that year's account and when Mr. Fleming came into power he dragged them all into a net, issued bonds and so paid for them. He said he wanted to start with a clean sheet."

"So the bonds were issued and he was responsible only for the year which ended with October, 1908. When the close of the year arrived, I can imagine his announcing to the auditor general that he had a surplus of \$40,000 and that the attorney general reminding him that there were items amounting to nearly \$100,000 still to come in. 'But if I pay them,' Mr. Fleming must have replied, 'I shall have a deficit of \$60,000! Better close the accounts up now.' (Much laughter.)"

"Notwithstanding all they told us, gentlemen, that nothing would be carried over, we found, in answer to an enquiry in the house, that of \$90,000 expended on bridges, nearly every dollar belonged to the previous year."

"The present government have enjoyed an income we never had. We felt we were lucky if we had \$800,000, but, through the efforts of Mr. Pugsley, Mr. Tweedie and Mr. Emerson, the province secured an increase in revenue of \$130,000 a year through the additional subsidy, and the present government received the first full payment of this sum. It swelled the revenue of this province to more than \$1,000,000, yet still they could not carry on the administration without a deficit."

RECEIPTS MORE THAN A MILLION, YET DEFICIT!

"An examination of the accounts

shows that there is a deficit of about \$50,000. Their cry for years was that the late government was extravagant. Mr. Fleming quoted such items as payments for flowers and bands, which were spent in St. John for the entertainment of the prince—the king's representative. I suppose they would have gone down to meet the representative of the king, who came to visit this loyal city, with a wheelbarrow and a mouth organ? (much laughter.) I can imagine Mr. Fleming toiling up King street with a wheelbarrow and Mr. Hazen following with the mouth organ (renewed laughter)."

"It was all clap-trap, gentlemen. They said the money was wasted on the roads, and the cry was 'put us in power and we will show you how the money should be spent.' How have they shown us? They expended \$100,000 more; had an income of \$1,000,000 and yet came out with a deficit. Their policy has been one of recklessness unheard of. They contended if the road money was handled wisely there would be money enough and they would even reduce the road tax. What did they do? They went to work and doubled it."

THE NEED FOR GOOD ROADS.

"I have always contended that the province never had money enough for the roads, and with the increased subsidy it was the hope of the late government to increase the grant. Nothing is more necessary than good transportation facilities to make a country prosperous."

"The government are not treating the people of the province with candor. There is the school book question. The previous government was charged with having with a book ring. I can honestly say I never heard of it. I believed the time had come when the prices on school books could be reduced, and I said so before the last election. Our friends appear to have made a reduction to a certain extent, but whether they have reduced the cost to the province, no man knows. They are distributing the books to dealers to sell all over the province, and have appointed people who have proved themselves unworthy. If the government had the interest of the scholars at heart why did they make these appointments? How easy it would have been to make school teachers the vendors? How as things are now, do they expect to get the money back? There will be thousands of dollars lost to the province."

"The teachers could do all that was required in the way of distribution, and it would have been the simplest thing for the government to collect the money, for they have the teachers' salaries in their own hands. This method was too simple. They wanted jobs for their henchmen."

"Take again the administration of justice. When in opposition they charged that the attorney general employed lawyers all over the province, and they led the people to believe would do all the work. Yet, contrary to the law, we find them employing lawyers in the county courts instead of the county clerk as the law directs."

A CASE IN POINT.

"Take Albert county. A lawyer was sent there as the representative of the attorney general to prosecute a political opponent who was kept before the court for a week on a preposterous charge. It was an abuse of the power of attorney general. Hundreds of dollars were spent in the prosecution of this ridiculous case, and in the end Judge Wederburn said he had no jurisdiction, and intimated that the representative of the attorney general was incompetent and did not know what he was doing. Honest men are almost afraid to live in Albert county if they are opponents of the government." A voice, "There are others, too."

"I charge against Mr. Hazen that the office of attorney general is being dragged in the mud for political gain." (Loud cheers.)

"I shall have other opportunities, if Mr. Lowell wants me, of addressing different sections of the county (hear, hear). I always stand by Mr. Lowell because he stands by his friends. (Cheers.) I have always been a Liberal and I cannot help regarding local issues as I do dominion politics."

HAZEN'S DECEIT OF LIBERALS.

"You know how Mr. Hazen deceived the Liberals of the province in the last election. You know how he gained the treasury bench through the support of Liberals. How did he show his gratitude? You remember how he thanked the Liberals for returning him to power, and how a few months later in the last dominion elections he went all over the province in support of the Conservatives. Memories of the Mayes affidavit are not yet forgotten."

"Since the government came into power they have turned every Liberal they could out of office, and if they could not do that they legislate them out. (Cheers.) Wherever a Liberal head appears, off it goes."

"HAZEN, THE HEADSMAN."

"It should be Hazen, the headsmen rather than Hazen the Premier. (Renewed cheers.) To take but one instance, there was Mr. Rogers, of Albert, who was dismissed on a paltry charge, and it is going on all the time. Liberals should resent the way Mr. Hazen is using his position. I do not quarrel with him for being a Conservative, but when placed in his present position by Liberals, it is not right that he should use that position against the Liberals of the province. It is not Mr. Hazen, it is the Premier of the province who is going about working against Liberals."

"You remember he told a delegation in Fredericton that his government would guarantee \$25,000 for the St. John Valley Railway if the Dominion government would take the road over as part of the I.C.R. When the delegation went to Ottawa they were well received and the Premier asked Mr. Hazen to have his proposal placed on the statutes. What did Mr. Hazen do? He led the delegates to believe he would do it, and when the time came he said he did nothing it was advisable. Was that the way to deal with an important matter of this kind? Promises made should be carried out."

A GOOD CANDIDATE.

"I hope you will all return to your homes with an earnest desire to succeed in this contest. In Mr. Bentley you have a man you should all be proud of, and one who will make a good colleague for Mr. Lowell. He is going to take off his coat and I hope every Liberal will do the same."

"There have been two bye-elections, and in neither of them did the government fare well. They claimed that we obtained money from the lumbermen for election purposes, and said, 'put us in power; we will do better.' In Northumberland when Mr. Morrison was defeated, and they wanted Ernest Hutchison to run, what did they do? For fear they would lose one seat, they bowed down to the lumbermen and reduced the size of the log. Was it right and honest, fair and square, to make that reduction to secure supporters in Northumberland? In the end they did not get Mr. Hutchison but Mr. Burchill, who, as a good Liberal, has on more than one occasion given the government some of his mind."

BLACK EYE IN CARLETON.

"Carleton county returned an opposition supporter, and all over the province the feeling is swinging against the government. They will do all they can in the county of St. John to stem the tide. This election will have an important bearing on the future."

"When the present government were in opposition you remember how they charged Hon. William Pugsley with being an awfully extravagant man. They figured up every dollar that went through his hands, and claimed that \$8,000 a year went into his own pocket. It was not true as Mr. Pugsley stated time and time again, but Mr. Hazen in a few months has received money at the rate of \$6,000 a year. I do not charge Mr. Hazen with receiving too much, but I want honesty and fair play. If a man of Mr. Pugsley's recognized ability, who successfully fought the battles of this province and secured an increased subsidy, committed a crime, surely Mr. Hazen, who is still in the kindergarten stage, is getting a large slice. (Laughter and cheers.)"

"I thank you again for your hearty reception. It has given me great pleasure to be here. Make it a good fighting campaign and I feel sure you will succeed."

Amid another outburst of hearty cheering, Mr. Robinson resumed his seat.

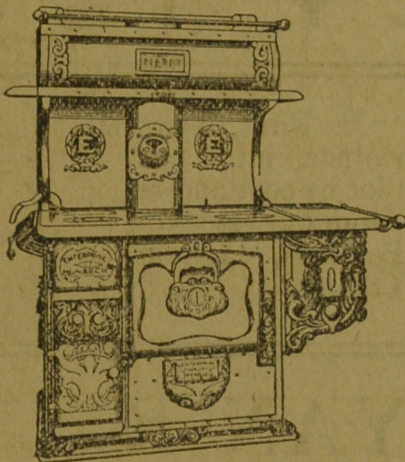
