## HIS CLAIM WAS ANCIENT.

### And Ontario Government Would Not Pay It Or Grant a Fiat.

TORONTO, Ont., July 22.—(Special)—The Ontario government has refused the request of John Land Birney, of Toronto, that he be reimbursed for 800 pounds which his father paid to his militia company for service in 1837. Birney's father, Captain Joseph Birney, paid the mil-

itia man because paymaster of the command absconded. The government also refused the petition of Birney for a fiat to sue the province and prove his claims in court. Capt. Birney served in the war of 1812 and was beside General Brock when that officer was killed on Queenston heights.

## CIGARS NOT A DRUG.

### Toronto Magistrate Decides They Cannot be Legally Sold on Sunday.

TORONTO, July 22.—(Special)—That tobacco was a drug and therefore could be sold Sunday. The magistrate yesterday, after taking a week to think it over, rejected the plea and imposed a \$5 fine. The case will be appealed.

## MR. GREGORY'S ILLNESS.

St. John, July 22.—The International Commission dealing with the difficulties between the various lumber interests on the St. John river, was delayed today by the absence of A. J. Gregory, K. C., counsel for

the Canadian Commissioners, who is suffering from a severe attack of neuralgia. The commission met at ten o'clock and adjourned until four p. m., when if Mr. Gregory has not recovered, a further adjournment will be made.

## NEW SHOE FACTORY.

ST. JOHN, July 22.—(Special)—St. John is to have a new industry in the form of a shoe factory which is being fitted up by J. M. Humphrey & Company, wholesale shoe deal-

ers of this city. The new factory will employ at the start about fifty men and will for the present confine its output to staple goods of heavy nature.

## OPIUM JOINT RAIDED.

TORONTO, July 21.—(Special)—As a result of the determination of the police to clean out local Chinatown an opium joint, kept by Tie You, was raided and Tie You and

three other Chinamen with Mabel Meek, a pretty young white girl, were arrested. The girl is said to have been asleep under the influence of opium when arrested.

## FATAL ACCIDENT.

Toronto, July 22.—Jolted from the top of a Grand Trunk switching train yesterday afternoon, Edward Cahoon, a yardman, aged 22 years, of 21 Ni-

agara street, was run over and instantly killed. His head was almost completely severed from his body and his right hand was fearfully crushed.

### Government Old Age Annuities to be Discussed at the Opera House

Dr. Samson, chief lecturer for Canada, under the Dominion annuities act and Mr. N. W. Brown, B. A., lecturer for New Brunswick, will address a public meeting at the opera house this evening, and explain the government scheme of old age annuities. The chief will be taken by His Worship Mayor Chestnut at eight o'clock. The subject is one of great importance and will no doubt be presented in an able and interesting manner. Hanlan's orchestra has been engaged to furnish music.

Last evening Dr. Samson addressed a meeting at St. John and this morning's Telegraph in referring to it says:

"It might be supposed that a lecture explanatory of the Dominion government's scheme of annuities would be but a dry subject but in the hands of Dr. James Samson, of Windsor (Ont.), who addressed a well attended meeting in the new Y. Y. M. A. hall last evening, it was interesting indeed.

Dr. Samson quickly demonstrated to his hearers that he was something more than a lecturer. He invested his subject with an atmosphere of deep interest. Scarcely a point was made that he did not illustrate with a story, humorous or pathetic, and during the hour and a quarter that his address lasted his hearers did not experience a dull moment."

## THREE DECREES GRANTED.

### Judge McKeown Annuls Unhappy Marriages at the Divorce Court.

His Honor Judge McKeown delivered judgment in three divorce cases at the Divorce Court this morning, granting a decree in each case.

Dr. William A. Ferguson vs. Bertha Ferguson was the first case decided. The parties to the suit were married at Newcastle in 1890, the defendant being formerly Miss Bertha Sinclair. They lived together as man and wife until 1904. Mrs. Ferguson then moved to California and obtained a divorce in that state. She later was married to one George Henderson, and still lives with him. The plaintiff claimed that the New Brunswick Courts would not recognize the divorce granted in California and therefore Mrs. Ferguson was living with Henderson in an unlawful state. Judge McKeown in delivering judgment, endorsed the plaintiff's claim. He said that the New Brunswick marriage contract was still in force. While it might be a matter of regret said the judge, the defendant's marriage with Henderson was unquestionably unlawful, according to the New Brunswick law, and her cohabitation with Henderson is adulterous and must so be pronounced for the purposes of this suit. By reason of this Judge McKeown ordered a decree to be issued dissolving the marriage of the plaintiff and defendant contracted in 1890. J. D. Phinney, K. C., for

plaintiff and Messrs. E. A. Kelly and M. G. Teed, K. C., for the defendant.

The case of Sarah A. Saunders vs. William A. Saunders was next taken up. This is a York County case and the application for divorce was on the usual statutory grounds. The parties married in 1888 at Macnaquac and later lived at Marysville. The evidence was reviewed and the case was undefended. The plaintiff was granted an absolute divorce. R. B. Hanson appeared for the plaintiff.

Sarah B. Harris vs. Walter W. Harris—In this case the plaintiff, a Miss Buchanan, was married at Annapolis in 1899. The case was undefended and the plaintiff was granted an absolute divorce. An application was made to have Mrs. Harris resume her maiden name. His Honor stated that while he could not see that the court had power to do this, still if the plaintiff wished she could do so and there was nothing to prevent her as a matter of common law. Mr. Fred H. Peters appeared for the plaintiff.

The Currey case, which was to have come up this morning, was adjourned until tomorrow morning, when it will be taken up at St. John. The change was made at the request of Mr. Skinner, who has to attend the funeral of a relative.

## VICTORY FOR TARTARS.

### Base Ball Fans Witnessed an Old Time Game Here Yesterday.

The newly organized Tartar baseball team made a successful debut before a fairly large crowd at Scully's Grove yesterday afternoon when they defeated the Marathons of St. John in one of the greatest ball games ever seen in this city by a score of 5 to 4. The Tartars came to the bat in the ninth inning with the score of 4 to 3 against them. A base on balls, a two bagger by Frank Hughes and three errors by the visitors allowed the home team to get the necessary runs to win the game. It was baseball all the time, both teams playing hard to win. Although both teams had the same number of hits, the hits of the visitors were cleaner and far more effective, especially in the fifth inning which was the only inning in which they scored. The Tartars had Dick Tibbitts of the old Tartars playing centre field and although being out of the game for a number of years, he played a fine game, working from start to finish, as did George Finnamore, also of the old Tartars. George was especially good with the bat yesterday.
