

CROWD HEARD FLOW OF ORATORY.

Thirty-Five Thousand People Assembled at Burlington Celebration.

BURLINGTON, Vt., July 9.—The population of Burlington is twenty thousand. Yesterday thirty-five thousand human beings thronged its streets. The city hall part of this pretty town is a large square facing the municipal buildings, and enclosed on the other three sides by business blocks. Yesterday morning it was one vast, seething multitude of enthusiastic United States citizens, gathered together to greet their President. Nothing more inspiring could be imagined. Nothing more inspiring has been witnessed since these celebrations first began. Over the sea of heads waved the Stars and Stripes, swinging high in the cooling breeze. Over those heads, too, floated the strains of America's National song, "My country, 'tis of thee." And into the hearts of the thousands there came the thrill that only the true patriotism can know when they behold the President standing in that capacity before them for the first time.

It was not a celebration of a single town. It was a celebration of a State, and into it had been flung all the energy and all the determination to beat the best that animates the Green Mountain boys. They certainly did well. Neither at Pittsburgh nor anywhere else were the arrangements so admirable and adequate. Everything had been thought of, everything done, to ensure the comfort of visitors and the enjoyment of everybody. Fine organization had resulted in a perfect system for providing accommodation for all. Refreshment booths afforded an opportunity of getting a square meal that had proved an impossibility anywhere else. And every place of worship in the city was left open day and night, affording a cool and quiet resting place for those overcome by the heat of the day, the pressure of the crowd, or the emotions the celebration arose.

A GOOD HUMORED CROWD.

Hours before the arrival of the Presidential party, the city was crowded and the city hall park and all avenues leading thereto densely packed with people. They waited patiently, good humor on all faces. Occasionally the stirring strains of some partial air as a regimental company swung into position beyond aroused them, and they were frequently on their feet as the result of false alarms. Once, when the Governor-General's Foot Guards were being drawn up in company formation on the outskirts of the park, their band played the first verse of "God Save the King" and the thirty thousand who heard it rose and uncovered to a man.

At last the automobile containing President Taft and his staff swung up the street from the lake shore, and amid a roar of welcome that has never resounded through Burlington's streets for many a year, the Chief Magistrate of the nation came back to the capital of the State from which his ancestors sprang.

Surrounded by Ambassadors, statesmen, soldiers, and others who are accompanying him on this round of festive days, the President stood there before an audience sufficiently large, sufficiently enthusiastic, and sufficiently sincere to thrill any man with pride in his race. He watched them as for several minutes they cheered and waved hats, handkerchiefs, sticks, anything and everything they had in their hands, and shouting their boisterous welcome. And when it was over, when the tumult had been temporarily stilled, and the people had become silent, he still stood for a few seconds, watching with those keen, kind eyes of his, and he too as though he loved them.

VERMONT'S ENTERTAINMENT

It was Burlington's day, but it was Vermont's turn to entertain. Governor Prouty does not possess the gift of sonorous eloquence and dignified utterance, the stately presence and the nobility of attitude that make Governor Hughes so distinguished a man in any company but he does possess a warm heart, the ability to say what he means in convincing words, and the gift of shedding around him a geniality a bonhomie, and a splendid sincerity that make his presence a ray of sunshine without any suggestion of cloud. His welcome to the President and to all the distinguished guests was as warm as cordial, and as all-embracing as any welcome could be. It came straight from the heart, and it touched the hearts of those to whom it was addressed.

Then he called for a civic welcome, and there came forward a tall, slim, rather awkward man, a man with nervousness in his manner, but determination, intelligence and strength of will written in every line of his face. He was Burlington's famous blacksmith mayor, and for a few minutes the prominence of his position kept him tongue-tied. Only for a minute, however. After that he made a speech which contained appropriate sentiment.

but lofty thought, and as a sauce quant for the whole a matter-of-fact reference, pointedly intended for Presidential ear, concerning the deep waterway scheme from the St. Lawrence through Lake Champlain to the sea of which so much has been said from time to time—and so little done.

VARIED ORATORY.

Prayer had opened the formal speaking, the Right Rev. Bishop Hall having offered up a simple appeal for guidance for America's statesmen at the helm. The tone of the oratorical utterances that followed was delightfully varied, sweeping from grave to gay, from philosophy to timely wit, from cheery chaff to serious eulogy, as one ripple succeeds another on the face of the lake when the summer breeze stirs. Governor Hughes, of New York, paid a high tribute to the splendid spirit of independence, freedom, and passionate love of liberty and truth that animated the people of Vermont's green hills, and passed on to paint a glowing picture of the benefits derivable from the friendly rivalry between the States of New York and Vermont.

Following him came Ambassador Jussard. This gentleman's happy knack of hitting on some witty reference, of characterizing in a sentence some feature of the day, has made his presence throughout the celebrations a welcome one indeed. Today he was just as happy, just as appropriate. He described the Champlain valley as a land of wonders, and he gave as one reason for doing so, the fact that he had been told that the blue ridge on the horizon was the Green Mountains. Passing on to discuss the relations between America and France, he found in them nothing but the happiest auguries. He was followed by Ambassador Bryce, who delivered a carefully phrased address in which he reviewed the history of Champlain's discovery and pointed its significance. He made a fervid appeal for peace, and he concluded by another appeal which went to the hearts of all—an appeal that they should preserve in all its native beauty and charm the lovely heritage the discovery of Champlain valley forever a garden, a resting-place, a haven of ease for those of the nation who from time to time grow weary in the pressure and worry of daily life.

"Lead your mountain tops free," cried he, "that every American citizen, from the humblest to the greatest, may be able to walk their ridges and behold from their heights this unequalled panorama of beauty and nature at her feet."

HON. RODOLPHE LEMIEUX.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux made the sensation of the day by his speech. In ringing tones that reached the farthest confines of the vast assembly, in eloquent phrase redolent with poetic touches and impassioned passages, he eulogized the part that French Canada had taken in the building up of the United States, and then the friendly relations existing between the United States and the Dominion. He painted a word-picture in which the combination of England, France, and the United States in friendly unity guaranteed the peace of the world.

Last, and happy as any, came the President himself. The reception accorded him was one he is not likely to forget in a hurry. For a man to face thirty thousand of his fellows and to know that they are paying a tribute of trust and faith and admiration, from their hearts, is an experience that does not often fall to the lot of any man, even a President. William Howard Taft spoke to them from his heart—a brief, cheery, optimistic little speech that acted like a tonic after the floods of eloquence that had been outpoured.

"I am not in the theatrical business," he said, "and I never knew before these last three days what was meant by a continuous show. Now I know."

Kindly words for Vermont and a few uplifting sentiments of encouragement and enthusiastic belief in the future followed, and then he ended on the light note again. "If there is one thing my experience of this continuous show has taught me, it is that every man should limit his time."

TOOK A REST TODAY.

BURLINGTON, Vt., July 9.—After the events of yesterday, when the President of the United States, British and French ambassadors and Canadian representatives were here to assist in the Burlington celebration in connection with the tercentenary anniversary of the discovery of Lake Champlain, today was practically a day of rest. A band concert was given in the City Hall park in the forenoon, and in the afternoon there were trotting races at the track of the Burlington Driving club. Today was called "Merchants' day," and special bargain attractions were expected to bring a large crowd of shoppers into the city.

Fire at Ahmic Harbor.

Bark's Falls, July 10.—A fragmentary message from Ahmic Harbor, via Dunchurch, late yesterday afternoon, said that the village was on fire, that the hotel and several residences had been burned and that Graves, Biglow & Co.'s warehouse was threatened.

It was impossible to get either telephone or telegraph connection with the village on account of the fire.

Ahmic Harbor is in Parry Sound District, 25 miles from here. It has a population of 200, three lumber mills, two stores, a church, S. A. barracks, and one hotel.

The company say they will not accept a bonus or power at less than the cost of production.

Industrial accidents occurring to 273 individual work people in Canada during the month of December, 1908, were reported to the Department of Labor at Ottawa. Of these, 85 were fatal and 188 resulted in serious injuries.

In the preceding month there were 124 fatal and 198 non-fatal accidents reported, a total of 322, and in December, 1907, there were 88 fatal and 195 non-fatal accidents, a total of 283.
